There are very few certainties in our world any-

more. We're living in the tail end of what has been called post-modernism. Though it is widely misunderstood, overall the term refers to the idea that we can no longer assume that the "truths" we have been taught are universal. My personal take on these "truths" is that what we have been taught is a mixture of a specific group's understanding and desire to control or feel a part of a group. There is truth in our world. The problem is that too many of us live with the certainty that the opinion or perspectives we like best are the truth.

This problem of perception vs. actual truth has us in conflict with each other. We are being flooded with the idea that the only way to be respected is to control society and to crush the other side. It should baffle the mind that millions in our country define themselves by a political party name! Worse still, that anyone who calls themselves a follower of the opposing party is a suspect on sight. Is there a better season, coming to our elections, to shout out to the world that our God given diversity is not a problem. That those who see the world differently than we do aren't to be suppressed or crushed. That not getting all I want does not mean I am being oppressed. That our body "is not made up of one part but of many." Is there a better time to shout out to the world that there is no freedom without making room for significant differences, even those that make our blood boil?

We at EBA are living in a community the world outside thinks impossible. I once had a conversation with a church that had been intentionally ignored by their associational body because of their theological perspectives. When I told them how EBA embraces theological diversity, and we live together in and through

Three Sister Churches Worship and Fellowship Together

Three of the churches affiliated with Evergreen make use of the same facilities in Kent, Washington: the Panther Lake Community Church, the Karen Community Church of Greater Seattle, and the Washington Kachin Baptist Church. The three congregations have interacted many times over the years, but an extra effort at seeing each other as partners in ministry has taken place since the Karen church moved to Panther Lake late in 2021. The most recent event shared by all three took place on Sunday, August 14th, beginning with an outdoor worship service at the front of the church property and continuing with a picnic at the rear. The service and the picnic were planned by a committee made up of representatives of all three congregations as a way for their members to get to know each another.

Pastors Hkun Naung of Washington Kachin and John Armagost of Panther Lake led the service. (Pastor Maggie Po of Karen Community was in Thailand at that time, where she was able to watch the service online.) The service featured the reading of three Scripture passages (Ephesians 4:1-6, 1 Corinthians 12:12-14, and Colossians 3:14-16) on the subject of unity, each read in Karen, English, and Kachin. There was no sermon but there was a children's message based on the Corinthians passage. Music was provided by each congregation: the prelude by young Kachin violinists, praise songs led by the Karen music team, a guitar solo from Panther Lake, and group songs from each of the three churches.

Worship leaders and musicians made their presenta-

tions from the deck in front of the sanctuary entrance, and worshipers sat on chairs and mats on the lawn, under trees and canopies, and at the edge of the front parking lot. Over 100 people were present, with good representation from each church. After worship, as picnic foods were being set out, papers were distributed for a game that participants were invited to play, which called for them to speak with many others.

The event seemed to meet many significant needs. Held entirely outside on a beautiful summer day, it was tailored to meet the protocols of the continuing pandemic while providing everyone with an opportunity to feel connected with others. As it turned out, it took place on a Sunday when the sanctuary was not available. Installation of a new floor had started during the previous week and was only halfdone by the weekend. So many things came together to make Sunday, August 14th, a memorable one for the three churches and their members.

Media Corner—Social Media Series, Part 5: Twitter

This month, in our Social Media Series, we're going to talk about Twitter. Twitter was created in 2006, by a handful of coworkers at a podcasting company. Jack Dorsey, Noah Glass, Biz



Stone, and Evan Williams created a platform where people could share short messages with groups. In the beginning, Twitter was used for extremely short status updates, which had to be 140 characters or less.

Twitter users still post short status updates, but the character count has been increased to 280 characters. They can also publish, upload and view streaming and recorded videos as well as images on their accounts, which they can set to private or public. Others can comment, retweet (republish on their own accounts) or share the content on a different platform. Users can "like" or "dislike" content and report inappropriate content. Hashtags, which are words or phrases prefaced by the "#" sign, are used to group posts together.

Users can click on a hashtag and see all posts related to that topic. Twitter also has Lists, which allows users to see tweets from only the accounts on that list. Lastly, users can subscribe, or "follow", others' tweets, which allows them to see their tweets on their page. In addition, there are many, many tools that work with Twitter, including bit.ly and t.co (which shorten URLs), TweetDeck (which creates a dashboard interface), and TwitPic (which creates a photo gallery from images).

Twitter has had its share of security issues. In 2007, a vulnerability that allowed hackers to post to someone else's account using their phone number was discovered. In 2019, hackers discovered a flaw that allowed them to take over an account and see private info of Android users. In 2022, email addresses and phone numbers could be linked to a user's account through a bug, and that flaw was exploited by malicious users. All of the security issues were fixed as soon as they were discovered.

Twitter also has had issues with "bots", which are Twitter accounts that are controlled by a certain kind of software. Twitter bots are designed to tweet and retweet content on a large scale. These bots can be use to create fake accounts. In 2017, Twitter shut down over 7,000 fake accounts run by malicious influencers and occasionally bots. They did the same in 2018 to avoid malicious election influence, and removed almost 6,000 accounts for violating manipulation policies in 2019. As of 2022, Twitter is focusing its anti misinformation campaign on the top three countries involved.

Twitter has made strides toward avoiding hate speech and other offensive content on its platform. It implemented reporting and blocking policies, banned multiple accounts that had ties to QAnon in July of 2020, and began blocking URLs in tweets that link to external malicious content. So when you're using Twitter, be careful about the type of information you post, be sure to only follow people that you trust, remember that you can't delete a tweet once you post, watch out for spoof and bot accounts, and remember that you have the option to switch your account to Public or Private at any time.




Registration is live!
