The Call From Advent

"See, I will send my messenger, who will prepare the way before me. Then suddenly the Lord you are seeking will come to his temple; the messenger of the covenant, whom you desire, will come," says the LORD Almighty." - Malachi 3:1 NIV

The Latin word *Adventus* is the root word from which we have received Advent. In Latin the word holds a whole lot of

meaning. Its core meaning is indeed how we know it, the anticipation of an arrival, an approach, something special coming. Of course, as with all languages there are also cultural meanings that round out the meaning for all. This cultural meaning is where we grasp the depth why our faith ancestors decided to use this word to describe this season. The first of these was that Adventus was the name given to the preparation work for the ceremonies that happened when the emperor was expected to arrive. The second is that it was also used to describe the appearance of something very important or even the ripening of fruit. So, it is indeed, the expectation of and preparation for something special.

In our Christian world that sense has been lost somewhat. In our sacramental tradition family it is still full of liturgical practices that include keeping "Christmas" music away from worship, Jesus hasn't arrived so we can't celebrate it yet! The non-sacramental side that includes us Baptist regularly either ignores it or becomes a sermon series on 4 words and a chance to sing Christmas songs.

However, I'd like to remind us all that there is something about the word that calls to action. A call that goes beyond the usual calls of

Believing in Miracles



"36 And behold, your kinswoman Elizabeth in her old age has also conceived a son; and this is the sixth month with her who was called barren. 37 For

with God nothing will be impossible." 38 And Mary said, "Behold, I am the handmaid of the Lord; let it be to me according to your word." And the angel departed from her."- Luke 1:36-38 (RSV)

As we approach the season of Advent anew, I would like to reflect on the concept of miracles. In my work with various denominations, traditions, and theologies, I have encountered a diverse range of responses to the possibility of miracles. Some are skeptical, while others view them as allegorical, and still others see them as actual acts of divine intervention. Whatever your perspective, I think it is essential to recognize that the canon of scripture reveals that God loves us and is actively engaged with our world. Straying from these beliefs would likely bring us closer to Aristotle and forms of Epicureanism than to our Christian heritage. Aristotle understood God as an "unmoved mover," distant from the workings and concerns of the universe. There is something profoundly countercultural to believe that God is intimately concerned with our struggles and works in the power of Love to bring about restoration and renewal. Indeed, even more baffling is that God would choose the

miracle of incarnation, where God takes solidarity with us and our vulnerabilities, to declare that GOD IS WITH US.

This should not be new knowledge for many of the preachers who read this article, but it is worth repeating. When we struggle with our ministries and mission, we can be tempted to declare an implicit theology that God is removed from our struggles, and we are alone in our suffering. At times, when we are struggling, we can forget that miracles are not a theoretical discussion, but it is a challenge to believe that hope can arise when it does not seem sensible. It is a belief that LIGHT can arise from DARKNESS. It is a belief that God can create ex nihilo (lit. out of nothing). When we struggle, it is important to ground ourselves in the fact that God is not watching our challenges with indifference. The story of Christ reminds us that God stands in solidarity with our vulnerability, and in that solidarity, miracles are possible. When we struggle, the most important thing to believe is that hope is possible. Romans 8:24-25 exhorts the church to remember that hope is for the future and for things not yet received. "Who hopes for what they already have?" Hope is necessary for us to overcome the fear of the present times. Hope believes that God will pave the way forward for a future marked by God's love and gracious intervention.

Whatever your ministry, renew your belief in hope for Advent. Believe in the miracle of God's solidarity with your weakness. Even when there is overwhelming evidence of death and despair, God can create miracles. May you be blessed with an awareness of miracles and hope in this season of Advent.

Password Managers: Why Keeping Everything in a Notebook Isn't Cutting It Anymore, Part III

Today, we're going to talk about ProtonPass, another password manager designed to help you log in safer and faster. Pro-

tonPass has a lot of the same features as the others we've talked about; it stores all passwords in an encrypted "digital vault", allows you to create strong, unique passwords for every account (and allows for quick password changes when necessary), and it automatically fills in passwords when needed.

