The Dixie Highway Marker in Florida

The Dixie Highway system began to be developed about 1915 and eventually became a series of roads from Michigan to Miami, Florida.

In Florida, the beginning was at the Georgia/Florida State line, which is now US Hwy 319. Many "Dixie Highway" markers began to appear in the 1920's along the road system in the North and the South.

In 1927, The United Daughters of the Confederacy placed the Florida marker at Bradfordville, Florida near the intersection of US Hwy 319 and Bannerman Road. There was a dedication Service with great fanfare. At some point, the



monument was relocated closer to Tallahassee proper, near the entrance of Maclay Gardens. The monument stayed there without incident until US Highway 319 was widened to six lanes in the late 1990's/early 2000's.

During road construction, the monument was stored in an equipment shed at Maclay Gardens State Park. During the storage period, **Anna Jackson Chapter 224 UDC President Sue Cowger** negotiated with the Road Contractor for a new location and for the monument's re-installation. Also, during this time, minor repairs were completed on the monument by Compatriot **Rocky Bevis**. It is unclear when the monument

was moved to its current location, but probably after 2010. The photo shows the monument with reconditioned plaque at the time of its re-installation.

In 2021, some evil perpetrator stole the plaque off the monument. The plaque had very little "scrap' value since it was iron and not bronze.

Last year, 2023, Finley's Brigade, Anna Jackson UDC, and the Historic Cemetery Preservation of North Florida, Inc. decided to restore the dignity of this monument. We consulted with our friend Charles Hall of Hall Monuments of Donalsonville, GA on options for restoration. Mr. Hall recommended engraving the existing marble instead of installing another plaque.





Mr. Hall designed the engraving on the monument as it stands now.

Historic Cemetery Preservation did the landscaping around the monument.

The headstone has been received for **Benjamin Saxon**. The application was originally denied by the V.A. but was later approved. His headstone arrived six days after its approval, which I believe is a record.

Mr. Saxon died in the line of duty. He was sheriff of Hernando Co. when he died in Tallahassee. The design for the extra emblem and wording for the back of his headstone has been settled on and is in the hands of Halls Monuments. I will set a date for the installation at a later date.

Headstone applications for **J.Q. Gallagher and Edward Gallagher** (no known relation) have been completed and mailed. All are buried in the Tallahassee Old City Cemetery. The headstones have been delivered and will be sent to Hall Monuments for extra engraving. The replacement headstone for **Hugh Black** has been received and was delivered to Hall Monuments. A template was created, the inscription was engraved, and the headstone is back in our hands. I have not scheduled a work day for the removal of the existing headstone and the planting of the new replacement headstone. I will let the camp know when the work day is scheduled at Fort Braden Cemetery.

An alternate date of December 2 was scheduled to paint the fence at Solders Cemetery in Quincy. As some may not know the original date of the 21st of October was scheduled. Unfortunately, I had an accident that morning and the paint was ruined in the process. I was on crutches for a few weeks. The only thing that was done at Solders was the planting of a tree. It appears that we are in a weather pattern that includes wet weather on the weekends. I have decided to not plan anything till after the New Year.

P.S. for our Lee/Jackson I am issuing a rare book alert. I was able to acquire a new, never been sold before, first edition, low printing (less than 2,500 printed), hardback book. This book will be put up at auction and will be awarded to the highest bidder. All I can say at this time is the book covers our time period and is a modern, not ancient, book about a certain geographic area of the lower south. This will make an excellent addition to your personal library. I obtained a copy for my personal library several years ago and still read it from time to time.

Chaplain's Corner

1 Thessalonians 5:17 "Pray without ceasing"

As a boy, I used to love to go to Aunt Ina and Uncle Herbert's in Warrenton, Georgia. Aunt Ina was my grandma's baby sister. She and Uncle Herbert lived in an old two-story farm house out in the country. There was a pond past the garden and through the woods. It was a great place, if you were a ten-year-old boy! The thing I liked the most was the old hand pump or "pitcher pump" just off the back porch in the yard.

I'm sure I've just lost most of the readers of this who are under fifty. A pitcher pump is a pump that is hand powered. One must work the handle up and down to get water in the ground up through the pipe and out through the spout. Now, here's the tricky part. One must always remember to save some water in a container during each use to "prime" the pump the next time it will be used. There was always a container of some kind, full of water by the pump. When I was really young, Daddy told me the reason for the "priming water." He said, "We have to use this little bit of water here to get to all that water down in the ground."

There is a Biblical principle here. PRAYER is the "priming water" to get to ALL the blessings that it will produce. Look in the Word of God, and you will find that anytime something great happened, back up just a little bit, and you will see that prayer was made. In the Book of Acts in Chapter 12, we see the account of the Apostle Peter being freed from Herod's prison. What brought that about? The "priming water" is in Verse 5: "Peter therefore was kept in prison: but <u>PRAYER WAS MADE</u> without ceasing of the church unto God for him." In the Book of Acts again, this time in Chapter 4 and Verse 31.
