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



Literacy Education

Biddeford Schools recently invited the community to participate in the Read to ME Challenge, spearheaded by the Department of Education, to promote a bonding experience by simply reading aloud to a child for 15 minutes or more. The purpose was to promote a love for reading, build vocabulary, and help students make connections. Nearly 100 legislators, city councilors, administrators, business leaders, parents and students visited our schools to read to students. BPS Principal Margaret Pitts even continued the challenge by reading on Facebook Live every night at 7:00 p.m., Monday through Thursday, with students requesting special titles.

Read to ME and *JumpStart* Program **Building literacy skills for a brighter future**

or as long as there have been elementary schools, there has been conventional wisdom about the students who attend: what happens at home for the five years before they enter school and during the summer between grades is critical. And the data bear this out: fully 2/3 of students entering our Kindergarten program are below the benchmark.

"The impact of these learning deficits grow exponentially over time if not addressed," Director of Instruction Mandy Cyr recently told the School Committee.

"Learning how to 'do school' takes time," Early Childhood Coordinator Lindsey Nadeau told The Bridge. "We spend a good part of the fall with our youngsters on school etiquette, navigating the hallway, playground, and cafeteria, and on the assessment of basic numeracy and literacy."

When students aren't prepared for school or experience a "summer slide" in the transition from Kindergarten to first grade, the challenges to help students achieve at benchmark compound.

"While we can't be in kids' homes at age three making sure children are enjoying books with their parents each night, or practicing counting, we can think about school differently," Assistant Superintendent Chris Indorf said. "Why does it have to end in June? For students who struggle, why can't we do more to smooth their transition and support their deficits?"

Administrators worked this winter to create the Jump-Start program, which moves the start of Kindergarten screening to the Spring, and creates a month-long academic summer program to support rising kindergarteners and first graders who need additional support.

"For many parents and students, having a standalone Pre-K and kindergarten center is a great comfort," Nadeau said. "They get to know the school, the faculty, the playground, the routine."



"But," interjected Biddeford Primary School Principal Margaret Pitts, "then they transition to first grade and in many ways they start from scratch: a different building, different faculty, maybe some different rules and routine. For many kids, it can be 'one step forward, two steps back.' We want to do better for our kids, and that's why we created JumpStart."

JumpStart is a targeted, academic summer program which assists our youngest students in addressing early literacy and math deficits, social/emotional needs, and the challenges associated with the building-to-building transition. We are hopeful parents will reach out if they believe their child is in need of additional support through the summer months.

The first iteration of JumpStart will launch this summer from July 22 to August 15. JumpStart Director Kerri LeSieur describes the program as a "targeted, academic summer program which assists our youngest students in addressing early literacy and math deficits, social/emotional and trauma needs, and the challenges associated with the building-to-building transition. JumpStart will take place in the building the child will be attending in the fall and will eliminate any barriers to learning, including providing transportation, breakfast and lunch.

For the 2019-2020 school year, the BRCOT is expanding programs to include Emergency Medical Services (EMS) and Medical Management Technology.

The EMS program provides students with skills necessary to respond to emergency calls, provide efficient and immediate care to critically ill or injured persons and transport patients to a medical facility. Successful completion will include a certification as a Maine EMT-B.

Medical Management Technology provides students with knowledge and business skills relevant to medical practices. Terminology, coding and insurance concepts, records management, billing and accounting concepts, and medical law and ethics, customer service and current medical events are a few of the covered topics.

As we look into career development for the future, BRCOT will also be exploring a culinary arts program.

BRCOT Celebrates 50 Years Senator Angus King recognizes their contributions

S chool isn't just the "3 R's," it's also engineering. And electrical engineering. And medical science. And early childhood education. And business studies. And various other programs, all of which thrive at Biddeford's own Center of Technology.

The Center, which currently serves 305 students from six communities including Biddeford, Saco, Old Orchard Beach, Dayton, Arundel, and the Kennebunks recently celebrated its 50th anniversary, and Senator Angus King came to mark the occasion. It is one of two Centers in all of York County.

On February 8th, Senator King joined staff and students at Biddeford High School to honor the Center's "Golden Jubilee." The Center, opened in 1969, has provided Biddeford-area students the opportunity to develop practical skills and knowledge to find a career and enter the workforce.

