

Fake Criminal Deportation Story & AI Fake Images

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Jan 23rd, 2026 (Greg)
Jan 10th, 2026 (Julian)

Jan 20th, 2026 (Gregorian), or January 7th, 2026 (Julian), here in Mexico, N Foro news aired an elaborate story about Mexico capturing 37 to 92 criminals, wanted in the US, and deporting them to the US. However, every image associated with the story was an AI (artificially intelligence) produced fake.

I went to the N Foro website to collect story screenshots. There, I found three news stories.

Story #1

N Foro news “story #1” was composed of four still images. Those images follow.

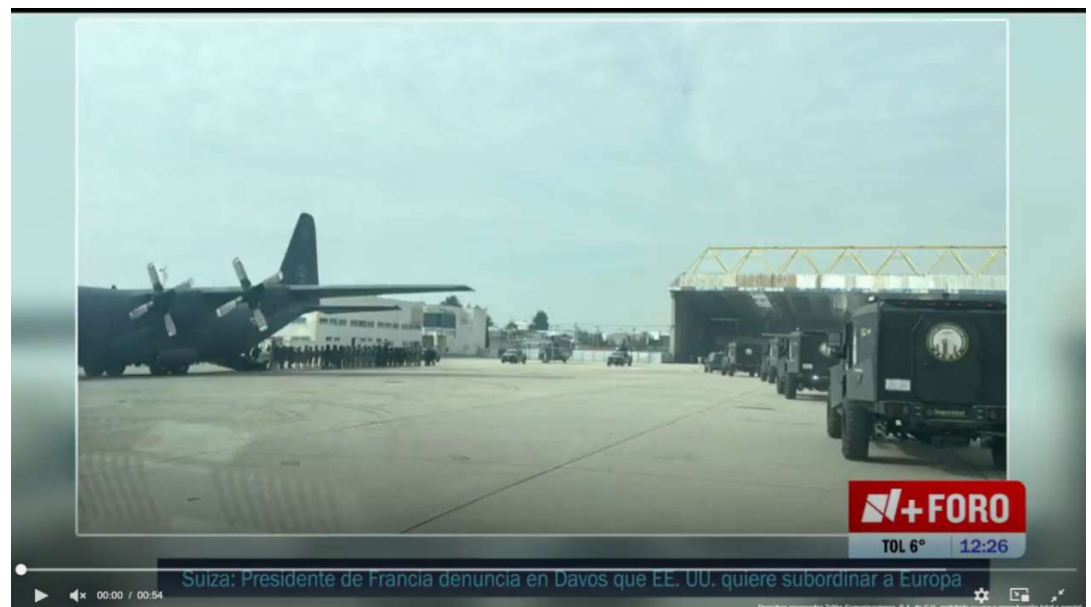
Do you see the fake elements in the image above? The most flagrantly fake element is the soldier on the far left. The fake elements are outlined below, and enlarged on the next page.





The problem(s) with Image #1. The problem with the soldier is, as you see above (left), he does not have an arm on the viewer's right side of his body, and has TWO hands on the viewer's left. One of the hands cover the laughing mouth of a figure whom I believe represents Satan. This *hand-over-laughing-mouth* image is a rip-off of a similar image on page 140 of Steve's Top-Secret Notebook (STSN). Satan is positioned beside a 2-headed entity, which creates the shape of an 8 (another aspect stolen from the image on page 140 of STSN). The two headed entity represents Satan's two beasts: John W Gardner and John C Malone. A clue that there was something wrong with this soldier is that he holds his gun to the left, while the other soldiers hold theirs to the right. On the right side of the image, Satan composed the abbreviation A.I., with some additional distorted images that don't deserve attention. Now image #2...

