*when serving the soup add a generous tablespoon of the sour cream mixture to your bowl of soup.



November Evening Fat Quarter Draw

For November I'm looking for Fat Quarters in any shade of teal. But what is teal, I hear you ask. Is it blue? or is it green?

Somewhere in between? I'll leave that for you to ponder! It's not turquoise and it's not mint

Remember that I'm looking for <u>new fabric, unwashed,</u> languishing no more than a year in your stash. Tone on tone prints with no secondary colours, except perhaps a touch of black or white. Happy shopping!



My Favourite Tools

I'm sharing a few of my favourite tools in this column, and hope other evening members might contribute favourites of their own, be they tools, techniques, books, fabrics, or even nibblies to get you through a marathon quilting session. We seldom see the day members, so here is a way we can share with them.

The first set of instructions for the Mystery Quilt are in this issue, and because some of the cuts are in 1/8" increments, I want to share some of my favourite tools for accuracy.

Rulers that have 1/8" grids on them, made by different brands, are invaluable for a project like this.

Wool felt pressing mats come in different sizes. I wasn't sure if they were just a gimmick, but once I tried one, I was hooked. Especially good to have for very precise work to keep your blocks from distorting.

Can't live without my Best Press! I buy it by the gallon, and use one of the misters that are popping up everywhere. Another item that I thought might just be a gadget, but it gives such a fine all-over mist that my Best Press lasts twice as long. Using a starch or starch alternative before cutting, helps to prevent fraying and keeps the fabric from stretching, especially when sewing bias edges. I use it again when I'm pressing my blocks to block them if they are just a bit off-size or wonky.



Mystery Quilt Block Challenge
Note: I am sharing my copyrighted pattern with you for this project. Please respect the work that has gone into this, and do not copy, forward, or otherwise share with anyone not in the Guild. Thank You.
Cutting instructions for LQG Mystery Quilt Cut carefully. Accuracy will be important for this project. As you cut be sure to label each set with the size. Ziplock bags are great to keep pieces sorted. Feature fabric: 1. Cut 2 strips 2-5/8" x WOF. Cut into 2 strips 24" long and 1 strip 12" long 2. Cut 4 strips 3-1/2" x WOF. Trim to 32" long 3. Cut 4 strips 2-1/2" x WOF 4. Cut 1 square 5" x 5" 5. Cut 4 squares 3-1/8" x 3-1/8"
Light fabric: 1. Cut 1 strip 2-3/4" x WOF. Trim to 26" long 2. Cut 2 strips 5-3/8" x WOF. Crosscut into squares 5-3/8" x 5-3/8" for a total of 12. 3. Cut 1 square 5-3/4" x 5-3/4" 4. Cut 2 squares 3-1/4" x 3-1/4"
Medium fabric: 1. Cut 2 strips 2-5/8" x WOF. Cut into 1 strip 24" long and 2 strips 12" long 2. Cut 4 strips 2" x WOF. Trim to 30" long.
Dark fabric: 1. Cut 2 strip 2-3/4" x WOF. Trim 1 to 26" long. Crosscut remainder and second strip into 2-3/4" x 2-3/4" squares for a total of 16. 2. Cut 2 squares 9-7/8" x 9-7/8" 3. Cut 4 squares 3-1/2" x 3-1/2" 4. Cut 2 squares 3-1/4" x 3-1/4" 5. Cut 4 squares 2" x 2"


UNIT ASSEMBLY


FOUR-PATCH:


- Place the 2-3/4" x 26" strip of light and 2-3/4" x 26" strip of dark right sides together. Sew the long edge with a ¼" seam allowance. Press the seam allowance towards the dark fabric. This strip set should measure 5" wide.
- Crosscut into 2-3/4" units for a total of 8.
- Assemble the units in pairs, turning one unit to create a checkerboard. Sew with a ¼" seam, press. These should measure 5" x 5".

NINE-PATCH:

- Piece the 2 strips of feature fabric 2-5/8" x 24" and 1 strip of medium fabric 2-5/8" x 24" together with the medium fabric in the middle. Press seam allowance towards the feature fabric. This strip set should measure 6-7/8" wide.
- 2. Crosscut into 2-5/8" units for a total of 8.
- Piece the 1 strip of feature fabric 2-5/8" x 12" and 2 strips of medium fabric 2-5/8" x 12" together with the feature fabric in the middle. Press the seam allowance towards the feature fabric. This should measure 6-7/8" wide.
- 4. Crosscut into 2-5/8" units for a total of 4.







