Lee & Jackson Southern Heritage Event

On the evening of January 29, 2022, the Lee & Jackson Southern Heritage Event was attended by approximately 60 compatriots and their families.

The evening began with a social time devoted to making new friends and renewing old friendships. This time was also used to view the many offerings on the silent auction tables and to enjoy the appetizers. After opening ceremonies, including the invocation and pledges to the flags, the guests enjoyed a delicious buffet. Afterwards, our speaker of the evening, SCV Lt. Commander-In-Chief **Jason Boshers** was introduced.

Jason began his remarks by presenting some of the history of Robert E. Lee and Stonewall Jackson. He asserted that these were deeply devout, religious men. They were genuinely devoted to the troops entrusted to their care. These were values shared by many of the soldiers fighting to preserve their way of life. This was illustrated by a few examples of individual soldiers, like **Sam Davis**.



Sam was assigned to a unit under the direction of E. Coleman. It was his mission to operate behind enemy lines and report all manner of intelligence including troupe movement. On one of his missions, he was captured by two Federal spies dressed as Confederates. Awaiting interrogation and trial, he was imprisoned with three other Confederate spies, including E. Coleman who was then using another name. Sam was repeatedly questioned about his activities but refused to give any information. The federal commander even offered to give him his horse and papers needed to get back home if he would simply identify E. Coleman. Sam refused even that offer relating that he would die many deaths before he would give up his friends. After the execution, his younger brother came to claim his body and received safe passage

home after word of Sam's devotion had been spread though out the area.

Jason used these illustrations to point out that we must uphold the values for which our ancestors gave their last breath. We must keep alive the virtues of our Confederate forebearers, guard their histories and teach our children the principles that once made the south great. He ended his remarks with a fervent prayer: "May God save Dixie"!





Grave Keepers Report – Remembering Our Ancestors



Early on Saturday, January 17, fourteen hardy souls braved the freezing temperatures to show up at the Tallahassee Old City Cemetery. With the work at the Quincy Cemetery nearing completion, the focus has shifted to the Confederate graves at the Old City Cemetery. The records have shown 186 are buried in that section of the grounds although only about 35 stones are present. Our goal, that day, was to identify what stones needed to be cleaned, repaired or replaced.

A marker was placed in the cemetery for **Herman Flint Damon**. He was born on December 28, 1847 in Tallahassee, the fifth of eight children. He and his brother Frank were cadets at the West Florida Seminary and were both present at the Battle of Natural Bridge. In the 1870 census, Herman was listed as a store clerk, probably in his father's furniture store in Tallahassee. He spent some years in Jacksonville but for most of his life he was in Tallahassee. On May 9, 1910, he passed away in his sister's boarding house in the 100 block of Clinton Street, now College Avenue.

Since Herman never officially served in the military, the U.S. Veteran's Administration refused to provide a proper marker for his grave. Felling that he needed to be honored for his Confederate service during the war, Compatriot **Randy Nichols** led the drive to seek the necessary financing. Randy was able to get the necessary funds from the Masons and designed a grave marker similar to the ones provided by the VA but with the added Masonic symbols. The marker was placed in the Old City Cemetery on January 17, 2022.



Finley's is anxiously awaiting the delivery of two more headstones. One for Pigot Cemetery and one for Old City. Three more have been applied for. Hopefully we will soon be very busy setting these markers. The work at Old City never ends. Our goal is to make these grounds the shining star of Old City and give those souls interred there, the honor they deserve. We will be establishing a "Friends of Old City Confederates" fund. All monies received will be solely used for the Confederate section. I need some fundraising ideas. So put on your thinking caps and let's get started.

My Fellow Compatriots -



February 4, 1861 – Delegates from Florida meet with other Confederate delegates in Montgomery, AL.

February 22, 1862 – Inauguration of President Jefferson Davis in Richmond, VA.

February 12, 1863 – The CSS *Florida* captures *USS Jacob Bell* with cargo valued at \$2 million.

February 17, 1864 – The submarine, CSS *Hunley*, sinks the USS *Housatonic* off Charleston, SC.

February 19, 1865 – Federal expedition to Milton, FL from Fort Barrancas near Pensacola, FL.

February 20, 1864 – Battle of Olustee (Ocean Pond) fought in Baker County, Florida.
