The Confederacy and the Everglades Seminole Indians

While the role played by Confederate Indians out west is known to many, the role of those Seminoles who were not subjected by the U.S. in Florida is not known by many and they were allied with the Confederacy, similar to their Seminole brothers who had been sent to the reservation in what is now Oklahoma. One of the main reasons that the role played by the Florida Seminoles is unknown to the masses is there is so little historical documents that survived. There is one particular article that is recorded however:

"Several paragraphs having gone the rounds recently that the Seminoles remaining in Florida had recently committed murders and depredations on white families in South Florida, we take pleasure in stating, on the authority of an officer who had just returned from that region, that they are perfectly quite, and have not been guilty of any outrages. They now number about eighty fine warriors, and their chief has called them all in to the interior from the coast for fear they will be tampered with by our enemies. They are desirous of entering the Confederate service, and will soon be organized into a company and armed. Our old friend, Col. H. V. Snell, who is a great favorite with them, will probably be most effectually and faithfully attended to. When they do find a Yankee intruder, or a Thayer colonist, he will receive his perpetual pre-emption to

Florida soil. They are a remnant of a small tribe of brave Seminoles, against the armies of the United States, led by Scott, the best general in the service, during a period of over seven years, and were never completely subjugated. They will prove to be most valuable allies. They will protect a long line of the Florida coast, and will be a terror to Yankee invaders. They should henceforth be cherished and protected by the Confederacy, and a home in perpetuity should be laid off for them in South Florida."

— The Weekly Advertiser, The Florida Indians, November 5, 1862

There appears to be two companies that were created with Florida Seminole Indians. One was created by Andrew E. Hodges, who was a white man from the Cedar Keys area. This unit was in service from 1862 till around July 1864 and may have been at the Battle of Olustee and served as sharpshooters.

"The most desperate enemy that we have to contend with here is the Florida Indians, who have organized themselves into roving bands of bushwhackers and occasionally steal upon our picket lines under cover of night and disturb our sentinels. Many of the Redskins are sharp-shooters. During the recent battle, they betook themselves to the tree-tops and picked off many of the officers of the Colored Troops."

— Frederick F. French, Letter to Thomas F. Kelly of Glens Falls, New York, March 6, 1864[]

The other company was McBride's Company of Everglades Indians which seems to be formed out of Hodges Company. This company was mustered into service in July 1864 with 85 warriors. On one of the muster roles was written the following:

"We, the undersigned, respectfully volunteer and tender our services to the Confederate States of America, begging to be immediately admitted into their armies, having chosen A. McBride for our Captain."

I am pleased to announce that on May 20th, 2021, the following Compatriots of Finley's Brigade attended the "Train the Trainer" headstone cleaning instruction at Old City Cemetery in Jacksonville, Florida. Commander Ned Roberts, Randy Nichols, Stan Willis, Division Commander Kelly Crocker, Scott Osteen, Keith Lassiter, 2nd Lt Commander Lee Norris, and I made the trip over. The event was hosted by the Kirby Smith Camp and lead by instructor Wayne Moody. Instruction included the preferred materials and methods to use along with hands on experience with numerous headstones. Commander Roberts and Randy Nichols had the honor of cleaning and landscaping the grave site of Capt. Gaston Finley, 1st Fla. Cavalry, one of the "Immortal 600," and son of our Namesake, General Jessie James Finley. This instruction will allow Finley's Brigade to properly train our fellow compatriots on how to clean the headstones of our hallowed ancestor hero's safely, and preserve their resting place for future generations. Compatriot Randy Nichols has donated a 22 inch push mower to the camp for cemetery clean-ups. Our inventory of tools and supplies keeps growing for use in our cemetery preservation efforts. Thank you Compatriot Nichols for your generosity. Compatriot Cameron Dice is working on several ideas for marking our cemetery trailer. Once Cameron has submitted his ideas for a logo, we will start a selection process. Ideas for a logo from camp members are appreciated. Our next cemetery effort will be at "Old City Cemetery" confederate section. This will include straightening and aligning stones, cleaning, and general up keep. This is in preparation for the April 25th Memorial conducted by the UDC. The work day date will be April 17th starting at 08:30am. Gloves and garden trowels are recommended.

Southern Recipe of the Month Oatmeal Pie Mark Bess

Ingredients:

• 1 - 9 inch pie crust

- 4 eggs
- 1 cup sugar
- 2 tbs flour
- 1 tsp cinnamon
- 1/4 tsp salt
- 1 cup light corn syrup
- 1/4 cup melted butter
- 1 tsp vanilla
- 1 cup quick cook oatmeal

Directions:

Preheat your oven to 350. Beat eggs until you have bubbles and combine the sugar, flour, cinnamon and salt into the bowl and mix well. Add the corn syrup, butter and vanilla and mix well. Finally add the oatmeal. Now pour into the pie shell and cook for 45 to 50 minutes. Experiment with this recipe. You can add Diced apples, pecans, walnuts. Use your imagination.

The room rates are \$92 per night. Ask for the "SCV" rate.



Dates in History of the War - April

April 12-13, 1861 – Ft. Sumter, SC, fired upon and surrenders to Confederate officials.

April 6, 1862 – Battle of Shiloh, TN.

April 17, 1863 – Union Cavalry raids into MS known as Grierson's Raid and leads to famous John Wayne movie called Horse Soldiers.

April 12, 1864 - Confederates led by General N.B. Forrest capture Ft. Pillow, TN.

April 2, 1865 – Federal troops capture Selma, AL.

April 9, 1865 – General Lee surrenders the Army of Northern Virginia to General Grant at Appomattox Courthouse in VA.

April 12, 1865 - Federal troops capture Mobile, AL.

April 14-15, 1865 – President Lincoln is assassinated by John Wilkes Booth. VP Andrew Johnson of TN is sworn in as President.

April 26, 1865 – General Joseph Johnston surrenders to General Sherman at the Bennett house in Durham, NC.
