

Tea Room:

Kitchen staff

- maintaining a clean work area
- prepping and serving to plates various food items
- washing and drying dishes
- refilling coffee and tea carafes and urns as needed
- requires standing for extended periods of time and bending over counters and sink areas

Ticket Sales

- sitting and selling tickets / order taking at 1 or 2 locations (TBD as room layout is in flux right now)
- maintaining a count of number of guests on a timesheet (to be provided)
- ability to make change for guests

- Busing Tables

- removing used dishes from tables,
- sanitizing the area for the next guest
- sorting dirty dishes into bins for cleaning in kitchen
- removing garbage
- ability to carry a loaded tray of dirty dishes
- walking and bending required

Hostess

- greeting guests
- filling tea and coffee cups
- answering questions about the event and what is being served
- bringing food items to guests
- ensuring that coffee and tea stations are filled
- making sure sugar, milk, cream and napkins are ready for use
- requires walking and carrying of food items

Set up Crew

- Prepping the kitchen area for service by designating stations for use
- ensuring proper equipment is available and clean
- setting up busing station, coffee area and tables in service areas
- taking food items in from volunteer bakers
- setting up food safe posters on hand washing
- requires full range of motion

- Take Down Crew

- Ensuring all dishes are washed and packed for another event
- sanitizing kitchen area as we vacate
- cleaning and packing any rental items for return
- proper disposal of any food items left after the event
- take down all tables, decorations and chairs from tea room areas
- ensure all items are returned to proper locations
- requires full range of motion

Volunteer Room: - Hostess

- Standing
- Sitting
- Greet all Volunteers & check them off on the attendance document
- Give out Volunteer Name Badges
- Notify Lana or Jan when supply (water, coffee, snacks) refills are needed
- Keep the Volunteer Lounge neat & tidy



A BIG THANK YOU FROM MAUREEN H. TO SUE H.








Book Review




Another way to join binding or border strips

Most of us join our binding strips by first drawing a diagonal line on the end of each strip, sewing on the line, and then trimming the corner. This eliminates a couple of steps.


1. Layer up to four strips **right side up**. Square the ends, removing selvedges.



2. Lay your ruler at a 45° angle on the end of the strip stack as shown, with the $\frac{1}{4}$ line passing through the lower corner. Trim. Repeat on the opposite end.



3. Place two strips right side together as shown and stitch with a 1/4" seam allowance. Continue until all strips are joined together. Press seam allowances open.








BLOCK ASSEMBLY

STAR BLOCK:


- Take the 5" x 5" square of feature fabric and place a flying geese unit on it, right sides together, triangle pointing to the outside edge, as illustrated.
- Sew with a scant ¼" seam. The seam should pass exactly through the intersection of the triangles. Press seam allowance towards the 5" square.
- Place a second flying geese unit on the opposite side and sew and press in the same manner.









4. Take one of the remaining flying geese units and place with an HST unit, right sides together. Pay careful attention to the orientation of the units. When placed correctly, the seam allowances will be opposing, allowing the units to butt together tightly.



Stitch with a ¼" seam. Press seam allowance towards the HST. Repeat on the other end of the flying geese unit. Make one more with the remaining flying geese and HST units.



Sew these two units to the larger unit with scant ¼" seams, ensuring they are oriented correctly. Press the seam
allowances towards the center of the block. The block should measure 9-1/2" x 9-1/2".

In light of the catastrophic devastation in Australia look what some inductrious Grade 1 students from Northcott Prairie School in Airdrie, AB are working on!

CALGARY -- A group of industrious Grade 1 students from Northcott Prairie school in Airdrie have joined the global effort to help out animals who've been injured or are now homeless due to devastating wildfires in Australia.

Many groups have put out a call for crafters to make various items for the animals and in this case, joey pouches are in high demand.

A joey is a young kangaroo or other marsupial.

"As soon as we started talking about this, the kids did not want to stop," said Taylor Patten, the students' teacher. "They wanted to start making them immediately and help as many of these baby animals as they can."





The students spent the day tracing out the patterns, cutting and clipping them and then, with the help of Patten, sewing them together.

"It makes me feel happy because we're going to save the animals," said first-grader Kiaan Mann.

The students also learned about how other animals have been injured.

"Some animals in the trees are really hot and sometimes the koalas' paws get burnt when they touch the trees," said Hailey Halyk. "They go to animal hospitals too and they get little gloves,"

Ms. Taylor's class has sewn together 20 pouches and hope to send them to Australia through the Facebook group Canadian Animal Rescue Craft Guild.

Reports show that it's estimated that more than a billion animals have died in the Australia wildfires, in addition to at least 28 people.

While so many groups and individuals have responded world wide. When there is a need for animals nests and pouches, there are good tutorials and patterns available for free on line.

Perhaps this will be a good solution for you next time you want to prefill a couple to take to a stitch in - or just for handy storage at home.