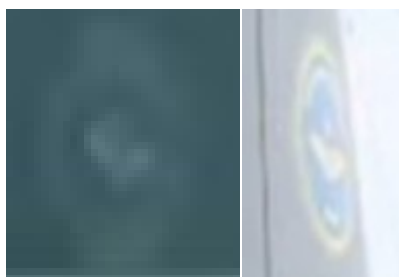
See any problems? The problems are numbered and explained on the following pages.



The problems with the image are circled above, and each problem pertains to the emblem (or insignia) or official markings on the vehicles above. Problem #1 pertains to the markings on the plane's vertical stabilizer; problem #2 and #3 pertain to markings on the Jeep-like military vehicles.

Image #2 / Problem # 1

The story shows many prisoners boarding a huge C-130 Hercules plane. The problem is, Mexico's Air Force only has three C-130's; which are numbered 3611, 3616, and 3617 on the vertical stabilizer (rudder area), and marked 611, 616, and 617, respectively, near the planes' noses, as you should be able to see in the images to the right. But there is no number on the vertical stabilizer in the AI image on the previous page, or above.



To the left, enlargements of the markings on the vertical stabilizer of the ostensibly AI produced C-130, featured in this story, match vertical stabilizer markings on Mexico's C-130 #3611 (right). NOTE: This story point precludes any US transport involvement.



Image # 2 / Problems #2 and #3



The vehicles in image #2 (enlarged above) appear to be Ocelots, used by Mexico Ejercito (Army). From my limited research, the Ejercito's Ocelots are pretty consistently marked with an emblem/logo of an Ocelotl (an elite unit of Aztec warriors), pictured to the right. Ejercito Ocelots are further marked with the name of the Mexican Ejercito, and the vehicle's military ID number, as you see in the images below.

Thus, the Ocelots and vehicles above are not part of Mexico's Ejercito.

Another problem with the image above is the emblem circled in red. I'll address this soon.

This brings us to image #3, on the next page.

Image #3 Problems. Image #3 is allegedly a X/Twitter *tweet*/message sent by Mexico’s Omar Garcia Harfuch. The problems with the image are (#1) the image is not an actual image of an actual X/Twitter tweet (a true and valid X/Twitter tweet has a date and time stamp, usually at the base of the tweet); (2) the alleged message does not have a date. Thus, if we accepted this tweet as possibly valid, without a date, the message could have been sent weeks or months ago. The failure to use an actual screenshot of the tweet, and the failure to date the alleged statement, are severe journalistic failures.

