## **Blue Water Bridge**

A United States "Port of Entry" was established in 1836 when the first license to provide commercial ferry service between Port Huron, Michigan, and (then known) Port Sarnia was issued. Initially, ferry service was performed by a sailboat; then, steam and paddle wheelers soon followed. Vessels capable of carrying automobiles began service in 1921.

The Blue Water Bridge, designed by Polish-born lead engineer Ralph Modjeski, spans the St. Clair River that links Port Huron, Michigan, United States, and Point Edward, Ontario, Canada. It was fully opened to traffic on October 10, 1938 and connects Highway 402 in Ontario with both Interstate 69 and Interstate 94 in Michigan.


This commemorative Dedication Cover was created for and sponsored by the Port Huron – Sarnia Stamp Club. It is date cancelled October 8, 1938, at Sarnia, Ontario, and franked with the 20¢, dark carmine, Special Delivery Express (Scott #E6); the 3¢, carmine, George VI (Scott #233); and, the 10¢, carmine, Memorial Chamber (Scott #241) postage stamps.

Front post marks include a circular "Sarnia, ONT., 12:30pm, October 8, 1938" and "Blue Water Bridge Opening October 8, 1938" slogan cancel #665. The reverse features a "Sarnia, ONT., 12, October 8, 1938" double cancel.

## **Women's Benefit Association Camp**

Formed in 1898, the "Ladies of the Maccabees", renamed "Women's Benefit Association" in 1915, was the female auxiliary of the "Knights of Maccabees". Essentially a fraternal benefit society that offered life insurance and other financial policies, the W.B.A. became the "North American Benefit Association in 1966 and then, "Woman's Life Insurance Society" in 1996. It was the first fraternal benefit society operated exclusively by and for women. Its corporate headquarters was placed on the National Register of Historic Places in 1982 and is located at 1338 Military Street, Port Huron, Michigan.

The Women's Benefit Association operated summer health and exercise camp clubs for members in Sugar Creek, Pennsylvania; Salamanca, New York; Hollister, Missouri; and, Port Huron, Michigan.

The Commercial Chrome post card was published (c. 1925) by H. H. Hamm Company of Toledo, Ohio. It is franked with the 2¢ carmine, Washington, postage stamp, Scott #554. It was postmarked at Port Huron, Michigan on September 2, 1926 and mailed to Cleveland, Ohio.
