

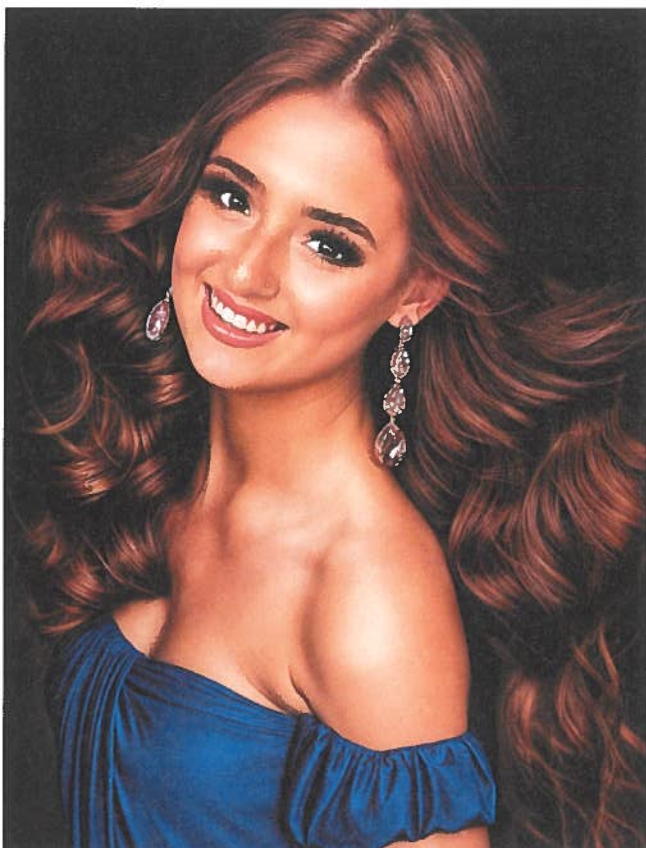

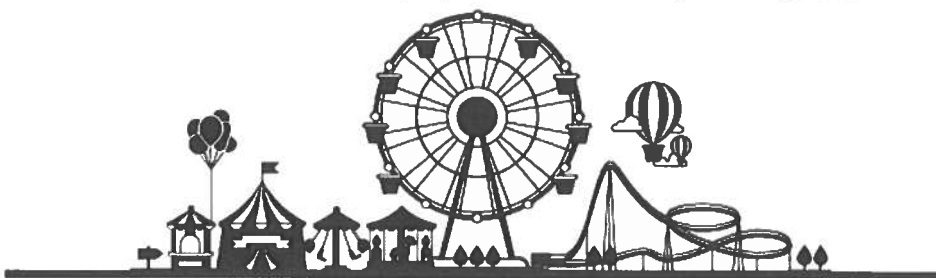

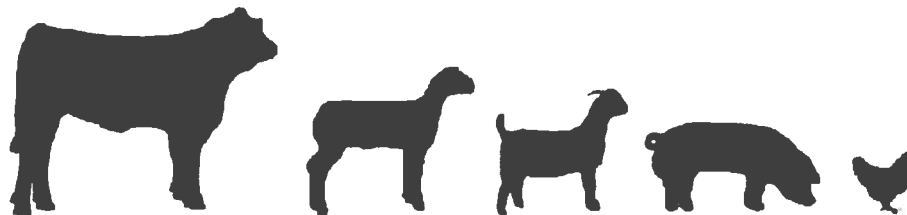

General Rules & Regulations

1. The Yell County Fair, Inc. reserves the final and absolute right to interpret these rules and regulations and arbitrarily settle all matters in regard thereto or otherwise arising out of, connected with, or incident to the fair.
2. The Management reserves the right to amend or add to these rules as they may deem advisable.

Entry and Release Requirements

3. All exhibitors or contestants **MUST** be residents of Yell County, or a member of a Yell County 4-H Club, FFA Chapter, FCCLA Chapter, or Extension Homemakers Club.
4. Each non-commercial exhibitor must be issued an exhibitor number. This number is to be used when entering ALL departments of the fair. You may go to the Extension Office before the fair or the Educational Exhibits Building at the time of entry to pick up your number.
5. All entries must be filed with the department superintendent/chair not later than the date and time specified in each department.
6. Entries must be removed from their exhibit area at the time specified in each department. No premiums will be paid if entry is removed before the deadline.
7. Any entries remaining at the fairgrounds after 6:00 PM on the Monday following the fair will become property of the Yell County Fair, Inc.

Liability of Exhibitors and Patrons

8. All property entered for competition, display or for any other purpose by any person shall be subject to the rules and regulations of the Yell County Fair, Inc.
9. In no case shall the Yell County Fair, Inc. or any of its officers or directors, be held responsible for any loss, damage, injury, death, disease, theft or other cause to any property while on the Fair Grounds. The management assumes no responsibility for any property brought upon grounds. If property owners or others interested in the property desire protection against loss, damage or injury from fire, or from any other cause, they must make their own arrangements and pay for such insurance.

Claim for Injury

10. No claim for injury to any person or property shall ever be asserted nor suit instituted or maintained against the Yell County Fair, Inc., its officers or its agents, by or on behalf of any person, firm or corporation or their agents, representatives, servants or employees having license or privilege to exhibit on said Fair Grounds, or occupying space thereon the Yell County Fair, Inc. shall in no manner be responsible therefore, and in case it be subjected to any expense or liability all persons causing same or liable therefore shall indemnify the said Yell County Fair, Inc.

Concessions and Privileges

11. The Board of Directors authorizes letting of only such privileges or concessions as are required to supply necessary wants of the people or that may add to their comfort, convenience or pleasure. Under no circumstances will a privilege of a questionable nature or of a demoralizing tendency be let or in any manner permitted where business is conducted in other than legitimate and trade-like manner. Exhibit space or concession rights are for exclusive use of persons with whom the contract is made and are not transferable or subject to sublease without written approval of the Manager of the Fair.
12. All space allocated must be improved and decorated by the exhibitor at his own expense. Each concessionaire must confine himself to the space assigned. Failure to do so will subject him to forfeiture of his privilege.

