Discerning Together

Greetings in Christ,

The work of the church is hard and challenging in many ways. One of the hardest things is to find a common agreement or consensus on how we should move together as One Body of Christ. This challenge is especially difficult for us in the Baptist tradition, where we value each individual's freedom of the soul. How can

we honor our freedom yet affirm unity when we come together? Every voice is welcome and must be heard, but how do we negotiate the way forward out of all our very different voices?

In the Bible, we see two freedoms of expression at work. In one instance, the tower of Babel in Genesis 11, we see that God bestowed upon the people individual language expressions and it divided the community. As a result, the cacophony of diverse tongues could not work together, and the tower project fell apart. The other instance is in Acts 2 where we see that many were gathered in great diversity of expression of languages, yet when the Holy Spirit came upon the people of God, *they understood each other* and were united in vision and heart. Through the Spirit, they could speak in a common tongue and live out the One Mission that God called them to.

For us to move from Babel to Pentecost, there must be a common ground of the greater good in Christ that we must come around to work together. So how can we discern the calling of the Spirit in our community? St. Ignatius constructed a holy manual, the Spiritual Exercises, which contained the Spiritual Rules of Discernment. He exhorted Christians to seek where the spirit of consolation is and where the spirit of desolation is: in simple terms, find out where the (...continued on page 3)

Intro to Mailchimp

This month, in our series of digital tools, we're going to talk about Mail-Chimp. In a nutshell, MailChimp is "a marketing automation and

email marketing platform", according to its website. This allows a church to send multiple emails, create a website, and more. But today, we're going to focus on email only.

There are a number of templates you can use to design your emails in MailChimp. You can either drag and drop the template into your page to use it, or if you happen to have a little coding skill, you can code your own.

MailChimp's filters allow for "segmentation", or the ability to send those emails to certain targeted audiences. Let's say you're looking for people who live in Pennsylvania and opened the last fundraiser email you sent. You can choose those requirements and make sure your next communication goes directly to those people.

One of the best parts of MailChimp is its automations feature. You can set up a series of events to happen before sending out an email. For instance, if someone leaves a comment on your MailChimp powered website, you can set it up to wait a few days and follow up with that person.

Like Canva, MailChimp's paid version of its platform varies with its use. The Premium version is \$350 a month, and there is a \$20 a month standard version, but there is also a free version. There are restrictions on each tier, but remember, in many cases, the free version will do just fine.

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consolation is, move towards it, and stay away from the desolation.

Another way we could say this biblically is to ask: "Which way are the fruits of the Spirit being manifest the most?" (Gal. 5:22-23: "But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, forbearance, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and selfcontrol. Against such things, there is no law.") When we see these fruits arising, we are encouraged to lean into those areas more, and when other kinds of fruit (hatred, jealousy, violence, etc.) manifest, we are encouraged to turn away.

In our congregations, let's identify the places of the church where we see the fruits of the Spirit being harvested. When new ideas or different perspectives come into view, let's test the fruit of our proposals and perspectives. Follow the Spirit of Consolation together, and in doing so, we will find a way to be united in mission just as the people of God were at Pentecost.

Meet our Global Servants: Kyle and Katrina Williams

The second set of our Global Servants that we're highlighting in our ongoing series are Kyle and Katrina Williams. They currently serve in Thailand, and previously served in Congo, and lived in Nicaragua for a year. After meeting in High School, though they went to different schools, they got married and were serving as youth leaders at First Baptist Church of Everett, an ABC church. Increasingly they felt called to ministry outside the US. In part this was due to wanting to explore and understand other cultures, and in part it was due to wanting to see how the church showed up in spaces that were culturally and politically different from the United States.

Kyle shared that they've always felt a "pull to the margins," to the places and people that so often get overlooked by those with wealth and power. They went to Nicaragua for a year first, and then joined International Ministries and were sent to Congo, where they served in the Finance Department of the Pastoral Institute of Kikongo, in a place so remote you had to catch a plane ride to get groceries. After a few years in Congo, they served a year of Home Assignment, getting to both debrief about their service in Congo and spending solid time with their families. That was especially important because of their

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four children, Ian (now a junior at University of Washington), Adi (now a junior in High School), Eli (now a freshman in High School) and Abram (now a 7th grader).

After some prayer and discernment, they came to see that God was calling them into a different place, and began serving in Thailand starting in 2020. Katrina serves as a teacher at the Chiang Rai International Christian School, teaching secondary level science, and academic success for students, especially

those with learning differences. Some of her best moments have been in the day-to-day work helping students with dyslexia achieve academic success.

Kyle's work is with a few different organizations. Hope Theological Seminary, a seminary specifically founded to help train and empower refu-

gees from Burma who serve their displaced communities has an ongoing Peace Program, which works on teaching negotiation and dialogue, as well as conflict transformation, and inspiring student movements through art. He works on monitoring the peace process as it develops, however fitfully, in Burma. He is also working with the Karen Association of Churches in Thailand as they develop out their relief arm, helping serve those refugees from the violence and oppression in Burma. And finally with the Mekong Minority Foundation, which organizes churches to realize practical ways to be in community in Thailand. One way this foundation helps is by



connecting children with cleft palates with surgeons who can help fix their mouths. Even here in the United States they find ways to serve others. Given the polarization of the church here in the US, Katrina believes "being a bridge between people is an important part of our ministry these days." Kyle and Katrina visit all over the States during the months they're here, reminding others and themselves that, in Kyle's words "Christ's call is to love people who aren't like you." This is work they intend to continue doing in Thai-

> land, here in the US, and wherever God may call them in the future. Kyle was recently recommended for ordination at Panther Lake Community Church by an Evergreen Ordination Council in May. Though the process took a bit longer than normal, in part thanks to the pandemic, and in part be-

cause of living abroad. You can come celebrate his ordination at Panther Lake Community Church on Sunday, August 25th at 2pm. More information, and a formal invitation will be shared soon.
