

where she'll start a new church organist position in October. Imagine how surprised I was when, attending a youth production of Sister Act at Haddonfield United Methodist in August, someone tapped me on the shoulder, and it was Misty Fiske (now Misty Pottorff). A former member of our chapter, Misty moved to Delaware last year, but was back in NJ to play keyboards in the pit orchestra of the Sister Act production. It was great to see her.

But change can also be devastating. I imagine everyone grieves the unexpected passing of Cathy O'Neill as much as I do. Cathy was a wonderful friend, who I could always count on to help me put difficulties and unexpected road-blocks in perspective. She had a dry and irreverent wit, and didn't suffer fools gladly, but she also had a huge heart. As much as I grieve the loss of a friend, I also see a big challenge ahead for our chapter, a challenge we must rise to meet.

Cathy O'Neill played three major roles in our chapter. She was our Secretary, an elected office. She was our hospitality chairperson, ensuring that refreshments were provided (or providing them herself) at Chapter events. And thirdly, she was our Cares and Concerns Coordinator, sending greetings to shut-ins and new members. It was this last role that was Cathy's most important work. Cares and Concerns is not just a job, it's a calling to compassion and service. Cathy's work here was the glue that binds us together, the lifeblood that allows our chapter to transcend being merely an organization and become a family of people working together to employ the art of music for a higher purpose.

Concerning the office of Secretary, the AGO national bylaws require all chapters to elect a Secretary. We cannot do business as a chapter without a Secretary. The Executive Committee will soon seek to appoint an Acting Secretary to fill the rest of Cathy's term, but who? The Secretary's work is not onerous: taking minutes at four Executive Committee meetings a year and occasionally writing official correspondence on behalf of the chapter. Is this something you could do? If so, please contact me.

Summer is a time to recharge our batteries, and I hope you all had the opportunity for some recreation and recharging. I sang in the chorus of Delaware Valley Opera Company's production of Purcell's Dido and Aeneas, performances just concluded last week. A Tribute to Catherine O'Neill - by Gail Gassaway

Cathy was raised Roman Catholic and had attended Catholic schools from kindergarten through high school in the Trenton area. (Recently, she had attended the fiftieth anniversary of her high school graduation.) After high school, she studied organ at Glassboro State College under Dennis Elwell. She continued that study with Dennis at Overbrook Presbyterian church.

When a fulltime job opportunity presented itself, she moved to Texas to work in the management side of healthcare. Most of her days were spent crossing the country to service various heath agencies. She would return on weekends to receive the attention of her beloved dog Anakin.

I met Cathy thirteen years ago when she returned from living in San Antonio. We immediately shared a passion for finding music that our choirs could sing, and for traveling- anywhere as long as there was food to eat.

Our first trip was to a January Jubilee in Baltimore, MD. After spending the night, we awoke to an ice storm. Upon arrival at the church, we crossed the icy parking lot and reached the shelter of the building. We were rewarded by a day filled with wonderful workshops and worship experiences led by Bob Hobby and Wayne Wold.

From then on, we focused on finding new places to explore music. Augsburg Fortress's summer clinics were always a given. We also attended Joseph Martin's Delaware reading sessions, as well as those in Lititz, PA (Loser Music). We also attended several reading sessions at St. Matthew Lutheran Church in Hanover, PA, where it always seemed to snow on our way home!

While in Texas, Cathy served Mt. Olive Lutheran Church (Missouri Synod) for 27 years, so it seemed natural to pursue another Lutheran position here. She played for a short time in Millville before assuming the organist position at St. James Lutheran Church in Pitman, NJ. It was here that she "officially" became a Lutheran. At St. James she served on the church council as its secretary and often counted the Sunday offering with the treasurer.

Cathy's mother was a forming force in her life. It was her mother who offered Cathy the chance to visit Paris for her sixteenth birthday, to which, without hesitation, she said "yes." It was her memories of that trip that inspired her to accompany me on a 13 day trip to Germany, Austria and Hungary. We were part of a choral group that sang in several churches, including St. Stephen's in Vienna. While in Budapest, we struck out on our own to find the three story shopping mall that the guide was never going to find. Of course, we did find it and spent several hours enjoying the many beautiful things that were there.

Travel-travel-travel! Not only did we engage in music travel, but we carefully checked the schedule of CandBea Travel to find interesting places and events. Sight and Sound adventures were always a must. Upon arrival, Cathy would always search for Christmas presents for her church friends in Texas. After the shows, we would enjoy lunch at Shady Maple because Cathy loved their ham balls. Of course, the fact that there was a large shopping area beneath the restaurant didn't hurt.