General Rules & Regulations

13. Any official representative of the Yell County Fair shall have access to premises of any exhibitor or concessionaire at any and all times.
14. All buildings and ground space is to be kept neat and clean. Concessionaire is to deposit all refuse and rubbish in receptacles provided by himself and is to conduct business in a quiet and orderly manner.
15. All booths, tents, or other enclosures erected, must meet approval of the Yell County Fair, Inc.
16. All food concessions or vendors of food and drinks are the exclusive privilege of the youth organization of each school in Yell County, one booth per school and EHC Country Store.
17. Immediately after close of the Fair, all food concessions or vendors shall be removed together with structures that may have been; such removal must be accomplished within ten days after close of the Fair. Any exhibit or material not removed on or before the deadline will be considered abandoned by the exhibitor and will become property of the Yell County Fair, Inc.
18. All loud-speaking equipment used by concessionaire must meet with the approval of the manager.
19. No roving or solicitor acting for either a profit or non-profit organization or on his own behalf, shall be permitted on the Fairgrounds of the Yell county Fair Association except within defined areas for the purpose of vending food and soft drinks for the benefit of patrons attending scheduled events therein. All solicitations for either contributions or sale must be made within the confines of a booth or a display unless otherwise exempted by this regulation.

Premiums and Awards

20. **The judges will award premiums only on articles in premium list. The decision of a judge shall be final and no appeal will be considered except in case of protest.** The judges in all Departments will be approved by the manager.
21. The following colors will be used in designating awards:

Champion	Royal Purple
Reserve Champion.....	Lavender
First.....	Blue
Second.....	Red
Third.....	White
Fourth.....	Pink
Fifth.....	Yellow
22. In classes where exhibits are made by one producer, the Yell County Fair, Inc. reserves the right to pay only the first premium in each lot, and that only when the entered article or animal is worthy.
23. All premiums will be paid by the Yell County Fair, Inc. on or before October 31st.
24. Entries exhibited without competition will receive first place ribbons and second place premiums.
25. Youth exhibitors in the Creative Arts divisions that are under the age of five will **NOT** be eligible to receive a cash premium. They will receive a "Yell County Fair Participant" ribbon.
26. The Yell County Fair, Inc. reserves the right in the event revenue does not provide sufficient funds to pay premiums offered that same shall be paid on pro rata share of available funds.
27. All 4-H or FFA youth exhibitors will receive their checks through either their 4-H Club Leader or Ag Teacher. All other premium checks will be available for pick up at the Yell County Extension Office in Danville.
28. Any premium checks that are NOT picked up and cashed within 90 days of issue will revert back to the Yell County Fair, Inc.

General Rules & Regulations

Protest and Appeals

29. All protests must be made in writing and accompanied by a deposit of \$10.00. Deposits will be forfeited if protest is not sustained. Said protest must be filed with the Manager within five hours after the award was made, it being considered that award was made when ribbon is placed. Appeals must contain at least one specific charge stating at length the facts of the rule violated, and naming witnesses and addresses who can substantiate the charge.
30. No protest or appeal based upon the statement that the judge or judges are incompetent or have overlooked an animal or article will be considered by the management.
31. In addition to the right to protest herein granted the exhibitor, the Yell County Fair, Inc. reserves the right to take cognizance of fraud consummated or attempted in connection with an exhibit and take such action as may be deemed just and proper and as may be warranted in these premises.
32. All questions in dispute or difference not covered by these rules will be referred to the Management, whose decision will be final.

Membership

33. The Yell County Fair, Inc. is a member of the Arkansas Fair Managers Association. The rules of the above associations will govern in all events at the Yell County Fair and their rules shall become a part of all contracts entered into by the Yell County Fair, Inc.

Conduct

34. Fast driving or riding within the Fair Grounds is strictly prohibited. Any person or persons, obstructing any passage, or roadway on the Fair Grounds with automobile or other vehicle, will be requested by the Law Enforcement Officers to remove the same immediately and failure to do so will result in expulsion from the grounds and arrest.

Contracts

35. In every contract made by the Yell County Fair, Inc. its officers or agents, the foregoing rules and regulations shall form a part thereof as fully as if incorporated therein.
36. All scramble participants and their parents/guardians must sign and turn in a participation permission slip one week prior to the start of the fair.

Specific Livestock Rules

1. Entry fees for the current fair year will be as follows:

\$15.00/head Cattle
\$10.00/head Hogs
\$10.00/head Goats
\$10.00/head Sheep
\$2.00/entry Rabbits
\$2.00/entry Poultry

All entry fees are due with entry forms. Pee wee showmanship only with no other class entries will be \$5 an exhibitor.

2. All exhibits must be entered online.
Cattle will be accepted April 1st-May 1st 2026
Exhibit Building entries May 1st-September 6th 2026
Swine, Sheep & Goats June 1st-July 1st 2026
Poultry & Rabbits July 1st-August 1st 2026

All entries must be completed in full to be accepted. NO late entries will be allowed.

Specific Livestock Rules

3. Animals must be bona fide property of the exhibitor and must have been owned by the exhibitor no later than the first Monday in May for market steers and beef and dairy cattle; the first Monday in July for hogs, sheep, & goats; and the first Monday in August for rabbits and poultry the current fair year.
4. All exhibitors MUST abide by the IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics.
5. Exhibitors whose animals require health papers will submit those papers to the Livestock and Poultry Commission Official upon arrival at the gate and again to their superintendent when checking in their animals.
6. All animals in breeding classes, excluding commercial animals, must be recorded or accepted for record in recognized books of record for their respective breeds. Exhibitors must produce a copy of the certificate of registry for animals requiring one, providing ownership at the time of arrival at fair; otherwise the entry will NOT be accepted.
7. All exhibitors will be responsible for entering their animals with the superintendent at the time listed in the schedule of events. No animal will be entered after that time. This means that when reaching the fairgrounds you must see the superintendent of your show and have your animals entered in their books. If you do not enter them prior to the specified time, you will not be allowed to show. You must go to the superintendent, do NOT make them come to you.
8. Junior exhibitors must be between the ages of 9 and 19 as of the opening day of the fair and a member in good standing of a Yell County 4-H Club or FFA Chapter. Exhibitors may show the year following high school graduation. Showmanship, Rabbit, Poultry, Little Britches & Gilt show Exhibitors are excluded from this age limitation.
9. Junior Rabbit & Poultry Exhibitors must be between the ages of 5 and 19 as of the opening day of the fair and a member in good standing of a Yell County 4-H Club or FFA Chapter.
10. Livestock Junior Division Exhibitors ONLY will be eligible to compete in showmanship. NO Livestock Open Division Exhibitors will be allowed to compete in showmanship. Ages for showmanship will be based on the Exhibitor's age as of the opening day of the fair. Junior, and Senior Showmanship contest Exhibitors must show their own animal in order to be considered for the contest. Showmanship classes will be as follows:

