What's She Got That I Ain't Got?

Anna Lapwood was here in America this month. Perhaps you have not heard of her? In a nutshell Anna Lapwood is a British concert organist, broadcaster, social media influencer, and university director of music. To some "social media influencer" can mean "all hat and no cattle." But that doesn't apply to Anna Lapwood. She is the real deal.

Anna Lapwood studied at Magdalen College, Oxford, where she was the first woman ever to receive an organ scholarship. At age 21 she became the youngest person in history appointed as director of music at an Oxbridge college when she became Director of Music at Pembroke College, Cambridge. She is an Associate Artist at Royal Albert Hall. She is a composer, and has created organ transcriptions of challenging works such as Britten's *Four Sea Interludes*. Besides organ, she plays piano, violin, viola, and harp; she was a harpist in the National Youth Orchestra of Great Britain. She was appointed MBE last year for her services to music. She's now 28.

Take-aways from the Vocal/Choir Workshop with Lauren Athey-Janka—by Marilyn Rabbai

On Sunday afternoon, April 9, we gathered at Pitman United Methodist Church for a vocal pedagogy workshop presented by Professor Lauren Athey-Janka of Rowan University. As participants introduced themselves, we could see how diverse our comparative experiences were, with varied backgrounds in singing, conducting, and accompanying.

Our common goal was to learn more about healthy vocal production in the choral rehearsal, and Professor Athey -Janka was a passionately articulate advocate for healthy singing. She talked about her journey as a performer and educator, adding a personal note to some of the highlights listed in her extensive resume. Her explanation of the systems of the voice illustrated how those systems are optimally engaged to produce sound. She described singing as "a full-bodied experience," and explained the many factors that affect our production of vocal sound.

Particularly helpful were her demonstrations and suggestions for warm-ups, rehearsal techniques, exercises, and diagnostic tools. The interactive structure of this workshop allowed us to practice some of the basic ideas, ask questions and seek solutions for specific challenges we encounter in our rehearsals.

Professor Athey-Janka also talked about articulation, pronunciation, texts in multiple languages, and vocal physiology, providing a wonderful multi-page handout to help us remember key concepts. We had an opportunity to talk with her at the chili-fueled fellowship following the workshop.

On April 8 Ms. Lapwood played a recital on the 137 rank Mander organ at Princeton University Chapel. I attended with my colleague Erica Rose Smith who noted "Anna Lapwood was her version of Taylor Swift." The recital started at 8pm, the Chapel doors opened at 7pm, and Erica urged me to get us there early. Erica was right; when we arrived at 6:35, there were already 75 people lined up outside. A steady stream of concertgoers kept coming, by 8pm every pew in the Chapel was occupied. The Chapel officially seats 2,000. I estimate that there were close to 1,000 people there. Have you been to many organ recitals lately that drew 1,000 people?

Ms. Lapwood played pieces by living composers Kristina Arakelyan and Philip Glass, three movements from Hans Zimmer's score for the movie Interstellar, a Suite by Florence Price, and her own transcription of Debussy's Clair de Lune. And as if to prove her mastery of "conventional" repertoire, she also played Durufle's Prelude et fugue sur le nom d'Alain. She explored the full gamut of registrations on the big Mander organ. Her technique is brilliant, her musicianship is impeccable.

So what? Look at the ads for concert management agencies in TAO and you'll see many organists with brilliant technique and impeccable musicianship. Last year I attended a recital by Levente Kuzma in Philadelphia. Mr. Kuzma played Liszt's Variations on Weinen, Klagen, Sorgen, Zagen on a Fisk tracker—not the most congenial instrument for Liszt's music—and gave a dazzling performance. There were 35 people there.

Yes, Anna Lapwood is young and blonde and pretty, and has a charming (to American ears) RP accent. She's warm and engaging and personable. But I,000 people didn't turn out just to see an attractive young Englishwoman with a congenial personality. What's she really got that others ain't got?

Here's a clue: as an encore, Ms. Lapwood offered the audience a choice between something from *Phantom of the Opera* and *Test Drive* from *How to Train Your Dragon* (composer John Powell). *Test Drive* was the overwhelming audience choice. And her performance was greeted by enormous audience approval. Anna Lapwood understands how to connect with non-organists, and even with non-musicians.

In the early 20th century Edwin Lemare was the most highly paid organist of his day, sometimes playing for audiences of 10,000. Much of what he played were orchestral transcriptions and his own light and popular compositions. It's no coincidence that Lemare's time was also the zenith of public esteem for the pipe organ. Anna Lapwood is showing us something important. Will we pay heed?



Purpose

The organ scholarship awarded by the AGO is necessary in order:

- To serve the congregations by increasing the roster of capable organists.
- To foster an appreciation for sacred classical organ repertoire.
- To encourage more musicians to meet the standards and ideals of the American Guild of Organists.
- To ensure the continuation of the church music profession.

