He said therefore, "What is the kingdom of God like? And to what should I compare it? It is like a mustard seed that someone took and sowed in the garden; it grew and became a tree, and the birds of the air made nests in its branches." - Luke 13:18-19 NRSV

What does it mean to be a Native?
I am sure you can search that on your own and I encourage you to do so.

This question has been occupying my mind coming up to our Native Heritage month. Obviously, I am not qualified to answer that

question but here is someone who is, "Humankind has not woven the web of life. We are but one thread within it. Whatever we do to the web, we do to ourselves. All things are bound together. All things connect." - Chief Seattle, Duwamish

There is a clear thread of connection everywhere I read about being Native. Makes sense, the word is about being rooted in a specific place. But this month we are encouraged to think about this sense of belonging in the context of those on whose stolen land we live. This is where Chief Seattle's description above gains its power, it is a profound awareness of our belonging TO something greater than ourselves, not just being proud of one's place of birth. That difference can change worlds if we live into it.

That brings me to the passage in the beginning. This story gets its power through a native lens. Too often we get the diluted, foreigner version, if your faith were as small as a tiny grain of mustard you could...

But it takes a native to be hit fully with the power of Jesus' words. What was mustard then? Why would anyone intentionally plant a weed most people want to be rid of? Worse, let it grow enough so even birds could live in it! Who would give up their land to weeds?

Maybe something can be a weed and life giving at the same time. Maybe engaging with a weed can help us live together for mutual benefit. Maybe it is about resilience. Few things are as difficult to eradicate as this weed. Can what Jesus is bringing about be as resilient as that?

Media Corner—Social Media Series, Part 7: TikTok

By Min. Shavon Walker This month, in our Social Media Series, we're going to talk about TikTok, also known as Douyin. It was created in China in 2016, but there isn't a lot of information on who its



creators are. In the beginning, TikTok was a short form video hosting service, with videos up to 15 seconds long. Now, videos can be as long as 10 minutes. It was originally designed to be a phone application; as a result, when it was released in markets outside of China in 2017, it was made available for Android and iOS users. Later, it was made available for computer browsers such as Chrome and Firefox. When TikTok merged with another Chinese social media service called musical.ly, it was released worldwide.

As mentioned before, TikTok's main function is short form video. It allows for direct messaging among users, but it doesn't have any of the posting functions that Facebook, Discord and others do. That said, users can not only post videos with background music, some images and text, but they can also "Go Live", which allows them to stream live video. This is similar to many of the other social media sites we've talked about previously.

TikTok also has a "duet" feature, which lets users interact side by side with a different video. The "react" feature does something similar; the person reacting to video content is in a small window, while the video they're reacting to is full screen. TikTok's "For You" page shows users content based on what they have interacted with or searched for on the app. All created content can be set to "Private", "Public", or "Friends Only", just as with other apps.

TikTok has run into a number of issues with privacy. In July 2022, the head of the FCC called on the CEOs of Apple and Google to remove the app from their stores, stating that "TikTok poses an unacceptable national security risk due to its extensive data harvesting being combined with Beijing's apparently unchecked access to that sensitive data." Part of the problem is that TikTok isn't clear about how it uses the data it collects, unlike other apps. TikTok's head pf Public Policy in the Americas responded by calling the allegations "false", and noting that the app does not collect browser history. Other countries, however, are being more proactive. India banned the app over privacy concerns. It has also been banned for "immoral and indecent" content in Pakistan. In spite of this, TikTok remains a popular application. If you choose to use it, try to use it in a computer and in a browser instead of on your phone. If you'd like to protect yourself further, you can use an incognito browser to log into the app, or use a browser that doesn't track data, such as DuckDuckGo. And, of course, the usual safety rules apply: be careful about the type of information you put on TikTok, be sure to only friend people that you trust, watch out for "spoof" accounts, which are accounts that look like people you know but are scammers in disguise, and remember that you have the option to switch your account to Public or Private at any time. 