Pee Wee Showmanship --- ages 5-8
Junior Showmanship --- ages 9-13
Senior Showmanship --- ages 14-19
11. Showmanship Awards for Beef Cattle, Dairy Cattle, Sheep, Goat, Swine, Rabbits, & Poultry: will be awarded to the Showmanship winners in the Junior and Senior showmanship divisions. Trophies will be awarded to the pee wee division showmen participants.
12. Junior Herdsman Awards - A plaque will be awarded in the Junior Beef Cattle, Junior Sheep, Junior Goat, and Junior Swine Divisions to the herdsman, in charge of livestock exhibits, as a reward for their good housekeeping. A committee will make inspections to determine which exhibit makes the best record. Exhibits will be judged on: daily appearance of the exhibit, exhibit area and personnel attending the exhibit, availability of personnel with the herd to furnish information about their exhibits, and interest in personnel in cooperating with show officials in making the best possible presentation to the public in the judging arena and at all times.
13. The size and breakdown of show classes will be determined by the Department Superintendent. There will be no more than 10 head per class (excluding poultry and rabbits).
14. If a junior livestock exhibitor has more than one animal in the same class, another junior livestock exhibitor may show one of the animals while the owner shows the other.

Specific Livestock Rules

15. Official weigh-in for all market animals will be at approximately 2:00 p.m. on Wednesday, in the Livestock Barn. The Weighmaster will determine the official weight. All market animals MUST be weighed.
16. Animals not eligible for show will not be eligible for any premiums or awards other than showmanship, if the exhibitor qualifies.
17. Exhibitors are responsible for their animals AT ALL TIMES that the animals are on the Fairgrounds.
18. Tying and feeding animals is prohibited in the show ring.
19. All bedding for livestock will be shavings. No hay will be used for bedding. The Yell County Fair will furnish a reasonable amount of shavings for bedding as long as funds are available.
20. All bulls must have a nose ring.
21. Grooming Chutes and Stands must be put up in designated areas only.
22. No animal substitutions or replacements that have not been registered can be added after the close of registration. No refunds will be issued after payment is received.
23. All livestock exhibits will be released from the barns at 9:00 p.m. on Saturday night. Any violation of this rule will result in the loss of all premium money for the offending exhibitor.
24. Persons may show in junior (if qualified) or open division, but not both.

IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics

Exhibitors of animals at livestock shows shall at all times deport themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship. Their conduct in this competitive environment shall always reflect the highest standards of honor and dignity to promote the advancement of agricultural education. This code applies to junior as well as open class exhibitors who compete in structured classes of competition. This code applies to all livestock offered in any event at a livestock show. In addition to the "IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics," fairs and livestock shows may have rules and regulations which they impose on the local, county, state, provincial and national levels.

All youth leaders working with junior exhibitors are under an affirmative responsibility to do more than avoid improper conduct or questionable acts. Their moral values must be so certain and positive that those younger and more pliable will be influenced by their fine example. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers and absolutely responsible persons who violate the code of ethics will forfeit premiums, awards and auction proceeds and shall be prohibited from future exhibition in accordance with the rules adopted by the respective fairs and livestock shows. Exhibitors who violate this code of ethics demean the integrity of all livestock exhibitors and should be prohibited from competition at all livestock shows in the United States and Canada.

The following is a list of guidelines for all exhibitors and all livestock in competitive events

1. All exhibitors must present, upon request of fair and livestock show officials, proof of ownership, length of ownership and age of all animals entered. Misrepresentation of ownership, age, or any facts relating thereto is prohibited.
2. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers, or absolutely responsible persons shall provide animal health certificates from licensed veterinarians upon request by fair or livestock show officials.
3. Junior exhibitors are expected to care for and groom their animals while at fairs or livestock shows.
4. Animals shall be presented to show events where they will enter the food chain free of violative drug residues. The act of entering an animal in a livestock show is the giving of consent by the

owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer and/or absolutely responsible person for show management to obtain any specimens of urine, saliva, blood, or other substances from the animal to be used in testing. Animals not entered in an event which culminates with the animal entering the food chain shall not be administered drugs other than in accordance with applicable federal, state and provincial statutes, regulations and rules. Livestock shall not be exhibited if the drugs administered in accordance with federal, state and provincial statutes, regulations and rules affect the animal's performance or appearance at the event. If the laboratory report on the analysis of saliva, urine, blood, or other sample taken from livestock indicates the presence of forbidden drugs or medication, this shall be prima facie evidence such substance has been administered to the animal either internally or externally. It is presumed that the sample of urine, saliva, blood, or other substance tested by the laboratory to which it is sent is the one taken from the animal in question, its integrity is preserved and all procedures of said collection and preservation, transfer to the laboratory and analysis of the sample are correct and accurate and the report received from the laboratory pertains to the sample taken from the animal in question and correctly reflects the condition of the animal at the time the sample was taken, with the burden on the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to prove otherwise. At any time after an animal arrives on the fair or livestock show premises, all treatments involving the use of drugs and/or medications for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal shall be administered by a licensed veterinarian.