History

In the 1980's a decline in the number of qualified organists and in the number of new organ students became a concern for churches and Guild chapters across the country. Inspired by an innovative "floating organ academy" begun in South Dakota and described in an article in The American Organist, AGO member Helen Taylor founded the Southwest Jersey Organ Scholarship program in 1988 as a way to help solve this problem. The first committee members were Marilyn Rabbai, Barbara Knight, Joyce Ann Routon, and Larry DePasquale.

Since its inception, more than two dozen organists have successfully completed the program. Many of these new organists have gone on to successful careers in area churches.

The Southwest Jersey Chapter is pleased to continue this tradition of service to its churches and to the art of organ playing.

AGO Code of Ethics

Approved by the AGO National Council January 27, 2017

Preamble/Preface

The American Guild of Organists encourages its members to embrace and practice the following values as core ideals that Guild members aspire to cultivate in their ethical and professional conduct.

Value 1. Responsible Conduct toward Those Whom We Serve (including but not limited to clergy, supervisors, congregants, choir members, students, children, et al.). Members shall:

- Treat those whom they serve in a professional manner, with dignity, compassion, civility, and respect.
- Show respect to those whom they serve, regardless of race, ethnicity, religion, age, gender, gender identity, sexual orientation, marrial status, socio-economic status, disability, or medical condition.
- Avoid any sort of abusive behavior, whether verbal physical, sexual, psychological, emotional, or other.
- o Refrain from disclosing confidential or sensitive information about others obtained in the course of professional service, unless disclosure serves a compelling professional purpose or is required by law.

Value 2. Respect for Our Professional Colleagues. Members shall:

- Maintain a professional attitude and act with integrity in relationships with colleagues, regardless of race, ethnicity, religion, age, gender, gender identity, sexual orientation, marital status, socio-economic status, disability, or medical condition.
- Respect the reputation and diversity of colleagues.

Value 3. Integrity in Our Professional Work. Members shall:

- Honor and abide by the conditions and requirements of the job descriptions and work agreements to which they have knowingly agreed, so long as those provisions are in accord with all applicable federal, state and local have.
- Follow, as applicable, the principles of professional conduct that are expressed in the AGO Code of Professional Standards.
- o For the benefit of future generations of musicians and to preserve the instruments of our profession, use care to ensure that when playing an instrument, the institution's or peeted practices and requirements for the care of the instrument and its venes are met.

The Scholarship

The Organ Scholarship of the Southwest Jersey Chapter of the American Guild of Organists provides a term of 14 introductory organ lessons for qualified persons wishing to begin study of the organ.

Eligibility

All applicants must possess the following qualifications:

- Must reside in the Southwest Jersey geographical area.
- Must have received little or no previous formal classical organ training.
- Legs must be long enough to reach the pedalboard.
- At least an intermediate piano proficiency (see audition requirements below).
- Basic knowledge of theory, including G and F clefs, key signatures, meter signatures, and chords.
- Must have access to an organ on which to practice. The organ console must either 1) conform to AGO standards having at least two 61-note manuals and a full pedalboard, or 2) conform to historical mechanical action standards.
- Must commit to completing 14 fessons and the jury within four to six months.

In addition to the application form, applicants are asked to include on a separate sheet a brief statement of their goals and objectives for study and a summary of their musical background and experience.

The Audition

The audition is scheduled once the application has been received.. Auditions will be played on the piano. No memorization is required.

Prepared pieces

- Any Bach Two-Part Invention or one selection from the Anna Magdalena Notebook
- One movement from a sonatina by Mozart, Haydn, Beethoven, Clementi, or Kuhnau
- One frymn written in traditional four-part harmony

Sight-reading

 Two short pieces: one in common time, the other in another meter

The Lessons

Lessons are arranged at the mutual convenience of the teacher and student, ideally on the organ where the student practices. In any event, at least one lesson per month will take place on the organ where the student practices.

Students will fearn how to practice and will become acquainted with registration, articulation, and pedaling, through the practice and preparation of hymns, teaching pieces, and

SFORZANDO

Students will be required to have appropriate shoes (as recommended by their teacher) before the second lesson.

Students will provide at their expense the necessary hymnal and books required by the teacher. (Generally hymnals may be borrowed from the student's church.) Photocopied music is illegal, contrary to the Guild's Code of Ethics, and may not be used.

The Jury

At the conclusion of the 14 weeks of study, the student will be required to play before a jury: Two of the following four-part hymns (at least one of the hymns must be played with pedal):

Nicaea Lobe den Herren Ein feste Burg Olivet Hymn to Joy New Britain (Amazing Grace) Herzlich tut mich verlangen • The Doxology (Old Hundredth) in any of the standard forms

(Passion Chorale)

- One pedal-alone passage of a Bach chorale or from a method book, at least 16 measures long
- A trio exercise or a chorale trio
- A prelude or fugue from Bach's Eight Little Preludes and Fugues


