As the father of two boys I live longing for silence whenever I am home. In fact, one of my calming times of the day is when Anna and the boys leave for school. As soon as the door closes I am wrapped by a calming silence pregnant with the promise of the luxury of a leisurely cup of coffee I can sip at length. Sadly all of the joy from my kids not being home ended *again* this

past week. When my family left on the morning after the massacre I was crushed on all sides by a coarse cloth of worry full of piercing, scratchy, and harsh thoughts asking questions like, *What if this silence is now permanent? What if they don't come back?*

I was so worried I irrationally thought, maybe I can work from my car in front of the school? Or, maybe the parents can take turns hanging out in the school's parking lot? It took me a good bit to fully realize that I too had fallen for the untruth we're being sold that there is nothing we can do beyond "hardening the target." The idea that making schools into forts prepared for a firefight at any moment is a viable option has seeped into our world as though it were a reasonable thought!

Then I cried for those parents.

The families for whom the "going to school silence" is now permanent. I cried because that type of silence cannot be ended with noise, even the noise from new children being brought to that home. Yes, every parent knows there is good and bad silence. We enjoy the good silence that comes from the children playing well with each other or even better, because they're enthralled by a book. There is also bad silence but up until recently that bad silence was the type where the children are elsewhere in the house but one can no longer hear what they're doing. I used to be annoyed by that silence since it usually means a big clean up or something like that. But the permanent silence that comes from one's child being murdered is the most unwanted silence I can imagine. This silence is so brutal in its permanence. How can one explain the pain of knowing one's child's laughter will never be heard again from that child? What condolences could possibly be shared to assuage the pain that one will never again hear, "Mom/Dad watch this!" God damn that unwanted silence.

Changing Hearts and Minds, Learnings from my Anti-Racism Journey

Racist!...My mind went blank; my heart began pounding. What could I have said or done to cause that kind of pain?? I shrank back, wanting to be invisible. The budding relation-

ship with my colleague withered. I had hurt a valued Black colleague, and I didn't even know how. Silence followed. I didn't talk with her about the incident or seek to learn about what racism means and how I reflected it. Instead fear and shame drove me to retreat to my white bubble.

In this article I share stories about the anti-racism journey I am on, particularly about what has happened thanks to the efforts of those in the Evergreen Association of Baptist Churches (Evergreen) family and Seattle First Baptist Church (SFBC), my home church. The journey has been and continues to be one of stumbling, learning, and recommitting...daily. Gratefully, I also am filled with Grace and the conviction that we are all here to wake up to our own worth and that of our brothers and sisters. Background: SFBC's 153-year history of concern for social and racial justice has been evident since the late 1930s. When I arrived in the 90s each February, we heard from Black leaders, teachers, non-profit directors, and authors through their personal testimony. In 2016 with 11% of our congregation being people of color there was refreshed interest in and commitment to 'waking up' to how our white culture continues to hurt our brothers and sisters of color. **Education:** The fresh interest materialized in a series of classes offered at SFBC in 2016. I valued the classes. However, I later learned how far they missed the mark for a brother of color. No person of color had been included in the planning; anger, disappointment, and mistrust resulted. As with my 'racist' experience, silence followed while leaders began to sort out what had happened and how education efforts going forward could gain credibility and provide some healing.

My learning to this point was largely on an intellectual level. That began to shift when I attended an Evergreen-sponsored leadership retreat on welcoming diversity. There I heard, saw, and felt firsthand the pain that my brothers and sisters of color experience daily. My fear began to transform into compassion and deeper curiosity.

SFBC pastors and lay leaders were learning, too. So, the next education session on anti-racism used <u>White Fragility</u> as a resource for an experiential sixweek course summer of 2020. Dr. Patricia Hunter, SFBC's Black minister, was on the planning team. Participants paired to share their history with white privilege. As I voiced my experience, my accountability for this work grew.

Dr. Hunter asked me in August of 2020 to join the **Evergreen Euro-Caucus Anti-Racism Network** lead by Wim Mauldin; I was all in. The Network represented seven Evergreen congregations. Through focused study and discussion of articles and books like <u>Growing up White, Me and White Supremacy</u>, and <u>How to Be an Antiracist</u>, new perspectives emerged, and we were humbled to learn the extent and depth of our white privilege. The Network supported me in joining and staying on SFBC's newly formed Anti-*...continued on page 4*

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Racism Task Force (ARTF). SFBC had identified becoming an anti-racist church as one of our top goals. **Anti-Racism Task Force:** As a task force we learned early on that our priority was to develop relationships and trust. This was especially true since we represented four different races. We needed to focus on compassionately listening to one another about recurring patterns of hurt and pain BIPOC (Black Indigenous and Others of Color) members were experiencing at church.