5. Any surgical procedure or injection of any foreign substance or drug or the external application of any substance (irritant, counterirritant, or similar substance) which could affect the animal's performance or alter its natural contour, confirmation, or appearance, except external applications of substances to the hoofs or horns of animals which affect appearance only and except for surgical procedures performed by a duly licensed veterinarian for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal, is prohibited.
6. The use of showing and/or handling practices or devices such as striking animals to cause swelling, using electrical contrivance, or other similar practices are not acceptable and are prohibited.
7. Direct criticism or interference with the judge, fair or livestock show management, other exhibitors, breed representatives, or show officials before, during, or after the competitive event is prohibited. In the furtherance of their official duty, all judges, fair and livestock show management, or other show officials shall be treated with courtesy, cooperation and respect and no person shall direct abusive or threatening conduct toward them.
8. No owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person shall conspire with another person or persons to intentionally violate this code of ethics or knowingly contribute or cooperate with another person or persons either by affirmative action or inaction to violate this code of ethics. Violation of this rule shall subject such individual to disciplinary action.
9. The application of this code of ethics provides for absolute responsibility for an animal's condition by an owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or participant whether or not he or she was actually instrumental in or had actual knowledge of the treatment of the animal in contravention of this code of ethics.
10. The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to have disciplinary action taken by the fair or livestock show for violation of this Code of Show Ring Ethics and any other rules of competition of the fair or livestock show without recourse against the fair or livestock show. The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent that any proceedings or disciplinary action taken by the fair or livestock show may be published with the name of the violator or violators in any publication of the International Association of Fairs and Expositions, including *Fairs and Expositions* and any special notices to members.
11. The act of entering of an animal in a fair or livestock show is the giving of verification by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person that he or she has read the IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics and understands the consequences of and penalties provided for actions prohibited by the code. It is further a consent that any action which contravenes these rules and is also in violation of federal, state, or provincial statutes, regulations, or rules may be released to appropriate law enforcement authorities with jurisdiction over such infractions.

Junior Miss Yell County Fair Queen Pageant

Qualifications, Rules, Regulations & Policies

1. Jr. Fair Queen Contestants must be at least 14 years of age and not more than 18 years of age on the day of the local pageant.
2. A contestant, county/district fair queen must have been born a female and a legal resident of Arkansas. She cannot be, or at any time have been: married, engaged, annulled marriage, pregnant, miscarried, aborted or have had a child. A contestant must not have ever been convicted of any crime or have any criminal charges pending.
3. Past Junior Arkansas State Fair Queens are ineligible to compete again. Contestants in the Junior State Fair Queen Pageant are ineligible to compete in State Fair Youth Talent or Rodeo Queen Contests in the same year.
4. A contestant can only compete in the county contest and win the Fair Queen Contest sanctioned by the County Fair that is held in the county where she resides. Attending school in the county does not constitute residency. In the event a contestant whose parents are divorced, living in separate counties, and has been court ordered to reside jointly with both parents, she can only compete in one of the two counties in which her parents reside. This matter must be taken care of before the contestant gets to the state competition. In the event a conflict arises, the Arkansas State Fair reserves the right to verify accurate residency, according to above said court documents or any additional documentation.

****County -** A contestant must be a permanent resident of the county for six (6) months, enrolled in post-secondary, or enrolled in an institution of higher education within that county, carrying at least 15 hours, before competing and being able to prove residency in the state of Arkansas.

Phases of Competition/Scoring for Junior Contestants

EACH CONTESTANT IS REQUIRED TO PROVIDE 4 COPIES (TYPED) OF HER RESUME WITH ENTRY FORM – this will be used for interviews for competition. A sample resume will be provided.

Personal Interview (50% of total score):- Each personal interview will be for 5 minutes' total. It is highly recommended for the Contestant to dress as she is interviewing for a job. Appropriate dress for the interview may be a suit, casual dress, or jumpsuit. Jeans are not acceptable. This phase will be judged on eye contact, posture, personality, style, ability to converse, vocabulary, and grammar.

Onstage Question (10% of total score):- The onstage question will be judged as a separate score. The local director will prepare question before the pageant that are suitable for the appropriate age division. Each contestant will have 30 seconds to complete her response. This phase will be judged on her ability to answer confidently, as well as her tone of voice and how she presents herself, eye contact, grammar, and can she answer on the spot!

Active Wear (15% of total score):- The active wear phase will consist of the Contestant wearing black spandex shorts or spandex capris, a sports bra, or a sports tank (no T-shirts). The contestant may choose the color of the top. This phase will be judged on physical fitness, energy level, the proportion of the figure, posture, poise, personality, stage presence, eye contact, and confidence. Kick's Active Wear of Conway, the official active wear sponsor for the ASF is available for contestants to purchase active wear, however upon winning, active wear for the ASF competition MUST BE purchased thru Kick's Active Wear.

Evening Gown (25% of total score):- Contestants should choose an evening gown of choice. The garment will be age appropriate, Jewelry and accessories should be tasteful and compliment the gown. High-heeled shoes are recommended, but not required. This phase will be judged on confidence, stage presence, eye contact, posture, walk and modeling, appropriate choice of gown for her age, and overall impression

Qualifications, Rules, Regulations & Policies

1. Fair Queen Contestants must be a graduating high school senior, enrolled in post-secondary education, or non-pursuant of education; all Contestants must be no more than 23 years of age on the day of the local pageant.
2. A contestant or reigning county/district queen must have been born a female and a legal resident of Arkansas. She cannot be, or at any time have been, married, engaged, had a marriage annulled, pregnant, miscarried, aborted or have had a child. A contestant must not have ever been convicted of any crime or have any criminal charges pending.
3. Past Arkansas State Fair Queens are ineligible to compete again. Contestants in the State Fair Queen Pageant are ineligible to compete in State Fair Youth Talent or Rodeo Queen Contests in the same year.
4. A contestant can only compete in the county contest and win the Fair Queen Contest sanctioned by the County Fair that is held in the county where she resides. Attending school in the county does not constitute residency. In the event a contestant whose parents are divorced, living in separate counties, and has been court ordered to reside jointly with both parents, she can only compete in one of the two counties in which her parents reside. This matter must be taken care of before the contestant gets to the state competition. In the event a conflict arises, the Arkansas State Fair Pageant Director reserves the right to verify accurate residency, according to above said court documents or any additional documentation.

****County -** A contestant must be a permanent resident of the county for six (6) months, enrolled in post-secondary, or enrolled in an institution of higher education within that county, carrying at least 15 hours, before competing and being able to prove residency in the state of Arkansas.

Phases of Competition/Scoring for Miss Contestants

EACH CONTESTANT IS REQUIRED TO PROVIDE 4 COPIES (TYPED) OF HER RESUME WITH ENTRY FORM – this will be used for interviews for competition. A sample resume will be provided.

