Geography





O Age Groups (C 2021)





Historical Overview

The Uxbridge and South Ruislip constituency in London has a rich political history, shaped by its location, demographics, and the influence of key political figures. Situated in the western part of Greater London, it has historically been a key battleground for both major political parties. The Uxbridge and South Ruislip constituency in London has a long history, traditionally leaning Conservative since its creation in 1918. Initially reflecting a middle-class, suburban demographic, it remained a Conservative stronghold throughout much of the 20th century, though Labour gained ground at times, notably winning the seat from 1964 to 1970 during the post-war period. However, the seat quickly returned to Conservative control after 1970.

During the 1980s, under Margaret Thatcher, the constituency remained firmly Conservative, bolstered by suburban conservatism and the economic policies of the time. This trend continued through the 2000s and 2010s, even as Labour made inroads in nearby areas. The seat became particularly notable due to Boris Johnson, who represented it from 2015 to 2023. Johnson, who became Prime Minister in 2019, won re-election with a significant majority, largely due to his Brexit leadership and popularity within the constituency. His tenure solidified Conservative dominance, although his resignation amid the Partygate scandal in 2022 triggered a by-election.

In the 2023 by-election, the Labour Party made strong gains, reflecting growing support in outer London. Despite this, the Conservatives held onto the seat, though the results were seen as a sign of increasing political volatility. The by-election highlighted discontent with the Conservative government, particularly over issues like inflation and the cost of living, setting the stage for a more competitive race in future elections.

Political Landscape

- Local Government: Uxbridge is part of the London Borough of Hillingdon. It has a borough council that manages local services, including education, transport, and housing.
- Parliamentary Representation: Uxbridge has been represented in the UK Parliament, with notable MPs, including Boris Johnson, who served as the Member of Parliament (MP) from 2015 until he became Prime Minister in 2019. The constituency is traditionally seen as a Conservative stronghold.
- Danny Beales, the Labour Party candidate, is the current Member of Parliament for Uxbridge and South Ruislip, having won the seat in the 2024 general election ¹. He secured a narrow victory with a majority of just 587 votes, defeating Conservative candidate Steve Tuckwell.


