Howell Cobb September 7, 1815 – October 9, 1868 By Compatriot J.R. Miller



Born in Jefferson County, Georgia in 1815 and son of John A. Cobb and Sarah (Roots) Cobb of Welsh ancestry, Howell grew up in Athens, Georgia and attended the University of Georgia becoming a member of the Phi Kappa Literary Society. After graduation, he passed the bar exam and became an attorney where he would eventually become the solicitor general for the western judicial circuit. On May 26, 1835, he married Mary Ann Lamar. The couple would go on to have eleven children, many of which did not survive to adulthood.

Cobb would become a member of the U.S. Congress serving in the 28th all the way through the 31st Congresses. He chaired the U.S. House Committee on Mileage of the 28th Congress and became the Speaker of the House in the 31st Congress at age 34. In 1851, he left the house and ran for Governor of Georgia which he won. He served as governor until 1853. He then returned to Congress and served with the 34th Congress and while there, President James Buchanan appointed him Secretary of the Treasury which he served until 1860 when he resigned.

Cobb became a leader of the secession movement in 1860 and served as president of the convention of the seceded states that assembled in Montgomery, Alabama, on February 4, 1861, which consisted of deputies to a "Congress of the Sovereign and Independent States of South Carolina, Georgia, Florida, Alabama, Mississippi, and Louisiana". Due to the necessity of a constitution, they worked with considerable speed, reporting back to the convention on February 7. Copies were then made and distributed to convention members who spent relatively little time on debate. The Provisional Constitution was then unanimously ratified near midnight on February 8, 1861 and was signed by all present members at noon the day of Jefferson Davis's inaugural address on February 18, 1861.

The result of the convention was the Provisional Constitution of the Confederate States, which elected Jefferson Davis as President and established the P.A.C.S.A. (Provisional Army of the Confederate States of America.) Cobb would serve as President of several sessions of the Confederate Provisional Congress until he resigned.

Cobb joined the Confederate army and was commissioned as colonel of the 16th Georgia Infantry. He was appointed a brigadier general on February 13, 1862 and assigned command of a brigade in what became the Army of Northern Virginia. In October 1862, Cobb was detached from the Army of Northern Virginia and sent to the District of Middle Florida. He was promoted to major general on September 9, 1863 and placed in command of the District of Georgia and Florida. During his time in Florida, he made Quincy his headquarters. Quincy at the time was an ideal place for a commanding general with its access to a major river, a railroad that had it's beginning at said river, and vital communications were in place with food & clothing commissaries or depots present nearby. Everything that was needed was already in place up and running.

When Sherman's armies entered Georgia during the 1864 Atlanta Campaign and subsequent March to the Sea, Cobb was put in command of the Georgia Reserve Forces which fought one of the major battles at Columbus, Georgia on Easter Sunday, April 16, 1865. Just a few days later Cobb surrendered his troops to Union forces in Macon, GA on April 20, 1865.

Cobb declined to make any public remarks on Reconstruction policy pending receipt of a presidential pardon. That pardon came three years after the war's end. He promptly delivered a series of speeches in the summer of 1868, denouncing Republican plans for Reconstruction. He passed away of an apparent heart attack while vacationing in New York on October 9, 1868.