Personal Interview (50% of total score):- Each personal interview will be for 5 minutes' total. It is highly recommended for the Contestant to dress as she is interviewing for a job. Appropriate dress for the interview may be a suit, casual dress, or jumpsuit. Jeans are not acceptable. This phase will be judged on eye contact, posture, personality, style, ability to converse, vocabulary, and grammar.

Onstage Question (10% of total score):- The onstage question will be judged as a separate score. The local director will prepare question before the pageant that are suitable for the appropriate age division. Each contestant will have 30 seconds to complete her response. This phase will be judged on her ability to answer confidently, as well as her tone of voice and how she presents herself, eye contact, grammar, and can she answer on the spot!

Active Wear (15% of total score):- The active wear phase will consist of the Contestant wearing black spandex shorts or spandex capris, a sports bra, or a sports tank (no T-shirts). The contestant may choose the color of the top. This phase will be judged on physical fitness, energy level, the proportion of the figure, posture, poise, personality, stage presence, eye contact, and confidence. Kick's Active Wear of Conway, the official active wear sponsor for the ASF is available for contestants to purchase active wear, however upon winning, active wear for the ASF competition MUST BE purchased thru Kick's Active Wear.

Evening Gown (25% of total score):- Contestants should choose an evening gown of choice. The garment will be age appropriate, Jewelry and accessories should be tasteful and compliment the gown. High-heeled shoes are recommended, but not required. This phase will be judged on confidence, stage presence, eye contact, posture, walk and modeling, appropriate choice of gown for her age, and overall impression

FFA/4-H Scrambles

FFA/4-H SCRAMBLES

Thursday Night, September 10, 2026

Superintendent: Doris Thomas & Kathy Reece

General Rules of Scrambles:

1. All participants entering the contest shall be members of the agriculture classes in high schools, or 4-H club members.
2. No participant shall enter more than one of the scramble contests. No participant shall enter races from multiple clubs.
3. Calf scramble participants must be between the ages of 14 and 19 years old as of the first day of the Yell County Fair.
4. All participants and their parents/guardians must sign a participation form prior to participation in the scrambles.
5. When a participant has their hands on an animal, no other participant shall be permitted to take hold of such animal or to otherwise interfere.
6. When a participant has captured an animal and has been so certified by the judges of that event the animal becomes their property, and they shall assume responsibility for such animal then and there.
7. Each agriculture teacher and 4-H Leader, MUST send or bring to the **Danville Extension Office only**, not later than **August 31, 2026, by 4:00 p.m.**, the signed participation form of the participants who will enter in each event from their respective school and 4-H club. No fax or e-mail will be accepted. This is in order that some necessary preliminary work may be done before the fair.
8. **Ground judges** for the events will be scrambles superintendent, Agri. Instructors & others assigned by fair president.

Fowl Scramble

This event is one of fun and finance for the participants. Numerous feathered fowl will be turned loose at one time. Four participants from each 4-H club are eligible to participate in this event. Catchers are keepers.

Pig Scramble

There will be three scrambles in this event. Two pigs will be turned loose at one time. Three members from each Agri. Department and three members from each 4-H Club are eligible for the scramble. Catchers are keepers.

Small Ruminants Scramble

There will be three scrambles in this event. A mixture of goats or sheep will be turned loose at one time. Three members from each Agri. Department and three members from each 4-H Club are eligible for the scramble. Catchers are keepers.

Calf Scramble

Three calves will be turned loose, one per race. Six members, 14 years and older, from each Agri. Department and each 4-H club will be eligible to participate in this event. Each participant should provide themselves with a rope not to exceed eight feet in length. No lariating of calves will be permitted. If all calves are not caught in a race after 15 minutes, then an alternate participant from each 4-H & FFA club will be allowed to race. Participate that catches the calf, will receive a \$500 cash prize and the calf caught will be returned to the donor.

Health Requirements

The fair board of any county, district, or the state fair reserves the right to have a blood and urine laboratory analysis made for any animal at the fair.

Any exhibitor administering a drug to an animal which would render the carcass unfit for human consumption or any exhibitor of an animal producing an analysis indicating the presence of an unapproved drug that can result in a quantitative or qualitative change in the characteristic of the animal will be required to return all premium money and could be banned from further competition. Their name and the lab analysis will be submitted to the USDA & FDA for further investigation and possible prosecution.

Disclosure: Any animal receiving medication for any life threatening disease or illness must be registered at the time they are entered in the fair.

EXHIBITION HEALTH REQUIREMENTS FOR LIVESTOCK, POULTRY, AND EXOTIC ANIMALS

Effective: January 3, 2011

GENERAL REQUIREMENTS

1. Certificates of Veterinary Inspection and Entry Permits: "Certificate of veterinary inspection" refers to a legible record (made on an official form issued from the state of origin) by an accredited veterinarian, which shows that the animals listed thereon meet health requirements of the state of destination. It must bear the identification of each animal and separate certificates must be made for each species of animal entered. Entry permits are required on all out-of-state swine, rodeo bulls, psittacines, passerines, ratites, all other avian species except poultry and turkeys, camelids, or exotic animals. Permits are also required on all cattle entering Arkansas from any state that is not a tuberculosis free state, unless that state has a reciprocal agreement with Arkansas. Permit numbers can be obtained from the state veterinarian's office (501) 907-2400 from 8:00 a.m. – 4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday. A certificate of veterinary inspection must accompany all out-of-state animals; and
 - (a) Must be available on request by animal health officials.
 - (b) Individually identify all animals, showing positive identification of each animal by tattoo, ear tag, registration number or ear notch. Steers should be identified by description.
 - (c) Show required tests, vaccinations, and entry permit number, if applicable.
 - (d) Show name and address of owner or exhibitor – this shall be the same name as under which animals are exhibited.
2. Any animal or poultry showing any evidence of infectious or contagious disease, or of external parasitism, and animals with active ringworm lesions (with the resulting loss of hair), multiple warts easily visible without close examination, or atrophic rhinitis, will not be permitted to exhibit.

