Samuel Francis Smith (1808-1895), American Baptist minister, journalist, professor, and author is best known for having written "America (My Country, 'Tis of Thee)".



S.F. Smith Memorial, Belle Isle Park

Smith, born in Massachusetts, attended Harvard University and was ordained a Baptist minister in 1834. For the next eight years he served as a pastor in New England as well as professor of modern languages at Waterville College in Maine. He served as editor of the Christian Review in Boston from 1842 to 1848. He is well known for his work with hymns.

Shown above is a commemorative cover celebrating the 100th anniversary of the first singing of "America", and the unveiling of the Samuel Francis Smith memorial at Belle Isle Park in Detroit, Michigan, On July 4th, 1932. The cover is franked with the 2¢, carmine rose, Washington Bicentennial issue stamp (Scott #707) and cancelled at Detroit on July 4, 1932. At left, the memorial was designed by Albert Kahn and sculpted by Samuel A. Cashwan.