My personal brush with causing harm came when I volunteered to do a time-sensitive job for the task force. I blundered badly by following my white tendency to focus on 'goal over process/people' and not working collaboratively enough with the task force. People of color can teach white people more about prioritizing relationships over goals and my not being fully present to this difference caused hurt and a breakdown. Fortunately, I was learning to receive feedback with an open heart, so I was able/willing to hear how negatively my actions had impacted a brother of color. With the skillful facilitation and support of Rev. Jennifer Ikoma-Motsko, he and I were able to re-establish trust and, I had greater clarity on group ground rules.

Progress: Unfortunately, our SFBC BIPOC siblings continue to experience hurt due to the white supremacy culture within our church. Even as we continue to stumble, we all can continue to learn about what it takes to become an anti-racist church. Skillful creation of safe spaces to hear hard truths is key to our learning thanks to Rev. Douglas Avilesbernal, Executive Minister of Evergreen.

Another safe learning space within SFBC for me is Brave Space, an all-white group that meets to discuss and own our blind spots. We practice responding to situations where we have shown our white attitudes or behavior that we want to change. By regularly attending I learn how to prevent hurtful errors and make amends when I do. Sometimes there is pain, most of the time the pain is giving up old ways and opening my mind and my heart to truly welcome all. For me the journey is necessary and worth it. I am braver with a humbler heart. The learning process takes a village - SFBC, Evergreen and the growing relationships I have with brothers and sisters of color keep me on the path. I hope we are on the path together.

This cruelty was enough several enoughs ago.

What are we doing wrong? We are not showing up.

Sadly this hope will remain unrealized while mere discomfort or worse inconvenience continue to be enough to stop us from taking action. The other side is also large and diverse but united and willing to act. They show up, they give money, they vote, they will not be stopped by mere inconvenience. They know our apathy from comfort will allow them to continue the carnage for profits sake. We don't even show up to vote to stop them from making it nearly impossible for minorities to vote. I need to stop my preaching as wise voices are reminding me that I'm coming very close to alienating those who are in favor of free access to firearms, and we must not do that. I do need to hold back as I am too passionate about this to speak reasonably and for that I apologize. So I leave you with someone infinitely better at this than I will ever be. Hear Amanda Gorman.

"This alarm is how we know We must be altered-That we must triumph or try. Thus while hate cannot be terminated, It can be transformed into love that lets us live.

"May we not just grieve, but give: May we not just ache, but act; May our signed right to bear arms Never blind our sight from to shared harm; May we choose our children over chaos. May another innocent never be lost."

Evergreen family, there are more of us than them. Let us act like it and do something.

Media Corner—Social Media Series, Part 2: Facebook

This month in our Social Media Series, we're going to talk about one of the most popular companies, Facebook. Facebook was originally created in 2004 at Harvard



University by Mark Zuckerberg and some friends. Initially, it was meant to give students a place to rate artwork. As time went on, its use changed, and now it's one of the most recognizable social media platforms in the world.

Facebook is by no means the first platform to give people places to communicate with each other in groups or in one on one conversations. But it does go beyond its predecessors by having a News Feed, in which you can see posts from friends without having to go to each profile. There's also Facebook Groups, where you can interact with others who are interested in similar topics, and Facebook Messenger, where you can "chat" (type in real time) with others in your group or have a private conversation with an individual. You can even call someone via Groups without having to know their phone number or do a video chat from your phone. The Facebook Messenger app can be used separately from Facebook itself, so if you don't want to create a full fledged account, you can create a "lite" version just to keep in touch with others.

Facebook has had a number of troubling privacy issues over the years, with everything from leaking information to allowing apps to steal data to attempting to affect user moods based on posts. Most recently, it was discovered that Facebook violated an Illinois law that required companies to get permission from users to store biometric data, which includes information that links faces to individual identities.


So how do you protect yourself? Being careful about the type of information you put on Facebook and the type of games and apps you use are two of the best ways to stay safe. In addition, be sure to only friend people that you trust, and watch out for "spoof" accounts, which are accounts that look like people you know but are scammers in disguise. These points will come up again and again during the series, so be aware of them.