ARKANSAS LIVESTOCK

County, Jr. District, District, State Fair Level, and Other Shows

1. All animals entering the grounds, including those showing in pet zoos, children's barnyard animals, Old McDonald Farms, etc. must meet the requirements of their particular species.
2. Arkansas livestock (except for Arkansas sheep, goats, horses, steers and rabbits) must be accompanied by a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection issued within ninety (90) days prior of exhibition, showing the following:

Arkansas Cattle

1. If Arkansas is a Class Free State, Arkansas cattle are exempt from brucellosis testing. If Arkansas is not a Class Free State then the following testing requirements must be met: Negative brucellosis test within ninety (90) days prior to exhibition, for females and bulls eighteen (18) months of age and over. All heifers that have calved or are bred must be tested. Animals originating from a Certified Brucellosis Free Herd are exempt if the Certified Free Herd number is shown on certificate.
2. All heifers that are four to twelve (4-12) months of age shall be vaccinated before entering show.
3. Heifers that were born on or after January 1, 1985, that are over twelve (12) months of age and are not official calfhood vaccinates will not be allowed to show (unless they are from a Brucellosis Certified Free Herd). This will not apply if Arkansas continues as a Brucellosis Free State.
4. All rodeo stock exhibited at a rodeo in Arkansas must meet the out of state requirements for brucellosis and tuberculosis for twelve (12) month and older bulls, roping and dogging steers, and heifers even if the rodeo stock originates from Arkansas. Tie down roping calves are exempt from the tuberculosis testing requirements. The exception is CVI within the state is good for ninety (90) days instead of (30) days.

Health Requirements

Arkansas Swine

1. As of July 1, 2001, all swine must have an official premise identification.
2. Animals six (6) months old or older to be tested negative for brucellosis within ninety (90) days of the exhibition or originate directly out of a Validated Herd, with Validation number and date of last herd test shown on certificate (barrows exempt from brucellosis testing, but must be pseudorabies tested).
3. Animals to be tested negative for pseudorabies regardless of age within (90) days of exhibition on a test approved by the state veterinarian or originate directly out of a Qualified Pseudorabies Free Herd, with Qualified Herd number and date of last test shown on certificate.
4. Free of other contagious, infectious, and communicable diseases (erysipelas, atrophic rhinitis, etc.); otherwise they will not be allowed to show and will be released from fairgrounds.

Arkansas Sheep and Goats

Exhibition officials must maintain records of all sheep and goats that are exhibited for a period of five years, to include:

- (a) Identification Number
- (b) Flock status as defined by the Voluntary Flock Certification Program
- (c) The name, complete address and phone number of the owner.

All instate sheep and goats in the state of Arkansas must be identified by an official USDA tag (scrapie tag) or for goats a legible official goat registry tattoo if accompanied by a registration certificate.

Fair personnel, veterinarians, or state-federal personnel may examine sheep on grounds. Any sheep showing clinical symptoms of Scrapie shall be immediately quarantined in isolation and required to undergo any approved diagnostic tests and shall be consigned to slaughter or destruction with submission of tissues to an approved diagnostic laboratory at the exhibitor's expense.

Commingle (as defined by the Arkansas Scrapie Regulation) of sheep or goats of different flock status as defined by the Voluntary Flock Certification Program (VFCP) is prohibited and must be reported to the VFCP state official and State Veterinarian.

No sheep or goats showing symptoms of disease, particularly foot rot, sore mouth, sheep pox, evidence of fungal infection, evidence of abscesses or with draining abscesses will be allowed to show and may be released by fair officials, veterinarians, or state-federal personnel.

Arkansas Rabbits

Rabbits will be inspected on grounds. No rabbits showing symptoms of disease will be allowed to show.

Arkansas Horses

Negative EIA test required within the past twelve (12) months for all animals over six (6) months of age. Nursing foals under six (6) months of age are exempt from testing if accompanied by negative tested dams. Photocopies of the test papers will not be accepted; carbon copies are acceptable.

Arkansas Poultry

An official representing the exhibition shall notify the state veterinarian no later than thirty (3) days prior to the exhibition, giving names, place, inclusive dates, and time of the event.

The requirements are as follows:

1. All in-state poultry, which includes domesticated game birds, quail, pheasants, peafowl, guineas, and turkeys, present at exhibition in Arkansas shall have originated from U.S. Pullorum-Typhoid Clean or equivalent flocks or have had a negative pullorum-typhoid test within ninety (90) days of the movement to the exhibition (pullorum-typhoid testing on fairgrounds during the fair is prohibited). This information will be documented on a NPIP Form US 9-3, 90 Day Certificate, NPIP Flock Certification Form or similar certificate which will accompany the poultry during the exhibition.
2. All non-certified birds must be banded (leg or wing band), with a sealed band. Wrap-around plastic bands are not acceptable. In-state waterfowl are exempt from pullorum-typhoid requirements.
3. Any poultry showing evidence of infectious or contagious disease or insect infestation will not be permitted to exhibit.
4. Record Keeping – The sponsor of the exhibition shall compile a list of all poultry present at exhibition. This list shall contain the name and address of each owner, the number, the species, breed, variety, type, sex, and pullorum-typhoid status of all poultry present. A copy of this shall be retained by the sponsor of the exhibition for at least twelve (12) months.

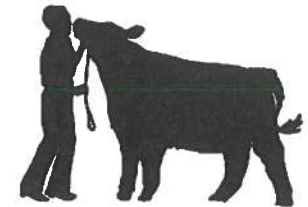

REGULATIONS

1. Livestock will be received on the fairgrounds from 8:00 a.m. until 12 noon on Wednesday.
2. Animals will be judged Thursday, starting at 9:00 a.m.
3. Only first place winners in single heifer classes may compete for Champions and only Champions may compete for Supreme Champion Heifer and Reserve Supreme Champion Heifer of the current year of the Yell County Fair.
4. Any artificial means of removing or remedying physical defects of conformation in exhibition animals, such as lifting or filling under the skin, will be considered a fraud and deception. All animals giving evidence of such treatment will be barred from exhibition at the Fairs and at all Fairs holding membership in the International Association of Fairs and Expositions.
5. Only purebred, pureblood (one purebred parent) livestock with a copy of the certificate of registry will be accepted to show.
6. If only one entry in a breed, that entry will be shown in an All Other Breeds (AOB) class.
7. Belt Buckles will be awarded to the Supreme Champion Heifer & Supreme Reserve Heifer. Registered and Commercial Heifers will compete for these awards.
8. Premium will be paid for the top 6 places in the Supreme Heifer Drive. If an exhibitor has more than one heifer in the supreme drive, they will only collect the premium for their highest placing heifer. They may receive placing honor but premium will step down to next heifer placing. 1st Place \$1000 2nd Place \$750 3rd Place \$500 4th Place \$300 5th Place \$250 6th Place \$175 (Premiums will be paid if donations are available)
9. Belt Buckles will be awarded to the Grand Champion Bull and the Reserve Champion Bull, Junior Division only.
10. The exhibitor must be able to exhibit their livestock without assistance in the ring. If any animal(s) gets loose three (3) times or poses a continuous threat to other exhibitor(s) the staff has the option to excuse them from the ring, and forfeit winnings, placings, and awards. Decisions made on this matter by the Yell County Fair Staff are not eligible for protest.

