From the President



Welcome all to the new LQG year of 2020-2021! I want to first thank the outgoing executive for all the hard work they have done. We had a good changeover meeting with the new executive and all the documents needed for the new incoming executive were handed over and explained in detail.

This will be a very unusual year for the LQG. Nothing is the same with our lower membership numbers (only about 60% have rejoined the guild), the Covid 19 issues closing our meetings, and the Township not reopening their buildings until at least September. In September, the Township will review the applicants for space in the

George Preston center and issue new contracts to those who are successful in obtaining rental space from them. A new contract will look different from what we had before and most likely will include a raise in rental. For now, we just must wait and see as they are not accepting occupancy/rental requests until the fall.

We also have new budget numbers to address. With a lower membership, and the loss of the income from the cancelled quilt show this year, we will be forced to revisit our budget and see where we can save money moving forward.

My goal for this year is to keep the LQG operating and having the funds available to continue forward as a strong guild. Everything will be effected—room size, limitations on numbers of members who can be in the room at any one time, number or meetings to accommodate the membership, programs, workshops, special projects, sit and stitch, and so much more will need to be addressed by the executive in preparation for the reopening of the George Preston meeting place.

We are mandated by our constitution to be a guild that gives back to the community. Therefore, the one program we must keep having in our Guild is the Community Quilts projects. So far, the past existing committee has been continuing to work in preparing kits for distribution and for handing out quilts when possible to different community organizations. Thanks so much for those dedicated workers who are being creative in order to meet our constitutional requirements.

If you still wish to renew your memberships or know of others who have not done so at this time, you need to print a membership renewal/new member form from the website and send it to Norma Olmstead to be included in the new membership listing. By being a member, you will continue to receive the newsletter and the Bunker report along with any correspondence from the executive to the membership.



From the Langley Advance Times



The Langley Quilters' Guild had the plans for its annual fundraising raffle all sewn up in January. The draw would be during its quilt show May 8 and 9. Then the global pandemic struck and the local arts group had to rethink how to reach its goal.

"Our quilt raffle has always been a major fundraiser for our guild since 2002 when we opened our doors to one and all as a quilters' guild," said guild show chairperson Carol MacNamara. "This year our raffle quilt was another beautiful prize waiting to be won."

The quilt itself was designed by Yvonne Menear and Faiza Elmayergi, the individual blocks made by members and Faith McLeod did the long arm quilting.

Ticket sales began in January, so when all public events were cancelled in March, MacNamara contacted the BC Gaming Commission to find out how to proceed.

The draw took place on May 9 on the grounds of George Preston Recreation Centre with six people present and four eager cheerleaders, all social distancing. President Ina Spinks made the draw. Doe Gillis, raffle ticket manager, was able to deliver the quilt to the winner a couple of days later. The guild has about 250 members. **Michelle Gallagher** was the lucky winner!

Prior to the pandemic, members were able to do some selling at venues and local "businesses opened their doors to us to sell tickets," MacNamara added.

Though the raffle proceeds are down this year, the group will carry on with its community quilts which are distributed to various community groups in the Township and City, including the Gateway of Hope, Best Babies of Langley, and Langley Lodge.

"We give, in the course of any given year, we give hundreds and hundreds away," she said.

Each member typically makes one quilt for donation per year with the guild supplying the raw materials. Sometimes up to half a dozen people will work on a given community quilt if the quilter needs help attaching the batting and backing or other steps to bring the piece to completion.

The raffle funds the materials for the quilts. The guild sells 10,000 tickets at \$1.

"This year, because of COVID, we haven't been able to raise anywhere near that," she said. "We're going to struggle a little bit."

As well the guild relies on an annual \$2,000 grant from the Township which it won't receive this year, but MacNamara is confident it will work out as members remain committed to making community quilts.

Many members will likely donate the supplies, and there are people in the community who contact the guild with fabric donations, she added.

The guild started planning for the 2020 show in March of 2019 but had to cancel it in this spring. As well the group members have not been able to hold their meetings. MacNamara said that as restrictions loosen, planning a guild meeting will be a challenge. The group would have to find somewhere that allows physical distancing and is big enough to accommodate the numbers. The daytime meeting often attracts more than 100 members.



Langley Memorial Hospital Quilt Lottery



At the beginning of our lockdown, a lot of members did the Mystery Quilt from Laundry Basket Quilts - it certainly gave me focus, and never before have I completed a quilt top in two weeks! I did, however, wonder what I was going to do with it......my Sister suggested giving it to a Nurse at the Hospital. Well truth be told, it was a tough quilt, and I didn't want to give it away—but out of the discussion the ideas was born to make a donation to our local hospital as being representative of ALL front line workers everywhere.

So I got the word out, and actually had a donation of nearly 70 quilts from our members. The Hospital Foundation were the organizing group that I was working with. They asked if we would let them have a few for their own fundraiser (for the Hospital), and I gave them 5 to raffle off. I also passed one of the quilts on to the organizer at the Foundation who put in a lot of work for us. They canvassed all departments at the hospital, and had people put their names into a lottery.

We handed them out on the 8th—had a booth in the car park at the Hospital, and all the winners of the lottery came and collected their quilts from 8 members of LQG who were there that day. The quilts were all laid out, and the winners picked their favourites!

