Sacrificial Living!

Often, whenever I tell people about the Mount Pleasant Home Protection Society, the questions they ask are all the same. Who are you and what are you all about? What do you do? I find my answers are always the same. We are a Society that began some one hundred years ago back in 1922. It began as an urgent need for our ancestors to provide a respectful and dignified way to bury their deceased loved ones.

Today, this is literally taken for granted, but back in the 1800's and early 1900's this basic human right was not bestowed upon the African American population. There was no respect or dignity in life or death for people of color. We were merely regarded as a property or inventory investment. Our lives were esteemed only as great as our ability to be productive or to work hard. Our Ancestors were housed and made to live sometimes in substandard conditions where the care of the livestock was regarded higher. Imagine today, your loved one, your friends and relatives being treated in such a manner? To be buried in the soil of the swamp land in just a hole dug in the ground. Wouldn't you try to do something? This very idea is heartfelt and hurtful. This called for an urgent response as our people grew tired of being ill-treated. Yes, the Mount Pleasant Home Protection Society was created as an act of love! The men and women joined together to create a united stand together of we will overcome this indignation. We will work together! This is our Fight! After working the cotton fields, cooking, washing, ironing, and cleaning for both their employers and their families, they worked a cotton field to earn money to provide the dignity they were denied in life to be able offer it in death for their loved ones.

I can imagine that they could not have envisioned this society lasting more than 100 years because they only saw the immediate need as it was an immediate response. Today, we provide burial assistance to the elected beneficiary of the deceased member. This is about one tenth of the average funeral cost in 2022. This would be equivalent to 17 years of paid dues of sixty dollars a year.

We are a charitable organization that makes a yearly monetary donation to either a local or national cause or foundation. Each year we provide an educational scholarship opportunity to a qualifying high school applicant. Our mission is clear that we must help one another! All funds are received either by member's donations, sponsorships, or fundraising. It is through benevolent acts during challenging times, we assist and support our members or or community. We hope in the future to be able to provide greater burial support for our members. Thus, increasing our beneficiary payout to twenty five percent of the average cost of a funeral. Our goal is to increase in numbers to be able to increase our chance of sustainability. We are the living legacy of many people. As President, I feel it is a call to sacrificial living where the greatest sacrifice is time and dedication. I'd like to have our society become a historical society as part of preservation of our history. My goal is to ensure that their story is shared on black history platforms, as well as included academically in schools and added to African American History textbooks. Not only those in the Blackbelt area but globally the story must go forth. We must never forget the efforts and sacrifices that was made by our forefathers.

August is National Eye Exam Month. Your eyes do wondrous things. While it takes some time for most parts of your body to warm up to their full potential, your eyes operate at 100%. Our eyes process around 80% of the information from our surrounding environment that reaches our brains. Our eyes also play a crucial role in deciding if what you are about to eat tastes good or not. Taste is quite a weak sense, which is why the body also relies on sight to decide if food or drink is to your liking by color recognition. Your eyes take in information and have a direct connection with your brain allowing you to visually process the world around you. Even if you don't need corrective vision care, it is important to get eye exams.

Eye Exam Month Debra Sullivan Hundley Purpose of eye exams Approximately 12 million people in the United State

Approximately 12 million people in the United States who are forty years old and older have vision impairment. Most vision problems are avoidable or curable. Regular exams by an eye doctor are important to monitor your overall eye health and wellness and detect a variety of health issues, such as:

- Identify a need for vision correction, like glasses or contacts
- Identify eye health issues, such as glaucoma, cataracts, and macular degeneration

Identify other health issues and help diagnose high cholesterol, high blood pressure, heart problems, diabetes, diabetic retinopathy, liver disease, arthritis, Alzheimer's disease, low back pain, strokes, increased risks for falls, injury, depression, and even brain tumors

Other reasons to get eye exams

- any change in vision
- eye pain
- double vision
- drainage or redness of the eye
- flashes of light
- floaters (tiny specks that appear to float before your eyes) or "spider webs"
- circles (halos) around light sources or rainbows around lights
- seeing what looks like a curtain coming down over one eye
- sudden sensitivity to light and glare

Ways to take care of your eyes t is important to get eye exams. Eat a healthy, balanced diet with

