

Engaged In Ministry Together

Panther Lake Community Church in Kent has had ongoing relationships with churches in the Seattle area that were founded by people from Burma. These relationships, which are expressed in a variety of ways, were clearly visible this year during Holy Week.

On Maundy Thursday evening, worship was conducted by the three congregations that meet in the building: Panther Lake itself, plus the Karen Community Church of Greater Seattle and the Washington Kachin Baptist Church. The service was very simple, featuring readings of ten portions of Scripture narrating events from the preparation for the Last Supper through the burial of Jesus. Each passage was read first in Kachin, then in English, and finally in Karen.

Editor's Notes

Living Into Who We're Called To Be

We're now into the Easter season, those six Sundays between Resurrection Sunday and Pentecost. If your church follows the lectionary, you'll be reading about Jesus's instructions to the disciples from the gospels, and the actions they take as a response to those instructions from the book of Acts. Actions which lead to more and more people being included as followers of Christ, even those no one would have considered just a few months or years before. If your church doesn't follow the lectionary, you'll still be doing exactly what Jesus's disciples had to do following the resurrection: Live into who Jesus is calling you to be.

Because that's the thing, Jesus doesn't call these disciples just to have them continue doing what they did before. When Simon Peter and some of the others just go home after the resurrection, Jesus shows up, challenging them to continue the mission he called them to: living out a redemptive, inclusive love. This time, Easter season is a reminder that we're called to keep faith with our Savior, to serve the least, the last, and the lost. Just as Jesus had a word for the disciples about continuing to serve as they were called, we should be listening for what we're being called to next.

The Evergreen Association of American Baptist Churches is a wonderfully diverse and eclectic group of churches. Not bounded by mere geography, we have sixty-four churches across six different states. We speak many different languages in our worship. Our congregations include people whose families

have been in this country for many generations, and also people who have just come here. We range a broad theological spectrum and have many different styles of worship. Yet, we do not sacrifice the uniqueness of the many different cultures, congregations, and individuals when we join together as a Region for mission, for ministry, or for worship. Rather than demanding assimilation, we celebrate this incredible diversity among us as our greatest strength. The thus far unique in ABC-USA ethnic caucus system we use to do our business together ensures that all voices are heard not just the majority voice.

Evergreen is still answering that call of Jesus, the one that challenges us to live out that same inclusive, redemptive love. As we learn and grow with one another, we are learning how to engage in ways far beyond pleasant and tolerant conversation and to live into real mutuality, and community. Initiatives like the Building Bridges program, with our new Associate Executive Minister of Innovation and Design, Rev. Sam Kim, who will help to promote the renewing of churches, incubate and accelerate innovative ministries, and help new church plants get off the ground. Work like that being done by the Intercultural team, which is helping us understand one another better, and lift up that strength in diversity and live in unity together. And diverse communities living and worshipping together, like the ministries of Panther Lake, Karen Community, Washington Kachin, and Seattle Chin (see page 1), and like Good Shepherd Baptist Church/Iglesia Bautista el Buen Pastor and the Life Fellowship in Lynnwood.

Hymns were sung between readings, and Communion was observed at the appropriate place in the narrative. The service, which was very moving, was attended by a significant number of members from each congregation.



The Easter Sunday morning service at Panther Lake featured six baptisms, with candidates representing four different churches: Seattle Chin Baptist Church and Washington Chin Baptist Church along with Panther Lake and the Karen church. At least three of the candidates have participated in the life of Panther Lake church as well as one of the others. One of the candidates was referred to Panther Lake because she is engaged to a Chin man but does not speak Chin. Panther Lake's pastor John Armagost worked with the pastors of the other churches to prepare the candidate for baptism. Pastor Ramhei Cin of the Seattle Chin Baptist Church joined John in the tank and performed two of the baptisms. Near the end of the service, each pastor offered prayer for those from his or her congregation. (Maggie Po is pastor of the Karen church, and Kawl Tha is pastor of the Washington Chin church.)

The Panther Lake church has hosted one or two other congregations for more than ten years. However, relationships have developed in new and exciting ways since the Karen Community Church began using the facilities last fall. Since they and the Kachin church, like Panther Lake itself, are affiliated with

Evergreen, Pastor John encouraged everyone to think of the relationship not merely as "landlord and tenants," but as partners in ministry. While each of the three congregations remains self-governing and is responsible for planning and carrying out its own ministry, they actively seek ways to engage in ministry together. In the past, monthly meetings of representatives of the churches using the building dealt mostly with details concerning facilities and scheduling. Now they include much more time for sharing about the health and well-being of each congregation and its members and considering ways that we can work together and encourage each other. A recent youth event was attended by twelve young

people representing all three churches. It included preparing and eating a meal together (spaghetti and meatballs, salad, and chocolate chip cookies), jewelry-making, and games. An experimental project still in progress has been to prepare a video of a virtual choir singing a hymn in English, Karen, and Kachin.

Eager to celebrate Evergreen's ethnic diversity, the Panther Lake church observed Black History month during worship each Sunday in February. It will celebrate Asian Heritage month each Sunday during May and Hispanic Heritage month in the fall.