In the last year Cathy watched over me as I recovered from hip surgery while we traveled to Valparaiso University in Indiana for an ALCM (Association of Lutheran Church Musicians) conference, to Peddlers' Village, and to Vermont to ride the cog railroad to the top of Mount Washington. We were fortunate to have the best weather possible on Mt. Washington. The temperature was warm, with moderate wind and sunny skies. The week before it had snowed at the top.

Cathy's favorite trip was to the Von Trapp family compound in Vermont, where she got to hear about their story from the real family. She would always say that the truth was not quite what the movie had portrayed.

The last outing we attended was a performance of "Come from Afar" at the Academy of Music. It was a wonderful day with good food, great seats and an amazing cast.

It was so unfortunate that she had such a traumatic accident. Her stay in rehab was very difficult, but she had several good friends who supported her with visits and food.

We know that she arrived in heaven with her nails done, her "roots" taken care of and her Easter outfit adorning her body — because, as she always said: "my mother raised a lady."



In 1972, Joel Krott became the organist and choir director of FPC Moorestown. For fifty-three years, Joel has relentlessly pursued the glory of God through the ministry of music. From the start, Joel offered his exceptional musical gifts in worship, Sunday after Sunday. He's taught choral music to children, youth and adults, but always by teaching the Word of God first. He's coordinated choir retreats and concerts and four trips to Denmark. Five years ago, Joel and Sandra, his wonderful wife, began a Discovery Bible Study with high school and middle school students to guide them into a life of discipleship. Joel has served God and His people faithfully and effectively for six decades.

The next time you're in the book of Psalms, notice how often the words "sing" and "singing" appear. God's people sing. We sing because we're invited to, commanded to do so. Even the untrained, and ungifted singers like me sing God's praises. For more than a half century, Joel Krott persistently and tirelessly helped us to sing. The very last word of the Psalter is a final command to sing. "Let everything that breathes sing praises to the Lord! Praise the Lord!" There's no more fitting word to celebrate Joel Krott. An Unexpected Treat! - by Evelyn Larter

In mid-July I drove up to New Hampshire to visit an elderly friend in the Hanover area, and on the way I remembered that we have a mutual friend, Captain Lester Gibbs, who lives very close to her and is a lifelong organist. So I contacted him to let him know I would be there for a few days and hoped to see him. He responded with an invitation to a private organ crawl to see some historic organs in the vicinity.

It was a most delightful morning, beginning at the United Church of Christ next to Dartmouth College, Hanover, which has a new Letourneau organ. Our host was Henry Danaher, a Dartmouth graduate who also serves as the college organist. After I played a few pieces on this great instrument he took us over to Rollins Chapel, Dartmouth College, to try out the three manual Austin organ from the 60s, the largest pipe organ in the area.






Our next stop was the lovely St. Barnabas Episcopal Church in Norwich, Vermont, just over the river. This organ is the smallest in the area, a single short manual tracker made by Hook and Hastings and installed in 1873. My friend's first organ position in his teens was at this church. It has nine ranks — four Great, three Swell and 8' and 16' pedal. It was a delight to play.

From Norwich we went to the First Congregational Church in West Lebanon, NH to see a two manual tracker by Hook and Hastings, installed in 1875. I found this one rather difficult to play, especially with the Swell to Great coupler engaged!

Our last stop was at the United Methodist Church in Lebanon, where Les currently plays. The instrument there is an original G Hook tracker converted to electric pneumatic action in 1967 using the original pipes and console. It filled the space beautifully.









CHAPTER EMERGENCY FUND

The SWJAGO Chapter sponsors a fund to provide short-term emergency aid to Chapter members who find themselves temporarily in need of assistance. No dues money will be used for this aid, but tax-deductible contributions will be welcome at any time. The chapter Executive Committee will award aid as the need arises. Any Chapter member may recommend a member in good standing who, for reasons such as illness or unemployment, deserves our help, by contacting the Dean. All cases of course will be confidential, any discussions in the Executive Committee will occur in executive (unrecorded) session. There are two ways to contribute to this cause: I) when renewing your membership via iMIS, you may elect to contribute an additional amount to the Emergency Fund; you may also contribute via iMIS at any other time by using the "Make a Contribution" option from the iMIS menu; 2) you may also send your tax-deductible donation (as a check made out to SW Jersey Chapter AGO) to our Treasurer Chuck Gibson, marked for "Musicians' Emergency Fund." Mail to: 691 Willow Grove Road, Monroeville, NJ 08343-4529.

