To Love Hesed

"With what shall I come before the Lord...

He has told you, O mortal, what is good; and what does the LORD require of you but to do justice, and to love kindness, and to walk humbly with your God?"

- Micah 6:8

"...and what does the Lord require of you... to love kindness (Hesed)"

You might have noticed that this word has been translated in different ways in English. In this particular translation we have kindness, others say mercy and more. The reason is that the Hebrew word does not exist in English and its meaning is too broad and deep for any particular English word to hold. This is why we see different words in varied translations, every translation is an interpretation by a person and a committee.

So what does Hesed mean?

The word is full of broad and deep care and love for the other. It includes unconditional love, loyalty, good will for the other and more. Further, the word also includes a tone, inflection to action on behalf of those in need. No word in English can hold what this word holds in Hebrew.

One way we can explore what this word might mean in our lives is to compare it with Justice as we read last month. To begin with we must

Agents of Change

Greetings in Christ,

As I continue my dissertation, I have been reflecting upon how we can effectively change the local church. Wherever we go,

we can find stories of transformation, but we can also find stories of entrenchment and stagnation. There is no shortage of resources available to congregations today: each tool being offered is often presented as the sure-fire solution to our insurmountable challenges. If it were so simple, the entire Christian church as we know it would not be struggling as it does today. The never-ending search for a vibrant and transformative church continues. In many ways, we are seeking to answer the question: who can bring about the change we seek?

It is not always easy to identify where the real agents of change come from. Often, it is assumed that it is through the wise and resourceful pastor, or the completely committed lay leader, and/or committees. From this perspective, we are tempted to believe that whoever can strategically leverage their influence the most can bring about lasting change to the congregation. We put so much energy into understanding the systems, structures, and bylaws of our churches so we can about the best possible outcome to serve our personal agendas. However well-intentioned this may be, this approach can often lead to fostering a toxic culture of politics

and power-grabbing.

Real change happens not just from a pastor or a committee. Real change happens when a congregation understands every member (lay and clergy) is an equal partner in constructing the mission and future of the church together. It is also important to realize that the change agents of the church are not confined to only the people within the church. Congregations must consider the community they serve as a partner as well. The people they serve are not just objects of service, but voices that should speak into the church and refine its vision and practice. Most important of all, churches must recognize that the Spirit's presence and leadership must center all that we do. The task of uniting a diverse body of individuals in a church requires a mutual agreement of the community to spiritually discern what God is doing in their church's current context.

How can we alleviate the pressure upon the pastor that makes them feel like they must be the main driving force of change? How can congregations learn to trust the people in their community and the people outside of their community to continually shape and evolve their congregation? Most importantly, how can the church come together to hear the common calling from the Spirit to love God and neighbor? There is no single agent of change. In concert and connection, we come together to faithfully transform our world for the sake of Christ. We encourage every church within the Evergreen Association to join us as we strive to do this. Together, we are all agents of change.

Password Managers: Why Keeping Everything in a Notebook Isn't Cutting It Anymore, Part I

Hey folks. For the next few weeks, we're going to talk about password managers, and today we're going to focus on

1Password. Unfortunately, many of these password managers aren't free...but in this case, you get what you pay for, and the price isn't very expensive at all. That said, we'll talk more about that in a bit.

Like other managers, 1Password stores all your passwords in an encrypted "digital vault". Instead of having to remember (or write down) a bunch of different passwords, you only need to remember one (just remember that that password should be fairly advanced; look back at my other articles for ways to create good, memorable passwords!). It can create strong, unique passwords and automatically fills them into sites when you need them. It also works on your computer, phone and tablet simultaneously.

1Password has excellent customer service. You don't have to worry about a bot here; real people answer the phone and respond to emails. You can share passwords with other people in your household if you all have 1Password accounts. If you like to travel, this app can hide sensitive data when you cross borders. And most important of all, 1Pass-

word will alert you when your passwords are found in a data breach so you can change them, which is a simple process. Again, you don't have to remember any of these old or new passwords. 1Password does it for you.

And now to the question on everyone's mind. How much does it cost? Like other password managers, 1Password is a subscription based service. You have the option to be billed monthly or annually, and annual billing gives you a \$1/month discount. With that in mind, individuals pay \$2.99/month annually, and families pay \$4.99/month. There's also a 14 day free trial. There are other packages for businesses and Microsoft Teams users, but we won't get into that here.

If you'd like to try 1Password, you can sign up at 1password.com using your email. From there, download the app, create a strong password and start moving your passwords into the app. Don't worry too much about hacking; 1Password hasn't had a hacking problem since 2023, and they were able to shut down suspicious activity before any customer or employee data was exposed.

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remember the message assumes love for others. Therefore to love *hesed* is to love caring for others in deeper ways than a passing smile or thoughts and prayers. It carries the responsibility to do something about what others have to live through or suffer under.

To love *hesed* means to explore what "the least of these" are living under and then to take the step and ask, what can I do about the structure doing this to them. That question can take us to interesting places. For example, could it possibly be true that all people who are poor have so little because they are lazy? Could it be true that our societal and governmental systems have nothing to do with people going without? How can someone pull themselves up by their bootstraps if our systems actively prevent them from having either? Never mind that the origins of that phrase were to highlight the futility of rich people telling the poor during the guilded age to work themselves out of poverty. As in, "I might as well lift myself out of this with my bootstraps."

Lastly, to love kindness (hesed) is to love the process of seeing who is being oppressed then working to change the very world around us to help them no longer continue to be abused. Not because they are related to us, our friends or our own "kind," but because God calls us to change the very reality we are living under to minimize the suffering around us.


