

Automotive Industry

Featured here is an Artcraft cacheted, first day cover of the "Wheels of Freedom" issue, 4¢, Scott #1162. The stamp was issued to honor the automotive industry in connection with the National Automobile Show held in Detroit, October 15-23, 1960. The cover was cancelled in Detroit on October 15, 1960.

The automotive industry is made up of a wide range of organizations and companies involved in the design, development, manufacturing, marketing, selling, repairing, and modification of motor vehicles.

Early car manufacturing involved manual assembly by a human worker. The process evolved from engineers working on a stationary car, to a conveyor belt system where the car passed through multiple stations of more specialized engineers. Starting in the 1960s, robotic equipment was introduced to the process, and today most cars are produced largely with automated machinery.

Recent events have highlighted the manufacturing aspect of the automotive industry through striking workers of the United Auto Workers (UAW), officially, the "International Union, United Automobile, Aerospace and Agricultural Implement Workers of America". Historically, this is the first simultaneous strike ever called against all three leading manufacturing companies: Ford; General Motors; and, Stellantis.
