Listening & Responding as Prayer

An important breakthrough in my spiritual life was changing my approach to prayer. In my past upbringing, I would often view prayer as a place where

I felt obligated to send detailed petitions to God. Why did I not realize that God already knew what I was concerned about before I prayed? In many prayer meetings that I facilitated, I noticed that we often not only gave God our requests, but we would also tell God how we thought God should answer them. We came with a fixed mindset and predetermined how God should help us, which struck me as problematic. After studying the theology of many saints from the Middle Ages and other contemplative traditions, I reconsidered Paul's challenging exhortation to "pray at all times." (Ephesians 6:18) From this passage, I discovered that prayer is not so much an individual action but a lifestyle of constantly engaging with God in all that we are.

The scripture of James 1:18 inspired me to consider what it would be like if my prayer life came before God as being "quick to listen, slow to speak..." With this idea, I began to consider prayer as much more of a place where I come to listen to the Spirit and the world around me, and THEN I would respond

to what I heard through heart, mind, spirit, and action. This shift in mindset very much informs my most recent season of ministry and inspired my work with the Pneuma Initiative in Evergreen. It is about listening to the Spirit, and then we respond in action. Much of our difficulties in ministry happen when we come in with prescribed and predetermined assumptions about what God should do and what the people of God should do. By adopting an open heart of humility and curiosity, we are more receptive to being led by the Spirit and to addressing the unmet needs of the world.

For this coming year, let's all join in this lifestyle of listening to the Spirit and responding in action to a world in need. I am so grateful for our partnership in the work of the Good News of God's Grace. Blessings to you in the journey ahead.

Password Managers: Why Keeping Everything in a Notebook Isn't Cutting It Anymore, Part IV

Today, we're going to talk about Keeper Security, also known as Keeper, another password manager designed to help you log

in safer and faster. (I do apologize if these password manager articles look more like product ads; I want to be sure you are all as informed as possible.) Keeper has a lot of the same features as the other password protectors; it stores all passwords in an encrypted "digital vault", allows you to create strong, unique passwords for every account (and allows for quick password changes when necessary), and it automatically fills in passwords when needed.

Keeper has a couple of features you may not find in the other password managers. It has Family and Personal plans, which allow you to increase your security. In the Family plan, each family member (up to five) gets their own password vault for their own personal passwords and passkeys. There's no need to share one account. With the Personal plan, the only person you have to worry about is yourself. Both work on unlimited devices from day one.

Keeper allows users to use autofill, which can be handy when dealing with multiple websites at once. Users can also share passwords without compromising their own accounts, plus unlimited password generation and logins, with 10GB of storage. It's a great way to, say, share the WiFi password without giving access to your email account too. If, however, something goes wrong and someone does need to access that account, Keeper has an emergency access option. And, you can sync your data across all of your devices. Lastly, Keeper also comes with 24/7 customer service.

Keeper is a subscription based service. You are billed annually; families pay \$84.99 annually (7.08/month), but here's the best part: for the individual limited account (one device, ten passwords and no autofill, emergency access or sharing), it's free! If you'd like the perks, though, you'd pay \$39.99 (\$3.33/month).

If you'd like to try Keeper, you can sign up at www.keepersecurity.com using your email. From there, download the app onto your phone, create a strong password and start moving your passwords into the app. Or, you can find the Keeper extension for your browser, and install it there.

At the same time there are very many for whom life goes on as normal. The cost of living has gone up more than expected, health insurance will be very difficult for many of us, and many other things. Overall, however, life is still as it has always been. Work, bills, family, church and more are just going on as usual. The regular worries of life have not changed fundamentally so it is easy to just keep on going.

Curiously, the gap between one group and the other seems to be larger than it has been in a very long time. Whereas a great many among us had a most wonderful and merry Christmas along family and friends there was a whole other side where parties were canceled, fewer gifts where bought, good byes in the mornings took on a meaning beyond words, plans have had to be made, power of attorneys drafted for children, life has been turned upside down. Both these sides live close to each other. In fact, we are in constant proximity to each other even though the side that had a merry Christmas might not even notice but certainly benefits from the other group's work. The gap between us and our lives is indeed larger than it has been in decades.

May I propose that if this January is back to normal and even a little boring for you, that this passage encourage you to look around and pay attention. Arise and shine! Shine a light around you. Point the light toward the least of these in your world. See how they are trying to just make it through another day. "Arise, shine, for your light has come, and the glory of the LORD rises upon you. ² See, darkness covers the earth and thick darkness is over the peoples..." Then, when you see what is happening around you remember you can be light to this world. You are not alone for "the LORD rises upon you and his glory appears over you."

Be the light that helps those around you.

A Message to the Euro Caucus about the MLK Jr. Day Worship Service

I've been going to the Martin Luther King Jr. Day worship service for about 10 years. I live in a part of King County densely populated by Euro people and travel 26 miles to get to New Beginnings Christian Fellowship. But it was only when I began asking other Euro people from north County to come, did I ask myself why do I have to go 26 miles? One need only look at a demographic county map to know that segregation is alive and well in King and Thurston Counties. Our Black (as well as Asian immigrant and Latinx) brothers and sisters primarily live in south Seattle, Renton, SeaTac and Kent. A congregant of Wedgwood Community Church who is Black is a realtor. He was showing a house in a white neighborhood in King County to a white couple not long ago. When they came out of the house, they were met by FOUR police cars. A neighbor had called the police saying she suspected there was a robbery going on. The officer in charge had the good sense to apologize, but still, we need not wonder why segregation persists. If we as Euro people, living in dominantly Euro neighborhoods, join in this worship service with our brothers and sisters, we take another tiny step, on this one day of the year, to reclaim our own souls. In this small way, we continue to break the stronghold of segregation. I hope those miles will not keep me from seeing you at New Beginnings Christian Fellowship, 1 PM, Monday, January 19.
