

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National Park Service Awards Millions To Protect Battlefields.

As reported by The Civil War Courier Nov. 2019 Vol. 32 issue 7.

About 4.6 million in grants have been releases by the National Park Service that will protect 783 acres for battlefields in the states of Kentucky, North Carolina, South Carolina, Tennessee, Pennsylvania, and Virginia.

Kentucky:

Grantee: Boyle County Fiscal Court, Land Acquired, Perryville Battlefield, White Tract = 128.5 acres, Project Partner: American Battlefield Trust and the Commonwealth Of Kentucky.

North Carolina:

Grantee: N.C. Dept. Of Natural and Cultural Resources, Land Acquired, Bentonville Battlefield, Denning Tract = 143 acres, Project Partner: American Battlefield Trust.

South Carolina:

Grantee: S.C. Dept. Of Archives and History, Land Acquired, Eutaw Springs Battlefield, Daniels Tract = 10.4 acres. Project Partner: American Battlefield Trust.

Grantee: Lancaster County, Land Acquired, Hanging Rock Battlefield, Horton IV Tract = 30.84 acres, Project Partner: American Battlefield trust and Katawba Valley Land Trust.

Tennessee:

Finley's Brigade Color Guard - Service with Honor

December, due to the holidays mainly, was limited in regards to functions and duties of the Color Guard.

For January, we have the Flagging Day at Havana, FL on New Year's Day at 10:00 am.

<u>Finley's Brigade Color Guard Uniform Guidelines – Part 2</u>

While there is a *preferred* uniform for our marching unit, we will *never* turn away anyone with a confederate uniform if they wish to march with us because they do not have the uniform prescribed below. The reason we insist on this particular pattern of uniform is that during ceremonies and parades it gives off a refined, elegant, and respectable dress appearance and helps distinguish our squad from reenacting units which typically have every man wearing their own unique uniform. At living history events this is great and we encourage all of our members who want to, to obtain a color guard ensemble and then develop their own uniform based off their personal research or preference that they feel they can represent and explain. At these events it looks better for every man to have his own appearance, but for parades and ceremonies uniformity is superior. This guide will primarily focus on the elements of the Finley's color guard uniform.

- 1. Brogans Brogans are historical lace-up ankle boots or shoes worn throughout the 19th century by both civilians and as military issue footwear. The style of brogans worn is irrelevant as we have men wearing black and brown brogans in square toe and round toe designs.
- 2. Gaiters Gaiters are typically made of canvas and function as supplementary boot shafts which are buckled on as opposed to being actually part of the boot. They affix above the top of the brogan and have a stirrup piece which goes underneath the shoe. They typically end a little below the knee.
- 3. Trousers Trousers in a medium confederate gray or made from gray jean wool are an essential part of the uniform. While some of our members wear powder blue or civilian trousers at living history events, we prefer the gray for our color guard. That being said however, the color is the main sticking point and slight variations in trouser pattern are acceptable. Jean wool is lighter than most other confederate gray trousers, while it is more accurate is also more expensive. Some of our members wear reproduction canvas western pants in the proper color, this is also fine. Period trousers are worn at the navel. Thus if like many of us your gut extends out further than your waist then you will need to order a size or two up to compensate. Additionally on many of our members you will often see a light blue stripe extending up the side of the leg typically half an inch or so. This is a rank stripe denoting corporal. If you are wearing corporal chevrons on your shell as most of our members do, then it would be ideal though not mandatory to get them stitched on either at home

by buying wool tape or from the sutler. If you are dressing as a private with no chevrons then the rank stripe is not needed. A note on underwear, while you are more than welcome to go out and buy period correct long johns, modern underwear is fine.

4. Suspenders – Good period suspenders, or 'braces' as they were historically referred to and often sold as are essential to wearing the uniform as they are what is used to actually hold up your pants. They will button twice on each side in the front and once on each side in the back.

Dates in History - January

January 9-26, 1861 – Mississippi, Florida, Alabama, Georgia, and Louisiana all follow South Carolina from the previous month and vote to succeed from the Union making a total of six states at this time.

January 18, 1862 – The territory of Arizona is formed by the Confederacy.

January 1, 1863 – The Emancipation Proclamation and the Homestead Act go into effect.

January 17, 1864 – Battle of Dandridge, TN where CSA forces push back Union forces from the area.

January 13-15, 1865 – Fort Fisher, outside of Wilmington, NC, finally falls to Union forces essentially closing off the last Confederate port to the outside world.
