DELAWARE COUNTY TAX BILL CHANGES

In 2019, the Delaware County tax office changed the vendor and software used in prior years to produce the municipal tax bill for real estate taxes. The new software did not allow customization for each municipality's individual tax structure. This resulted in homeowners with funds held in escrow receiving an extra copy of their bill and the misalignment of the amount of each tax type on the printed form. However, the totals were correct. If you have an escrow with a mortgage company, they also received a copy of your bill. Please contact them to ensure receipt.

The total amount due can be paid in person during the office collection hours at the location provided on the bill or can be mailed/delivered to Sharon Savings Bank before the posted due dates. ALDAN AQUA WATER MAIN REPLACEMENT PROJECT

With spring arriving, the Aqua water main replacement project on Providence Road which started in January is in full bloom. According to Aqua Pennsylvania, Inc., they are on schedule and in some areas even ahead of schedule. The installation of new water mains will improve quality and service. The construction project is scheduled to be completed in July 2019.

The original daily scheduled work times of 9:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. have been adjusted to start closer to 7:30 a.m. Aqua has requested and received approval to work on some Saturdays and Sundays to help stay on schedule.
