Post-Secondary Options



This free, one year program offers up to 31 transferrable college credits. In addition to professional training, participants earn an average starting salary of \$18.00 per hour! Click the logo above for more details.

Technical and Junior Colleges

These schools give students an opportunity to obtain Associates Degree in as little as 2 years. Upon completion, students are ready to enter the job market with the training and certifications needed. Some local options include: Atlanta Metropolitan College, Atlanta Technical College, Brown College of Court Reporting and Medical Transcription Brown Mackie College-Atlanta.

In addition to four-year universities and technical institutes, there are a number of different educational avenues available to high school graduates.

Go/ArmyEd.

Many students are unaware of the educational benefits they can gain from the U.S. Military. Click the logo above to find out how to get assistance with GI Bill, College Fund, VEAP, Top-Up and other VA education benefits programs.

AmeriCorps has a number of state programs available for graduates. The 10 month programs allows students the possibility to travel, lead, and be a part of a team.
