

The spirit of the Lord ignites us to gather together in worship to sing psalms and spiritual songs as we receive God's gifts and give thanks for all that God has provided, calling us out of darkness into unending light. In every age, God blesses all creation in his raising up new hymnwriters to create rich, fresh expressions of dignified praise, and as a result most of our hymnals, among various denominations, provide a healthy variety of psalms and hymns from many ages and lands.

We have an opportunity to gather at the church of our well-known and gracious resident composer, Evelyn Larter, on October 15 at 4 PM, Deerfield Presbyterian Church, 530 Old Deerfield Pike, Bridgeton. Evelyn is certain to deliver to us the sacrament of sound. Always gracious, thoughtful and creative, she has an unique skill of maintaining a concert ministry in a rural setting, which is a challenge, but she continues to offer good quality music, and for this, people will come. Beyond doubt, those who attend will be bathed in the glory of well-planned and appropriate sounds of sublime dignity and praise. This service of worship is most appropriate for each of us to invite our pastors to attend. Mine are coming, as is our deacon, and I'm taking them to dinner afterwards. October is clergy appreciation month, and the specific day is the second Sunday in October. Stretch it to the third Sunday and join us.

On Saturday, October 28, we have a high honor to participate in a master class led by Nathan Laube, who teaches organ at the Eastman School of Music. We gather to begin at 10 AM at Haddonfield United Methodist Church, 2 Warwick Rd. Two volunteers have stepped forward to play, with this invitation for two more. Please email me and Matt Smith (Idorg59@yahoo.com and msmith@haddonfieldumc.org) by Tuesday, October 10, if you are willing to play a composition not exceeding 10 minutes in length, with the title and composer. You will need to arrange practice time with Matt Smith at HUMC. A master class may be considered as basically a public lesson. The performer openly shares a work that speaks strongly to him or her, and the guest artist gives feedback, recognizing strong points and making suggestions; this gives both the performer and the observers an opportunity to develop interpretations for various outcomes. Nathan Laube then performs a recital Sunday evening, October 29 at 7 pm at the church, followed by an international home-made light buffet.

- On a recent trip to an organ lesson, my car windshield is cracked by a stone flung from a quarry truck. The cost of windshield replacement would have paid for three more organ lessons....
- Organ lessons taken in one's 60's consist mostly of reminding me of things I used to know but since forgot, or things I have simply gotten
 lazy about....
- Church attendance has dwindled over the summer and Labor Day weekend arrives. Instead of poor attendance, <u>everyone</u> shows up and the church runs out of bulletins....
- A church member awards "merits" for recent hymn selections. Teasing, I tell him I'll be sure to schedule some <u>de</u>merit-worthy hymns.
 Can't leave a positive balance sitting there unused.
- I have concluded that pipe organs are grumpy sentient beings who worship Murphy (Murphy's Law) as their god. There is no limit to the number and creative variety of minor malfunctions an aging pipe organ can devise....
- The rank of reeds most frequently needing tuning is in the highest and least accessible position in the organ. It's probably also the rank that contributes most to the organ's ensemble...
- Some singers sound flat even when they are dead-on pitch.....
- The best air circulation in the church is right by the organ console. So good, that pages on the music rack flip over in the breeze....
- A mediocre organ that you once played sounds better when you haven't heard it for 20 years.

Our November meeting, to benefit Maui fire victims is well on its way of development. A poster is included in this newsletter from which you can create hard copies and circulate to your choir members. We will co-sponsor this event with the local county chorus. A hymn festival is successful with a full church of people to sing the hymns, in parts, canon, unison, with specified patterns, etc. contingent on the prepared arrangement. We have instrumentalists and Orff Instruments lined up for inclusion to provide a diversified inclusive for all Judaic and Christian faiths, largely based on various psalm texts. Approximately 10 hymns are simmering now. Prior to each hymn, a brief text reflection will be read. Please plan to bring choir members so that some stanzas in parts will be of joyous success. Since the festival will conclude at approximately 5:15, no food and drink reception will be held as that would be dinner hour.