DEPARTMENT 5 – JUNIOR LIVESTOCK MARKET SHOW & PREMIUM SALE

The following regulations apply to all six Market Livestock Shows:

- Exhibitors may show in each of the 6 categories; however, they will be allowed to sell only one animal in the Premium Sale – one lamb, one steer, one hog, or one goat, one rabbit, one poultry
- Only the exhibitor will be allowed in the ring with animal during the show.
- Belt Buckles will be awarded to the Grand and Reserve Grand Champions in each category.
- The sale is for PREMIUM ONLY. ONLY the TOP EIGHT (8) market animals in lambs, steers, swine, and goats and the top 2 in Meat Rabbits, Single Fryer, and 4-H Poultry Chain will sell.**
- Health requirements will be enforced as stated in the front of this book.
- There will be a 1% tolerance in weights to allow for scale error excluding poultry and rabbits. If animal does not meet required weight (under or over) the exhibitor will be given a weigh card with time weighed, animal weight, and re-weigh time posted on the card. Re-weigh will be one hour from initial weigh time. Animal must stay in designated area, animals will not be allowed outside of barn. Animals are not allowed in wash pens or wash racks. Drenching is NOT allowed. Exhibitor will only be allowed one reweigh. At this time a final decision will be made to determine if animal will be allowed to show. If the animal weight is not within tolerance it will be disqualified and not allowed to compete in show or Premium Sale. The exhibitor, a parent, 4-H leader, or Ag instructor, MUST be present during re-weigh.
- All animals in premium sale will be sold by the head.
- The highest placing junior market animal, when sale order is selected, that has entered as a Yell County Bred & Born animal will be declared the Yell County Bred & Born Champion. Yell County Bred & Born animal must be Bred, Born, & Raised in Yell County.
- If an animal is disqualified for any reason the exhibitor would be ineligible for add-on money for the animal.

SECTION A – MARKET LAMBS

Superintendent: Kiley Tippin

- Minimum weight: 80 lbs.
- Only ewe or wether lambs, no ram lambs.
- All lambs MUST have baby teeth.
- Animals shown in Market Lamb Show are not eligible to be shown in the breeding classes.
- Animals must be shown without a halter.

Junior Market Livestock Show & Premium Sale

SECTION B—MARKET STEERS

Superintendent: Jeff Montgomery

- Minimum weight: 850 lbs.
- Only steers of beef type breeding will be accepted.
- Steers must be halter broken before the show.
- A Steer Gainability Award in the amount of \$100 will be given to the steer with the highest average daily gain from the initial weigh-in to fair date. The steer must qualify to show to be eligible to receive the Steer Gainability Award.
- If a steer does not make the minimum weight of 850 lbs, they will be eligible to be shown in the prospect steer class. Prospect steers will not be eligible for the premium sale. Prospect Steers will receive class ribbons 1st, 2nd, 3rd, 4th, etc only. No Grand or Reserve
- Prospect steers can be shown in showmanship.

SECTION C—MARKET SWINE

Superintendent: Patricia Holiman

- Minimum weight: 180 lbs. Maximum weight: 280 lbs.
- Only barrow or gilt hogs under one year of age are allowed; no boars or sows.
- All market swine MUST be ear notched (permanent identification).
- Ear notches MUST be included on entry forms.
- Exhibitors MUST be present and drive his or her own animal into show ring for sale order.
- Pens, assigned area, and swine must be kept clean and orderly at all times.
- Market hogs that do not meet the required weights to compete in the market hog show will be eligible to show in the over and under class. This class will be for ribbons only and will be held following sale order. No add ons These Market Hogs must meet all other entry requirements to be eligible.

SECTION D—MARKET GOATS

Superintendent: Justin Sheets

- Minimum weight: 30 lbs.
- The market goat show is for does and wethers.
- Goats may have horns, but must be tipped.
- All entries must have baby teeth.

SECTION E—POULTRY CHAIN GRAND & RESERVE

- Must have current year's 4-H Poultry Chain Chickens to enter this class.

SECTION F—MEAT RABBIT PEN GRAND & RESERVE SINGLE FRYER GRAND & RESERVE

- CLASS 1: Meat Pen (defined):** A meat pen will consist of three rabbits of the same color, preferably of the same breed, but mixed breeds will be acceptable. The animals must weigh at least 3.5 pounds and no more than 5.5 pounds each; and not be over ten (10) weeks of age. Animals may come from different litters. Please remember that they should look like triplets. Only ONE meat pen per Junior exhibitor may be shown.
- CLASS 2: Single Fryer JUNIORS ONLY (defined):** One rabbit not over 10 weeks of age. It must weigh at least 3.5 pounds and no more than 5.5 pounds.
- All meat pens and singles fryers MUST be weighed in the presence of a judge.
- All other rabbit regulations also apply under Department 6, see page 34.

