

Protecting Your Home: A Treasure Valley Homeowner's Guide to Pest Control

Unfortunately, we're not the only ones becoming more active. Spring, summer, and early fall are prime seasons for many common household pests looking for food, water, and shelter. Fortunately, with a few preventive measures and regular home maintenance, you can greatly reduce the chances of unwanted visitors making themselves at home.

Know Your Local Pests

The Boise area is home to a variety of seasonal pests. Ants are among the most common nuisance insects, often entering homes through tiny foundation cracks in search of food and moisture. Wasps frequently build nests beneath eaves, decks, fences, and outdoor play equipment, while spiders become more noticeable as they follow other insects indoors. Earwigs, box elder bugs, elm seed bugs, and rodents are also common throughout the Treasure Valley, particularly as weather conditions change. Homes near agricultural areas or irrigation canals may experience increased pressure from mice, voles, and flying insects.

Start with Prevention

The most effective pest control strategy is preventing pests from entering your home in the first place. Begin with a thorough inspection of your home's exterior.

Seal cracks in foundations, gaps around windows and doors, utility penetrations, and damaged weatherstripping. Repair torn window screens and ensure crawlspace and attic vents remain properly screened. Even openings as small as a quarter inch can allow rodents access to your home.

Next, eliminate conditions that attract pests. Store firewood at least 20 feet away from the house and keep it elevated off the ground. Trim shrubs and tree branches so they don't touch your siding or roof. Dense vegetation provides convenient bridges for insects and rodents while trapping moisture against your home's exterior.

Keep Moisture Under Control

Many pests are attracted to damp environments. Repair leaking hose bibs, irrigation systems, and plumbing fixtures promptly. Make sure gutters and downspouts direct water away from the foundation and avoid allowing sprinkler systems to spray directly onto siding or foundation walls.

Inside the home, inspect crawlspaces, basements, and utility rooms for signs of excess moisture or standing water. Proper ventilation and humidity control make these areas far less attractive to insects.

Practice Good Sanitation

Simple housekeeping habits go a long way toward pest prevention. Store pantry items in sealed containers, promptly clean food spills, and avoid leaving pet food out overnight. Regularly empty garbage containers and keep outdoor trash cans tightly covered.

Yards also benefit from routine maintenance. Remove piles of leaves, grass clippings, and yard debris where insects and rodents may nest. Keeping your lawn healthy and well maintained reduces hiding places for many pests.

Watch for Warning Signs

Early detection can prevent a minor issue from becoming a major infestation. Watch for ant trails, rodent droppings, gnaw marks, damaged food packaging, wasp activity around the roofline, spider webs accumulating indoors, or insects gathering around windows and doors. If you notice mud tubes on foundation walls or damaged wood, contact a qualified pest professional promptly to determine whether termites or other wood-destroying organisms may be present.
