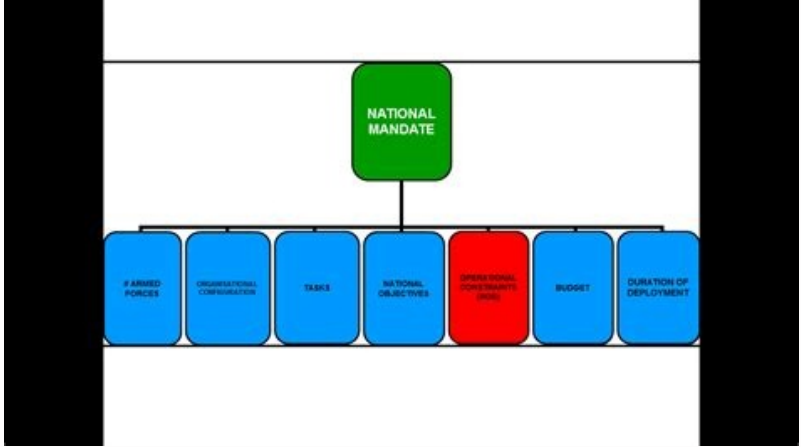

1-29. Leaders at all levels ensure that their soldiers operate in accordance with military law. It is also known as the law of armed conflict and is a set of international laws that govern the conduct of hostilities. The purpose of martial law is to protect combatants and non-essential combatants from unnecessary suffering, promoting the transition to peace and protecting the rights of prisoners of war, enemies of prisoners of war (EPW), prisoners, wounded and sick, and civilians. 1-30. Four important principles govern armed conflict: military necessity, distinction, proportionality and needless suffering. Military necessity allows combat forces to engage in activities necessary to achieve a legitimate military objective and not otherwise prohibited by the law of armed conflict. The distinction is between legitimate combat targets and non-competitive targets. The latter may include civilians, civilian objects, EPW and non-deep non-vater. Proportionality requires that the expected loss of life and property damage associated with the attacks is not disproportionate to the specific and immediate military advantage that will be gained.



The principle of needless suffering requires that armed forces avoid unnecessary violence against the enemy. Soldiers take these principles into account when they plan and execute operations. (Details in FM 27-10) 1-31. Rules of Engagement are guidelines issued by competent military authorities that define the circumstances and limitations under which U.S. forces begin or continue to fight in other engagements. (See JP 1-04 for more information.) These directives may be executive orders, deployment orders, memorandums of understanding, or plans. RoE always recognizes the soldier's inherent right to self-separation.

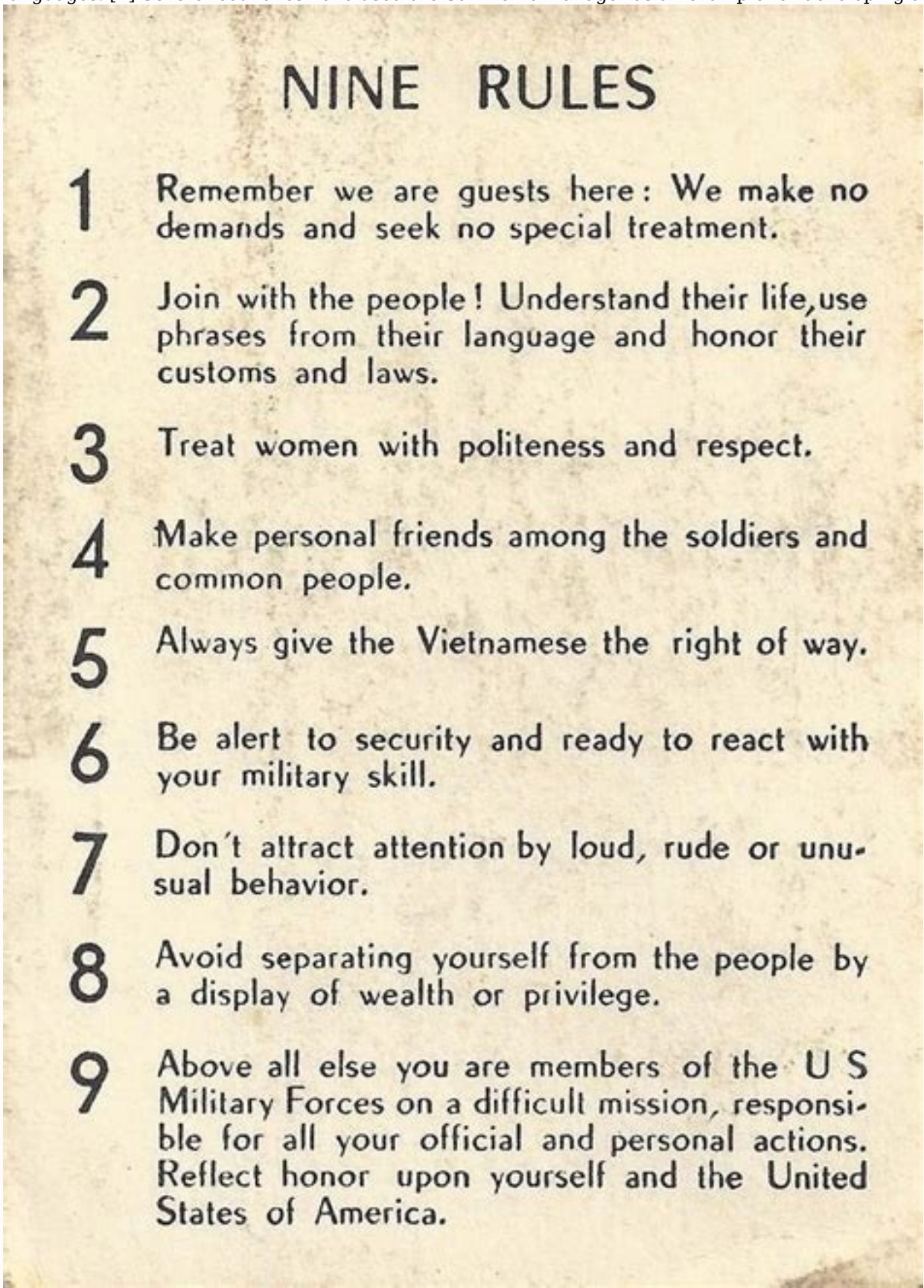


The needless suffering principle requires that military forces may not be caused by an enemy unwarranted for violence. These principles are taken into consideration by soldiers when planning and carrying out operations. (For more information, see FM 27-10.) 1-31. Rules of participation are instructions issued by relevant military authorities that define the circumstances and restrictions under which U.S. forces initiate or continue combat action with other forces.