DEPARTMENT 7 – POULTRY

REGULATIONS

1. Entries will be taken from 9 am to 4 pm Tuesday. Poultry **MUST** be in coops by 4 pm or they will be considered **NOT** entered.
2. All birds must be entered in owner's name.
3. Exhibitors may enter one of every variety per breed per class.
4. Trio class entries are two females and one male bird of the same breed and variety.
5. "Display" for the Yell County Fair will be defined as one entry in each of the following classes: 1, 2, 3, 4, 5 or 6.
6. As required by a regulation adopted in 1985, all poultry exhibits in fairs must be accompanied by a health certificate showing that they have been tested for Pullorum and found negative or a document showing they originated in Pullorum Free flocks, which have been tested according to the National Poultry Improvement Plan. **NOTE: Pullorum testing will be conducted on Saturday, July 18th, 2026 and July 25th, 2026 at the Danville City Park from 8 am to 12 pm. Birds MUST be tested BEFORE online registration ends on July 31st, 2026.**
8. Exhibitors will provide their own feed and are responsible for feeding and watering their birds. The show will not be responsible for loss or damage to birds, however, an attendant will be in charge throughout the show. Sick birds will not be accepted.
9. Judging will be held on Wednesday at 9:00 a.m. with showmanship judging to follow after all birds are judged. All birds will be judged by the Standard of Perfection and Utility qualities.
9. Premiums will be paid on a point basis. If only one entry is made in a class, payment will be made on second place point value.
10. All poultry will be released to owners on Saturday from 8 am to 12 pm if you are **NOT** in the premium sale. All coops & cups must be cleaned by the exhibitor & then inspected by the superintendent to be checked out of the barn. If you are not checked out by 12 noon, your birds must stay until the 9 pm checkout. If you are in the premium sale, your check out time is 9 pm.
11. **Only one impartial person (no poultry exhibitors) will accompany the Judge during Poultry Judging.**
12. **NO** substitutions or changes after the online registration closes.
13. There will be one (1) Poultry Junior Herdsman Award given.
14. Prizes will be awarded to the Showmanship winners in the Peewee, Junior, and Senior Divisions.

- Only one rabbit may be shown per breed and variety in each class under Sections A, B, C and D.
- Contact the superintendent if a rabbit needs to be scratched from a class before show day.
- NO substitutions. It is suggested that exhibitors enter extra rabbits for substitution purposes due to illness or death. Rules 5 and 6 still apply. These rabbits must be the same breed, gender, and age of the rabbit to be replaced.
- Judging will begin at 5 pm on Tuesday, September 8th, 2026. Each Rabbit will be judged using the ARBA Standard of Perfection and Utility qualities.
- All sections will be shown by Breed and Age.
- First and Second place rabbits of each Section Breed will be eligible for Grand Champion of that section.
- There will be one Best of Show Rabbit for the Junior Division and one Best of Show for the Open Division. In each Division, Grand Champion Rabbits from Sections A, B, C and D will be eligible for Best of Show. Junior Best of Show winner will receive a Buckle. Open Best of Show winner will receive a Banner.
- Premiums will be paid on a point basis listed under each section.
- If a breed in a class has 2 or less entries, they will be combined with other low entry classes to form an AOB (All Other Breeds) class by sex and age.
- Owners MUST supply water bottles and feed cups.
- Exhibitors are responsible for feeding and watering their rabbits.

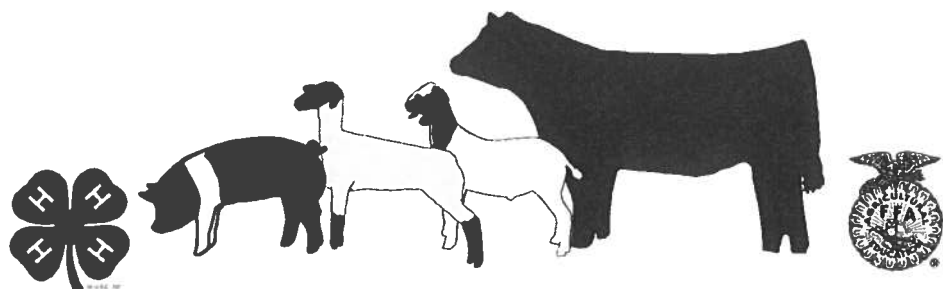

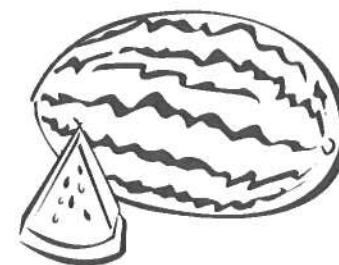

5. Only one article in each class may be entered by an exhibitor. Articles or exhibits may be entered only one year – not eligible for future fairs.
6. AWARDS: youth under age 5 will receive participation ribbons only. Youth ages 5-19 will receive points for premiums and will be eligible for Sweepstakes. Sweepstakes are awarded in each Department to individuals with the highest number of points.
7. Best of Show Ribbon will be awarded to youths (ages 5-12), juniors (ages 13-19), and seniors (adults) in each department.

Project entries must be in place in the commercial building **September 7, 2026 (Monday)** by **6:00 p.m.**

Judging will take place on Tuesday 1:00 p.m. to 6 p.m. week of the fair.

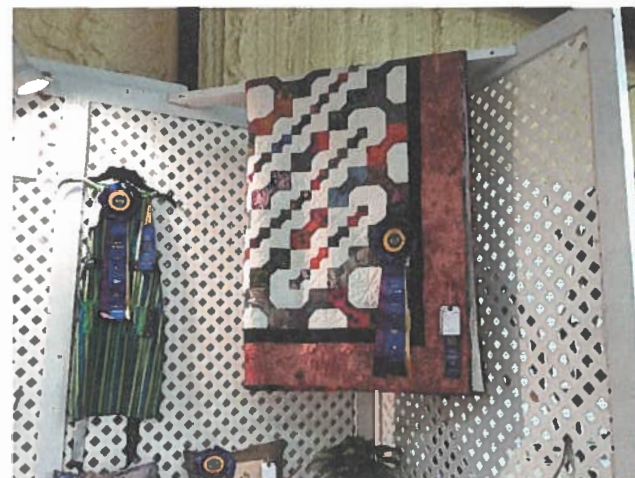

9. Class Definitions:
Drop Cookie - Cookies made from a relatively soft dough that is dropped by spoonful onto the baking sheet. During baking, the mounds of dough spread and flatten. An example: Chocolate Chip Cookies.
Bar Cookie - consist of batter or other ingredients that are poured or pressed into a pan and cut into cookie-sized pieces after baking. An example: Brownies
Rolled Cookies - Cookies made from a stiffer dough that is rolled out and cut into shapes with a cookie cutter. An example: Sugar cookies.
