Featured above is an unused Artvue Postcard Company (New York), real photograph post card of the former Briar Banks estate at 39315 Woodward Avenue, Bloomfield Hills, Michigan.

Briar Banks, with its Georgian style home, was designed by Detroit architect Alpheus Chittenden on behalf of businessman and CEO of the Detroit Stove Works Company, William Tefft Barbour (1877-1955). The residence was completed in the fall of 1904.

Pictured in the RPPC are Novitiates and Sisters from the Daughters of Divine Charity who purchased the mansion, stable, and various out buildings, along with 13 of the original 220 acres of land, in 1943. They renamed the property, St. Elizabeth Briarbank, a Catholic assisted living community for women.

The Daughters of Divine Charity are a Catholic international pontifical congregation of women founded in 1868 at Vienna, Austria. Today, the Sisters number over 1500 and are located in 16 countries around the world.

In April 2022, St. Elizabeth Briarbank was sold to the Cranbrook Educational Community to house students while Cranbrook undergoes residential housing renovations.