There are a couple of perks that make ProtonPass different from the others. First, it works on unlimited devices from day one. You don't have to pay extra for a mobile, tablet or a PC version. Second, your free version has unlimited password generation; there is no limit on the number of logins you can store, and you can also store notes for each account ("Mom's Google", "Alice's Wifi", etc). Lastly, your data is never sold or shared with advertisers, which means no ads. And, ProtonPass doesn't track your behavior.

ProtonPass is based in Switzerland, which has very strict privacy laws. It was created by the ProtonMail team, which is a secure email platform. And if you choose to use a paid version, which is only \$1.99 a month, you get Premium features, which include a built in two factor authentication system, dark web

monitoring, emergency access, customer support, and more.

You can go to proton.me/pass to sign up and download the apps onto your devices. As usual, create one strong master password you can remember, and then you can allow the app to import passwords you may have saved in your browser or enter yours in manually. And if you forget your master password, there are recovery options. From that point on, you can start adding passwords every time you log into a site.



A Testimony About the Matupi People in Chin State in Burma

On Saturday, November 22, at Panther Lake Community Church, there was a meeting of Alliance of Asian American Baptist Churches in the Pacific Northwest. During this

Good Afternoon to brothers and sisters in Christ.

Today, I want to speak directly to the pain, the fear, and the heartbreak that so many from Matupi and across Chin

State have car-

ried in recent years. Many of us have watched our hometowns change in ways we never imagined. We have seen things no family should ever see. And yet, here we stand held by God, strengthened by faith, and united by hope.

The truth is this, the people of Matupi have

endured deep suffering. There have been air strikes and bombings that shattered homes and shook entire villages. Hospitals that once cared for families have been damaged or abandoned. Schools that once echoed with children's laughter now sit empty, silent, or destroyed. Neighborhoods that were full of life are now quiet, with most of the young people gone, leaving behind mostly the elderly, trying to survive with almost nothing.

And so many of our brothers and sisters have had to flee. Some walked for days through

mountains and forests with nothing but faith in their hearts...hoping to reach India, or at least reach safety. Some made it. Some are still on the journey. And heartbreakingly... some did not

make it far enough. Families have lost loved ones along the way, not because they wanted to leave home, but because they were desperately trying to stay alive. These are the kinds of wounds that do not heal quickly.

Church, these are not just stories. These are our people. These are our families. These are our memories. These are our tears.

And yet... even in all of this...God has not abandoned Matupi. The world may see a remote region, a small town pushed into hardship but God sees a people of extraordinary courage.

He sees the grandparents who stay behind to protect what is left. He sees the mothers who carry their children across mountains. He sees the youth who work abroad and send every dollar home. He sees the fathers who pray through the night, even when they cannot protect their families physically. He sees every step, every cry, every prayer.

When the hospitals fall, God becomes the healer. When the schools are destroyed, God becomes the teacher. When homes are burned, God becomes the shelter. When the future looks uncertain, God becomes the hope that cannot be shaken.

The Bible tells us: "Those who sow with tears will reap with songs of joy." And I believe there will be a day in God's time, when the people of Matupi will rise again with joy, with restoration, with new beginnings.

So today, church, let us pray deeply: For those who lost their homes. For those who lost family members along the escape routes. For those who are still missing. For those who are elderly and left behind with nowhere to go. For the children who have no school to return to. For the families walking across borders with only faith to carry them forward.

Let us pray for protection, for healing, and for strength. But let us also pray for restoration, that one day, the hills of Matupi will be full again...full of families, full of children, full of life.

Church, even in your pain, you have not lost your identity. You have not lost your courage. You have not lost your faith. And God has not lost sight of you.

Hold on to hope. Hold on to one another. And above all, hold on to God because He is holding on to Matupi.
