Palmer Park

Featured here is the "Spruce Log" attraction in Detroit's Palmer Park. This Superior Chrome Quality Company post card was mailed from Detroit to Manistee, Michigan, on September 6, 1913.

Palmer Park was donated to the City of Detroit in 1893 by former United States Senator Thomas W. Palmer (1830-1913). The park was (described at that time) "situated north of the city at the extreme terminal of the Woodward Avenue car line; is one of the city's favorite breathing spots. Its center is a log cabin, which is an exact reproduction of the home in which Senator Palmer resided when Detroit was little more than a trading post."

Thomas W. Palmer has come to be considered one of the most significant figures in Detroit history. He was an advocate for women's suffrage, immigration restrictions, animal rights, and homesteader rights. His motto was "equal rights for all, special privileges to none." After leaving the U.S. Senate in 1889, he was appointed Minister to Spain by President Benjamin Harrison. Thereafter, he became president of the National Commission on the World's Columbian Exposition from 1890 to 1893.