5. Assemble 2 units from the first set with 1 unit from the second set to form a checkerboard.

Sew with a ¹/4" seam allowance. Press towards the outside. Repeat to make four 9-patch units. They should measure 6-7/8" square.

Sheena also demonstrated some guilting methods to carry the scene into the borders. We learned a lot and even pledged to finish our projects for the show.

Barn Quilts

You'd be forgiven if you thought a barn quilt was a type of fabric quilt that you drape over a stall door, or maybe over yourself as you milked the cows.

But no — a barn quilt is actually a large piece of painted wood that looks like a single quilt block and decorates the side of a barn. You can see them for yourself in and around Armstrong, BC

Barn Quilts are Big

The size of the squares vary, but usually they measure eight feet.

They Can be Spotted from Far Away

Most barn quilts are made of simple geometric shapes — squares, rectangles and triangles. They're usually painted in bright, solid colors, though every now and then you'll come across one that looks like a more complex printed fabric. But they can't be too complicated or the details would be lost as people drove by.

They're Both Old and New

Barn quilts have been around for hundreds of years. In the past, farmers used different types of folk art, including these quilt-like blocks, to decorate their barns. People chose blocks to reflect particular meanings.

In the early 2000s, barn quilts became popular again — decorating not only the sides of barns but also houses and garages.

They're a Great Reason for a Road Trip

Many barn quilts are clustered along a particular route. The first so-called quilt trail was in Ohio; now you can find them across Canada and in 43 states. Google "quilt trail maps" to find one near you, then hit the road. Happy travels! The closest one to us is:

Bracelet Quilt Block finishes at 14" Sit and Stitch, October 2019

Fabric Requirements:

Print for centre Block

Light Shade to use for outer border on alternating blocks Medium Shade to use throughout for inner border Darker Shade of Grey to use for outer border on alternating blocks

Cutting Instructions (For Each Block)

Print Fabric

1 7" square

For Inner Borders use the same medium shade of grey

2 2" x 7"

2 2" x 10"

1 2" strip sub cut into (2) 4½" pieces and (2) 6¾"

Darker and lighter Greys: **see note 2 below


1 3" strip sub cut into (2) 41/2" pieces and (2) 63/4"

Piecing Instructions:

- Sew the 2 x 7 inch strips of the medium shade onto opposite sides of the 7" block
- Sew the 2 x 10" strips of the medium shade onto the other 2 sides of the block. Your block should now measure 10" square
- Sew a strata with a 4½" dark or light and 2" medium and another 4½" dark or light and cross cut down the middle into (2) 2¾" strips and sew onto opposite sides of the 10" square
- Sew a strata with 6¾" strip dark or light and 2" medium and another 6¾" dark or light and cross cut down the middle into (2) 2¾" strips and sew onto the remaining sides of the 10" square

**NB 1 Make sure to mark the center of your block and your second border strips as you sew them on. If you don't, your blocks will not line up evenly!

**NB 2 This quilt has 2 different shades on the second borders so that you can alternate as you put the quilt top together... so make half the blocks with darker outer border and half with light outer border – Refer to Photo bottom right



Chocolate Coconut Slice (from Sit & Stitch October 9)

- 1 c. coconut
- 1 c. sugar
- 1 c. self-rising flour (or add 1 tsp baking powder and 1/4 tsp salt to 1 c. regular flour)
- 2 tbsp. cocoa
- 1/2 c. butter
- 1 egg, well beaten
- 1 tsp. vanilla
- 3/4 1 c. mini chocolate chips (oh, go for it, more is better! 🙂)
- Preheat oven to 400F.
- Line 9" baking pan with parchment paper.
- Mix coconut, sugar, flour and cocoa in large bowl.
- Melt butter. Pour over dry ingredients.
- ✤ Add egg and vanilla and mix well.
- Press mixture into pan. Bake for 20 minutes.
- Remove from oven and immediately sprinkle with chocolate chips. Wait a couple minutes and spread to cover.

Thanks to Kim E. for bringing this wonderful treat to share at the sit and stitch. Now that she has graciously shared this recipe we can enjoy it again and again!
