


January Camp Meeting

The Blood of Stonewall

From Lt. Gen. Thomas Jonathan "Stonewall" Jackson to greatgrandson Col. Thomas Jonathan Jackson Christian, Jr., A Legacy of Duty to Country and Love of Family

Over the past 120 years scores of books have been written about Lt. Gen. Thomas J. "Stonewall" Jackson. No books, however, have been written about his widow, Mary Anna, who lived another fifty years following her husband's death, and who was honored by five U.S. presidents. This book also details the life of Julia, who was but six months old when her father died, and was followed almost daily by newspaper reporters, both North and South, who sought to learn as much as possible about the daughter of the famed Stonewall Jackson. It further expounds on the lives of Julia's son and daughter, the only grandchildren of Stonewall Jackson. The book further covers the life of Col. Thomas J.J. Christian, Jr., Stonewall's greatgrandson, who not only possessed many of the same attributes of his famous ancestor, but whose life was tragically cut short during World War II, leaving a widow and six-month-old daughter.

Ron Rissler and his wife live in Jefferson County, W.Va. on a farm owned by his family since 1852. After working on the farm, serving in the U.S. Navy, and being employed as a paralegal for twenty years, he retired in 2011.

Ron, from an early age, has read several books about Lt. Gen. Thomas J. "Stonewall" Jackson due to the fact that four direct ancestors served in the Stonewall Brigade during the Civil War. Because none of the writings addressed what happened to Jackson's wife and daughter after his death, Ron, over an eight-year period, researched the lives of his widow, daughter, two grandchildren and his great-grandson who, more than any other, simulated the attributes of his famous ancestor.

Ron will be our guest speaker at the 31st Annual Lee & Jackson Southern Heritage Event on January 28, 2023. You will not want to miss this event!

Grave Keepers Report – Remembering Our Ancestors

Please allow me the opportunity to relate my experience in securing a grave marker for my Great Grandfather, **Joseph H. Bell Jr.**

I have been honored to work with **Commander Kelly Crocker, Lt Mark Bess, Historian Stan Willis and Compatriot JR Miller** to research the history of Confederate Soldiers whose final resting places have been unmarked all these years. We have applied to the U.S. Veteran's Administration for gravestones and installed them where appropriate. After many months of participating in these endeavors, it dawned on me that my own veteran has no marker.

Joseph H. Bell, Jr. was a private in the CSA 7th Georgia Cavalry. He and his father served in the same unit as wagon masters. On June 11, 1864, they were both captured by George Custer in the battle of Trevilian Station in Louisa County Virginia. This was reported to have been the bloodiest and largest all-cavalry battle of the war. Each of them survived the infamous POW camp at Elmira New York and returned to Dahlonega Georgia where they had been gold miners. Toward the turn of the century, Joseph Jr. moved to College Park Georgia where his sons were raising vegetables for the Atlanta market, and he would continue as a Baptist pastor. In 1916 he passed away, following a medical procedure, and was buried in the College Park Cemetery.

I had already done the research, but I had to confirm that no marker had been installed since I was at the grave site many years ago. That was confirmed by cemetery personnel who were most helpful in assisting with the VA application and in setting the marker. This particular cemetery has strict rules on who can install grave markers, including restricting them to 48"x24" granite markers rather than standing gravestones. Part of the application involves a place for the markers to be delivered and an agreement from the site that it will be installed. After I supplied all of the required documentation, the

cemetery completed the application and sent it to the VA. The marker was received and installed the middle of December 2022.



I am pleased to report that my Great Grandfather's grave is now properly marked!

I have been honored to have had a small part in making it happen.

Here are a few things you should all be proud of accomplishing.



- Adopting to maintain several cemeteries protecting our Confederate dead. We may not see it, but people do notice our efforts and appreciate them.
- Veterans Village cook-out and charity support. The smiles and gratitude of those veterans we support is heartwarming.
- Soldier's Cemetery, Quincy, Confederate Memorial Day remembrance and bar-b-que activities.

This is just the tip of the iceberg of what Finley's Brigade has accomplished in 2022. I look forward to surpassing these and making 2023 an even better year.

I want to wish everyone a happy and prosperous new year, and I look forward to working with you all in 2023. Thank you all for allowing me to be a part of this exemplary organization and band of brothers.



Dates in History of the War – January

January 9-26, 1861 – Mississippi, Florida, Alabama, Georgia, and Louisiana all follow South Carolina from the previous month and vote to succeed from the Union making a total of six states at this time.

January 18, 1862 – The territory of Arizona is formed by the Confederacy.

January 1, 1863 – The Emancipation Proclamation and the Homestead Act go into effect.

January 17, 1864 – Battle of Dandridge, TN where CSA forces push back Union forces from the area.

January 13-15, 1865 – Fort Fisher, outside of Wilmington, NC, finally falls to Union forces essentially closing off the last Confederate port to the outside world.