- Eat a healthy, balanced diet with plenty or fruits and vegetables, especially deep yellow and green leafy vegetables. Leafy dark greens are best! Spinach, kale, and collards form a meal with an eye-loving vitamin boost. Eating fish high in omega-3 fatty acids, such as salmon and tuna, can also help your eyes.
- Maintain a healthy body and healthy weight. Getting the proper nutrition, maintaining a healthy body weight and regular physical activity all help your eyes stay sharp.
- **Wear sunglasses.** Sun exposure can damage your eyes and raise your risk of cataracts and age-related macular degeneration. Protect your eyes by using sunglasses that block out 99 to 100% of both UV-A and UV-B radiation.
- Wash your hands before touching your eyes. Keep germs away.
 - **Wear protective eye wear** to prevent eye injuries when playing certain sports, working in jobs such as factory work and construction, and doing repairs or projects in your home.

Avoid smoking. Smoking increases the risk of developing age-related eye diseases such as macular degeneration and cataracts and can damage the optic nerve.

Know your family medical history. Some eye diseases are inherited. Knowing your family medical history can help determine if you are at a higher risk of developing an eye disease.

Know your other risk factors. It is important to know your risk factors because you may be able to lower your risk by changing some behaviors.

Give your eyes a rest. If you spend a lot of time using a computer, you can forget to blink your eyes and your eyes can get tired. To reduce eyestrain, try the 20-20-20 rule: Every 20 minutes, look away about 20 feet in front of you for 20 seconds. This will help prevent eye fatigue and could even help with other concerns such as headaches and migraines.

Taking care of your eyes may also benefit your overall health. Your eyes are an important part of your health. Just as it is important to keep your body healthy, you also need to keep your eyes healthy.

- 1 Bx Lemon Cake Mix
- 1 Bx Lemon Pudding Mix(instant)
- 4 Eggs
- 2 tbsp flour
- 1 cup oil

2/3 c water with lemon juice Blend and cook at 325 until done. Poke

holes in cake with a fork.

Any person that desires to participate must be no younger than one (1) year old and no older than sixty-five (65) years old when joining the society. New members may join in person during the meeting or virtually once the Secretary has received the new members application, beneficiary form and paid the joining fee of 10.00. There is an annual fee of sixty dollars in which the new member pays one half the first year joined which is due by the end of the calendar year. Each member is expected to pay \$ 2.00 death due upon the death of a member.

General Meetings are held bimonthly. The bi-monthly meetings will be held the fourth Saturday of January, March, May, July, and September. The annual day will be held in the fall season and will be the last meeting of the calendar year. Special call meetings may be called by the President when deemed necessary. 

















Does a Scholarship Interest You?

The Robert Kirk Memorial Scholarship SCHOLARSHIP APPLICATION GUIDELINES

The Robert Kirk Memorial Scholarship will be awarded based primarily on excellence, leadership, perseverance and financial need.

One scholarship is granted for one academic year in the amount of \$1000.00 and maybe renewable for one year based on academic good standing. Scholarship is awarded for one academic year in the amount of \$500.00 (August) and \$500.00 in (January) upon proof of active school enrollment.

SCHOLARSHIP APPLICATION PROCEDURE

- 1. Complete the scholarship application form.
- 2. Write an essay addressing the questions listed in the award criteria.
- 3. Request an official copy of transcript and include with your scholarship application.
- 4. Submit your entire scholarship application package to the Robert Kirk Memorial Scholarship in <u>one envelope</u>. A completed package must include:
 - a. Completed, signed application form.
 - b. Essay (typed, 250 words).
 - c. 1 -2 letters of recommendation.
 - d. Official high school transcript or college transcript.
 - e. Copy of your college acceptance letter.
- 5. Mail to Mount Pleasant Home Protection Society Attn: Robert Kirk Memorial Scholarship, PO Box 96, Ralph, AL 35480. All packages must be postmarked no later than March 30.

Scholarship Award Criteria

- 1. Must be a high school senior graduating in good standing
- 2. Must have exhibited leadership qualities in high school, church and community activities.
- 3. Provide at least two letters of recommendation from high school teacher or counselor and community leader or pastor, etc.
- 4. Must submit a typed essay (250-500 words maximum) outlining future goals and briefly state why you should be awarded the scholarship.
- 5. Must submit a copy of acceptance letter from the post-secondary school that you will attend.
- 6. Must maintain at least 3.0 GPA for the renewable award the second year.