I also had sent a letter to Dr. Bonnie Henry telling her of our plans, and expressing that we would like to gift her with a quilt. She actually replied very quickly, and said she would be delighted to accept a quilt if she won it in a lottery.

Well guess what? She won! We couldn't decide between two different quilts which one to send to her, so decided to send them both, and will tell her that she should pass the spare on to Adrian Dix's family.

Since this whole thing started with my Sister's comment, she came along to help that day, and actually spent the day gardening in the much neglected garden areas at the hospital!!!













It was a great day! All the winners everyone who picked out a quilt were so pleased with their choice and wowed by the abundance and beauty of the donated quilts




Do you have a special panel that you have been wanting to make into a wall hanging or a quilt but wanted something other than a plain border?

WHY THE HELL DID SOMEBODY MAKE ME A OUILT?!?

It seemed like just an ordinary day. Ok, maybe it's your birthday. Heck, maybe it's only Thursday. In any case, this unexpected....package...shows up at your door. You didn't order anything.

You suspiciously eye the layer of packing tape that has encrusted what you're pretty sure was once a cardboard box. Being ever so careful, you saw through it with the nearest razor blade, and little by little, the mystery -and the gift-starts to unfold.

It's something made of fabric.

Hot pink and zebra print fabric, to be exact. It's not awful-at least, it wouldn't be if you were a 12-year-old girl....other than, perhaps, yourself at twelve years old...

As you pull it out of the packaging, you realize....someone has given you a quilt.

You don't understand. How did this happen? WHY did this happen? And what could possibly be an appropriate response?

Chances are, you are the loved one of a creative person. Many people might receive such a gift from an aunt or grandmother, or in some cases a distant cousin or friend. (If the gifter was your Mother, I certainly hope this doesn't need to be explained to you.)

In any case, what you have received, whether it is spot-on, or a million miles away from being, exactly, "you," is a gift of love. It may not feel like it right now, but allow me to explain.

Today, quilting is big-among quilters. Everyone else is in varying strata around the quilters, ranging in levels of understanding from "I totally get it!" to...."So....why on earth would you cut fabric apart and....and....sew it back together?" Like many creative endeavors, but maybe in some ways, more so-quilting quickly becomes an obsession. Almost an addiction. It's visual, it's tactile, and it's a way to create things-lots of them-all different, all with your own personal stamp, and all over the country and world. It's hard to explain if you're not involved. But, once you're a quilter, it's all you want to do.

So, let's tie this affront to your eyeballs back to where it came from.

First, the quilter has an innate desire-a NEED-to create, and spends plenty of time doing it. She also does not have unlimited storage space where she can hang onto her work for the rest of her natural life. That said, a quilt takes a good amount of time and monetary investment to create. You were chosen as a recipient NOT because you "didn't have one yet." If you have received a handmade gift from its maker, you are very special to that person, and are considered worthy of such an investment of time. Most quilters know and love a lot more people than they ever have the resources to make a gift for-even in their lifetimes. Often, they do this kind of work for hire, which limits their "recreational quilting" even further.

"Seriously though....can you at least explain the zebra print?!?"

When someone sets out to make you a quilt, they do it with you in mind, start to finish. A lime green scrap in the border might remind her of the dress you wore to prom in high school. The zebra print was included because it kind of looks like that fuzzy thing hanging from the rearview mirror in your car. The violet section in the middle is there because she remembers how much you love purple, and while she was stitching it, she thought about how Halloween is your favorite holiday, and wonders which haunted houses you'll be hitting this year-if she doesn't already know.

She remembers the decor in your living room, and thinks of how well the chosen color scheme will go with it. She added that wine bottle print to the backing knowing how much you love a good Cabernet, and thinking about how much this gift will lift your spirits to receive while your new husband is overseas. While she's sprawled out on the floor, pinning the top, batting, and backing together, she is thinking about that four-hour dinner you had at Chili's when you first became friends.

Making a quilt for someone is not just work of the hands, but of the mind. Whether or not it actually shows in the piecing or fabric choices, this was a journey for the quilter, and one she took with you. She is now handing it over into your care, and hoping that you'll understand this is the best way she can give herself to you in her physical absence.

Quilting sometimes becomes the language at which the creator is her most articulate. It isn't meant to create any sort of obligation for you, (if you boiled it down to dollars and cents, it could be the most "expensive" gift you'll ever receive), but more an expression of gratitude. A quilt made especially for you may just be the quilter's way of thanking you for your presence in her life, and letting you know that who you are, and what you are or have been to her is valued...nothing more or less complicated than that.

So, this piece of loving art before you...you don't have to put it on your bed, or display it proudly in a prominent place if you really aren't fond of how it looks. But respond to her knowing all you've just read. If you can't thank her for the quilt itself, thank her for her time, and her love. Ask her about the process and what it was like to make it. Let it bring you closer. It's unlikely that she wants you to enshrine it in a glass case on your living room wall, but instead to curl up under it when you're watching a movie in the dark (...where you won't even SEE it). Snuggle under it with your fur babies, or your baby-babies. Take it to a football game to warm up a cold seat on the bleachers, and wrap yourself in it when you're having a bad day and need to feel loved. Then give it another gaze. Think again about your quilter friend or relative and the you-focused energy required. If somehow it wasn't before...isn't it suddenly beautiful?