"We've worked really hard to make one of the area's best-kept secrets one of the District's most relevant and progressive programs," Superintendent Jeremy Ray told *The Bridge*. "In the last seven years, the Center has culled under-enrolled programs, offered courses that provide students the opportunity to gain college credits, undergone renovation in the academic wing, and added programs ranging from career development to plumbing and heating."

"Strong community partnerships make these programs possible," added BRCOT Director Paulette Bonneau. "Area businesses lend us their time, talent, treasure, and expertise in helping to keep our programs up-todate and relevant. All programs are aligned with national industry standards, and students who complete them have a distinct advantage in the workplace or in post-secondary education."

Following the celebration, Senator King met with LearningWorks staff and students to hear about LearningWorks' programs and their positive impact on Biddeford children and families. LearningWorks provides free community-based education programs for children, adults, and families throughout southern Maine. "You folks are doing amazing things to provide something for everyone--our young people are the State's most important asset, and the breadth of programming the Biddeford School Department offers is critical," King said.

The Biddeford School Committee has passed a budget that includes \$400,000 for additional renovations for the Center this year. The Programs are fresh, but much of the building is tired. We must invest in the physical plant so that it can safely and effectively house our many hands-on programs.

Senator King has made workforce development and career and technical education top legislative priorities in Washington. He has discussed ways to bolster Maine's economy through technical training at Eastern Maine Community College, Portland Arts and Technology High School (PATHS), and at the Cianbro Institute. He also devoted the April 2018 edition of his podcast, *Inside Maine*, to workforce development, speaking with Peter Vigue, chairman of the Cianbro Companies about the Cianbro Institute, and Ed Cervone, Executive Director of Educate Maine, about their work to provide technical education opportunities and encourage more people from non-traditional backgrounds to pursue careers in IT.

The Biddeford Regional Center of Technology is one of 27 Career and Technical schools in Maine. Students can focus on sixteen different career pathways, including auto technology, legal studies, early childhood education, machine tool technology, and welding and metal fabrication.

trumpet player. An army veteran. A graduate of the University of Southern Maine. A wife and mom of four. A skilled seamstress. An Alumni Band member. Like the pillows she sews, Jessica (Bedard) Johnson '00 has many layers, including being a driving force to revive the Biddeford Marching Band.

"I am a whole person because of music," Johnson told *The Bridge.* "There were some days it was the only reason I went to school because I knew they depended on me as the lead trumpet player. I believe there are many students who--like me--need that outlet, and it kept me grounded in some of the worst periods of my life. While reading and math educate one side of the brain, music education expands the entire brain to learn. It is the only subject that engages reading, math, tracking, listening, and gross, fine and concentration skills all at once."

After graduation, Jessica joined the military. During her enlistment, she was a truck driver, squad leader and occasionally played trumpet in the military band. As she reflected on her experience, she added, "Drill and ceremony in the military is exactly the same thing as it was in the marching band. I always seemed to have an advantage in drill because I knew how to play an instrument and march at the same time. This engages every part of the body so not only could I march but I could run with ease because when you play an instrument, you learn how to breathe."

Following her honorable discharge from the military, Jessica grew her family to include four children and returned to her love of music through performances with the Alumni Band. When she spoke to the editors of *The Bridge*, she spoke fondly of the friendships she has made speaking the universal language of sound with her "extended family."

Like her, Jessica's son needed a creative outlet. She lamented that marching band was not an option and

decided to take action by sending a letter to the Mayor and Superintendent.

"Throughout my time here in Biddeford, I have felt it was very important to make sure that the marching band was restored for our students," Ray told *The Bridge.* "Jessica's letter came at the perfect time. We had to ensure Waterhouse Field was renovated and once we completed that project, it seemed only natural to bring back this once great program to our school and community. We had already approved a Winter Indoor Percussion program as well."

A flurry of planning meetings quickly began--assessing equipment and budget needs, fundraising capacity and potential events, and gauging student interest. Within months, a budget was developed, a fundraising campaign began, and over 50 students signed up. One of those fundraisers was making commemorative pillows out of the old uniforms. During the interview, Jessica laughed, "I never thought sewing could help build a marching band. But, I have been making these pillows and tailoring uniforms for the winter percussion group so we all have skills to help this effort.

"I am looking forward to seeing my son play the trumpet as he marches onto Waterhouse Field this fall. I hope parents, friends and the community join us in making this a reality because our students deserve it."