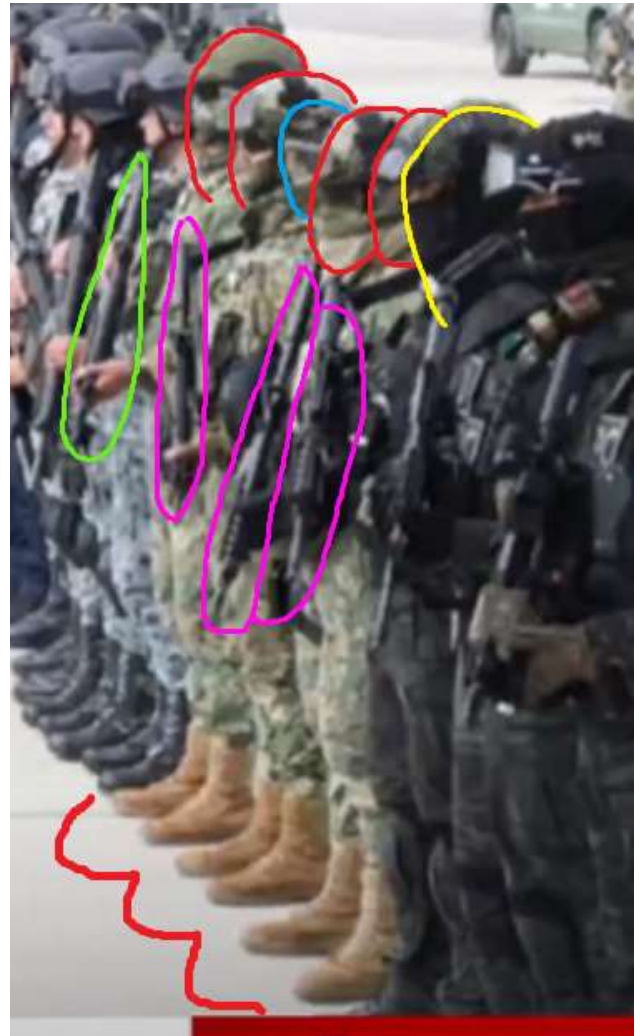


See any signs of A.I. fakery in the image above? I’ll show you on the next page.



The Problem with Image #4

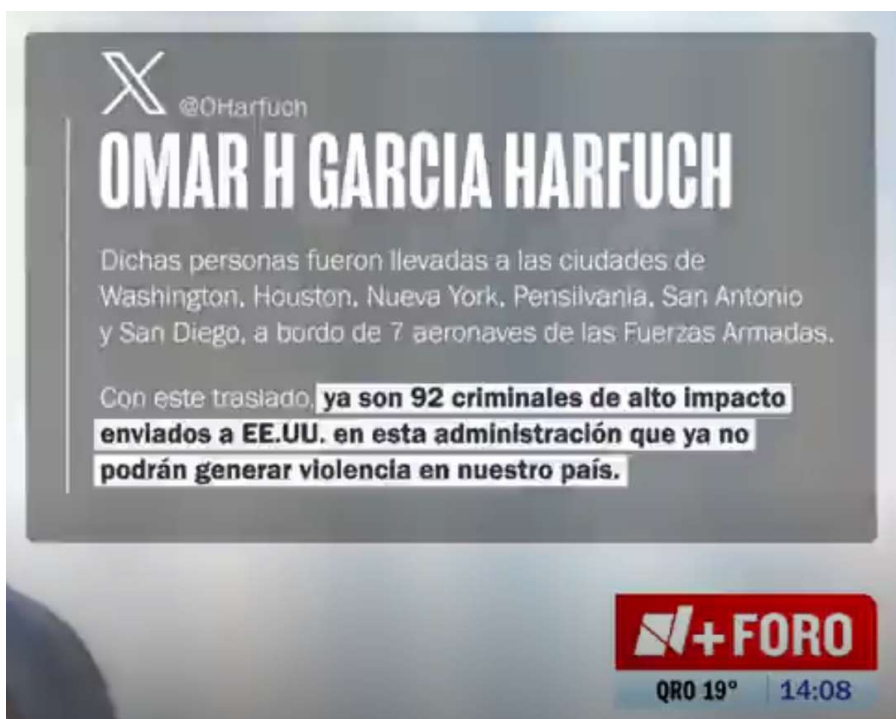
The primary problem with image # 4 is found on the right side of the image, where we see three sets of tan boots (marked in red, in the image to the right), turn into what appears to be the bodies and guns of four men, which turn into the heads of either four or five soldiers.

Story #2 is another story about another X/Twitter *tweet* allegedly sent out by Omar Garcia Harfuch. Once again, the story does not include an actual image of the tweet, and does not include the date of the tweet.

Story #3 / **Problem #1**

The hidden message is “AI Fake,” a message that has turned up a lot in these January 2026 *AI fake story* debunking articles.



Story #3 / Problem #2

Story #3 also features a vehicle that appears to be an Ocelot, with an unusual green and yellow emblem/insignia on the passenger door (below).

IMAGE #7



The emblem reads: *Prevencion y Reincercion Social* (see enlargement below).

The problem is, I was only able to find two of these images online –and both were in places where a knowledgeable investigator (which I am) might expect to find fake and backdated images/files. One image was on a PDF (PDFs can be fraudulently backdated to any date the creator wishes), other image was inserted as an identity icon on a YouTube page.



There are 1000 words in this report.