Our chapter's scholarship program exists to serve area congregations by increasing the number of capable organists and to insure the continuation of the classical church music profession. (Application forms on pages 18 &19.)

As a reminder, the program is structured as 14 one-hour lessons scheduled at the mutual convenience of the instructor and student, ideally on the organ where the student practices, or at least one a month where the student practices. The lessons and public jury *must take place within 4 months*. The practice instrument must have a minimum of two 61-note keyboards and a concave, radiating 32-note pedalboard, with all keys functioning. The student must have legs long enough to reach the pedalboard and have intermediate piano skills (meaning and understanding of meter signatures, chords, key signatures, and the ability to read G and F clefs).

The audition for this program is on piano. Applicants will be asked to prepare and perform a simple Bach keyboard work, also one movement of a sonata by Mozart, Haydn, Beethoven, Clementi, or Kuhnau, and also one hymn written in traditional four-part harmony. The applicant will be asked to sight-read two short pieces; one will be in common meter.

At the conclusion of the I4 one hour lessons, a jury is required with the teacher and at least two additional chapter members present. The jury will consist of the following:

Two of these three chorales: Ein feste Burg, Lobe den Herren, Herzlich tut mir verlangen

A hymn will be sight-read, pedaling not required

The tune Old Hundredth in any of its traditional forms, copy provided to the committee

One pedal alone passage of a chorale, minimum 15 measures

A trio chorale

A prelude or fugue from the collection Eight Little Preludes and Fugues

The instructor is appointed by the local chapter. Accepted applicants are responsible for securing a pair of Organmaster shoes and required music. Instruction may happen any time provided all activities are completed within four months. Candidates of all ages who meet the above criteria are welcome. The Scholarship

The Organ Scholarship of the Southwest Jersey Chapter of the American Guild of Organists provides a term of 14 introductory organ lessons for qualified persons wishing to begin study of the organ.

Eligibility

All applicants must possess the following qualifications:

- Must reside in the Southwest Jersey geographical area.
- Must have received little or no previous formal classical organ training.
- Legs must be long enough to reach the pedalboard.
- At least an intermediate piano proficiency (see audition requirements below).
- Basic knowledge of theory, including G and F clefs, key signatures, meter signatures, and chords.
- Must have access to an organ on which to practice. The organ console must either 1) conform to AGO standards having at least two 61-note manuals and a full pedalboard, or 2) conform to historical mechanical action standards.
- Must commit to completing 14 lessons and the jury within four to six months.

In addition to the application form, applicants are asked to include on a separate sheet a brief statement of their goals and objectives for study and a summary of their musical background and experience.

The Audition

The audition is scheduled once the application has been received. Auditions will be played on the piano. No memorization is required.

Prepared pieces

- Any Bach Two-Part Invention or one selection from the Anna Magdalena Notebook
- One movement from a sonatina by Mozart, Haydn, Beethoven, Clementi, or Kuhnau
- One fiymn written in traditional four-part harmony

Sight-reading

 Two short pieces: one in common time, the other in another meter

The Lessons

Lessons are arranged at the mutual convenience of the teacher and student, ideally on the organ where the student practices. In any event, at least one lesson per month will take place on the organ where the student practices.

Students will learn how to practice and will become acquainted with registration, articulation, and pedaling, through the practice and preparation of hymns, teaching pieces, and repertoire.

Students will be required to have appropriate shoes (as recommended by their teacher) before the second lesson.

Students will provide at their expense the necessary hymnal and books required by the teacher. (Generally hymnals may be borrowed from the student's church.) Photocopied music is illegal, contrary to the Guild's Code of Ethics, and may not be used.

The Jury

At the conclusion of the 14 weeks of study, the student will be required to play before a jury: Two of the following four-part hymns (at least one of the hymns must be played with pedal):

Nicaea Lobe den Herren
Ein feste Burg Olivet
Hymn to Joy
New Britain (Amazing Grace)
Herzlich tut mich verlangen
(Passion Chorale)

- The Doxology (Old Hundredth) in any of the standard forms
- One pedal-alone passage of a Bach chorale or from a method book, at least 16 measures long
- A trio exercise or a chorale trio
- A prelude or fugue from Bach's Eight Little Preludes and Fugues