An additional choir member request: February 3 is our target date for a vocal and choral health seminar to be presented by Mrs. Lauren Athey-Janka, our newest full time voice instructor at Rowan University. We are hoping for attendance of 30 with somewhat even distribution of voicings. A portion of the seminar will be given to some preparation of two compositions we plan to present at our April 14 choral festival at First Presbyterian Church in Bridgeton, using the same choristers. SouthWest Jersey Chapter Scholarship Program

Our chapter's scholarship program exists to serve area congregations by increasing the number of capable organists and to insure the continuation of the classical church music profession.

As a reminder, the program is structured as 14 one-hour lessons scheduled at the mutual convenience of the instructor and student, ideally on the organ where the student practices, or at least one a month where the student practices. The lessons and public jury must take place within 4 months. The practice instrument must have a minimum of two 61-note keyboards and a concave, radiating 32-note pedalboard, with all keys functioning. The student must have legs long enough to reach the pedalboard and have intermediate piano skills (meaning and understanding of meter signatures, chords, key signatures, and the ability to read G and F clefs).

The audition for this program is on piano. Applicants will be asked to prepare and perform a simple Bach keyboard work, also one movement of a sonata by Mozart, Haydn, Beethoven, Clementi, or Kuhnau, and also one hymn written in traditional four-part harmony. The applicant will be asked to sight-read two short pieces; one will be in common meter.

At the conclusion of the 14 one hour lessons, a jury is required with the teacher and at least two additional chapter members present. The jury will consist of the following:

Two of these three chorales: Ein feste Burg, Lobe den Herren, Herzlich tut mir verlangen

A hymn will be sight-read, pedaling not required

The tune *Old Hundredth* in any of its traditional forms, copy provided to the committee

One pedal alone passage of a chorale, minimum 15 measures A trio chorale

A prelude or fugue from the collection Eight Little Preludes and Fugues

The instructor is appointed by the local chapter. Accepted applicants are responsible for securing a pair of Organmaster shoes and required music. Instruction may happen any time provided all activities are completed within four months. Candidates of all ages who meet the above criteria are welcome. 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In Memoriam

Alan Woodruff

Jon "Alan" Woodruff, age 87, passed away peacefully on September 3, surrounded by his family at Maurice House in Millville. Alan was a lifelong resident of Upper Deerfield Township, and an undisputed pillar of the Cumberland County and South Jersey communities for all of his adult life. He served on the board of the Woodruff United Methodist Church, the church his grandfather founded, and was the church organist (unpaid) for 60 years. In their later years, Alan and Gussie were proud members of Deerfield Presbyterian Church. He was a trustee of the George J. Woodruff Collection of Native American artifacts collected by his father, one of the largest in the country, and now on display at the Bridgeton Library. Alan was passionate about all forms of music and was a member of the American Guild of Organists for many years. In addition to playing the organ, he was an accomplished pianist but most of all he was a prodigious collector of all forms of recorded music. His collection of LPs, CDs and tapes, plus his home audio system was amazing and he loved sharing it with anyone who loved music


Alan was a supporter and board member of the Bay Atlantic Symphony, rarely missing a performance. Alan loved his country. He was an accomplished historian and collector of World War II literature. He was also generous to many, many organizations in the greater Philadelphia area and the nation

Preceded in death by his daughter Sonya, he is survived by his beloved wife Ethel, son Dana, daughter Lavonne; Grandsons Jeremy, Alexander, and Eric, Granddaughters Adriel, McKenzie, and Elaine, and 2 Great-Grandchildren.

Report from Executive Committee Meeting

The chapter Executive Committee met via Zoom on Monday evening, September 25.

Treasurer Chuck Gibson reported on fund balances and recent financial transactions including our chapter's donation to the AGO Annual Fund.

Sub Dean Larry DePasquale reported on our chapter's Ukraine Benefit Concert at Haddonfield United Methodist on September 17, which yielded donations of \$1,942 to the United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR) for Ukrainian relief. Larry then presented the all the remaining programs planned for 2023-24. The Committee voted to approve the spring 2024 programs (fall 2023 programs had been previously approved.)

Dean Jonathan Stark discussed some of the challenges involved in producing the recently distributed chapter Directory.
