Canada Air Special Delivery

In 1942, Canadian airmail and special delivery services became available as a single, combined postal service. Between 1942 and 1946, four airmail special delivery stamps were issued. Canada's first airmail special delivery stamp (Scott #CE1) was issued on July 1st 1942. Printed in bright ultramarine, it shows a Trans-Canada airplane in flight over Drummondville, Quebec, the site of the Hemmings Falls hydro-electric dam, and one of Canada's most industrialized areas.

In combining both the six-cent airmail rate and ten-cent special delivery rate, the stamp was the first 16¢ stamp issued by the Dominion of Canada. Trans-Canada Airlines was created as a Crown Corporation and operated under its original name from 1937 to 1965, when it was officially renamed Air Canada. The airplane shown is a twin-engine Lockheed, Model 10 Electra, all-metal monoplane, the same type flown by Amelia Earhart in 1937.



Featured above is a First Day Issue cover franked with the 16¢ airmail special delivery stamp (Scott #CE1). Front postal marking includes double "Ottawa, Canada, 10, Jul 1, 42" circular date cancels and a "Fee Claimed by Officer at First Address" overprint in purple to signify the 10¢ special delivery fee was paid upon arrival at the receiving (New York) post office.

In April 1943, an increase in the airmail rate from sixcents to seven-cents necessitated creation of a new 17¢ airmail special delivery stamp (Scott #CE2). The dies of the 16¢ stamp were re-worked, the new rate was inserted, and the new stamp was again printed in the same bright ultramarine color.

Featured below is a First Flight cover franked with the 17¢ airmail special delivery stamp (Scott #CE2) issued to announce Trans Canada Airlines service from Toronto to Cleveland. Front postal marking includes a handsome shield cachet and "Toronto, Ontario, Aug 1, 1946" circular date cancels with seven wavy line machine cancels. *The Air Mails of Canada and Newfoundland* identifies this cover as 4613.



Algiers Motel

Featured above is a (c. 1956) Dexter Natural Color Publishers Company (New York) color post card of the infamous Algiers Motel, located at 8301 Woodward Avenue, Detroit. The motel was demolished in 1979 and is now a "greenspace", locally referred to as Virginia Park.

The Algiers Motel "incident" occurred the night of July 25–26, 1967, when a task force of Detroit Police, Michigan State Police, and Michigan National Guardsmen responded to reports of a sniper at the motel. Three black teenage boys were killed and two white women and seven black men were wounded in the melee, which ultimately sparked the racially charged 1967 Detroit riots.

The post card is franked with the 3¢, deep violet, Statue of Liberty postage stamp, Scott #1057 and was cancelled at Detroit on June 5, 1959, eight years before the riots.
