





The Four Clubs Unite for a










The annual Service Week was held in March. During this activity-packed week, members and advisors of the four service clubs planned and organized projects both on and off campus to better the school and community.













Winning and losing are close companions







Sophomore, Kutzke, takes first in league



Next year promises to be one of the best yet with this years JV's taking first and only three runners graduating.





In league the young Bears finished with a perfect record; 14 wins, 0 losses, and San Gabriel League Champions. They won their last 15 games in a row. Over the year they won the Warren JV Classic, Consolation Champions Huntington Beach Tournament, and 2nd place Mayfair Classic. Their record and play established them as the best JV Team

in Warren's history. Defense and hussle were the key for the young bears. Their full control pressure and running game was displayed as they rolled over opponent after opponent. Mark Mullane, the only super sophomore, averaged 17 points a game to lead the Bears. Mark is a future great. In summary, the team's success resulted from excellent shot range and movement to basket, good poise and drive, superior pressure defense with excellent hustle, and never giving up on themselves.




Dedication is the reason for such a winning Sophomore team. Every member is important because no first stringer is any tougher than his practice mate. This dedication brought the Sophs an 8 and 5 pre-league record with such showings as 3rd place in the Millikan Tournament with Gerry "Jolly" McCarthy and Alex Radetzky being all-tourney and the consolation championship in the B.G. J.V. Tournament with Scott Vernoy being

selected All-Tourney.

The Bears soon enough showed the S.G.V.L. what Warren was made of. Warren swept through its games during the season with only one stop a 52-48 loss to Paramount but soon after Warren came back to trounce the Pirates 64-49 in the re-match. Highlights were sound thrashings of the Ducks and the high game of 102-42 against Bellflower. The Bears were led by M.V.P. Gerry McCarthy. Co-Captains were Jim Uranga, Frank Watson, and Scott Vernoy. Vernoy and Alex Radetzky being only freshman, give Warren much hope in the remaining years. Helping out in the backcourt were Mark McClure, Mark Guastella, and Brad Hinds. The players that didn't see as much action would have easily started for any other team in the league. This has been the second league championship for the sophomore class, one that brings a bright light to Warren athletics.

The Sophs season record was 21 wins and 4 losses and a league record of 13 wins and 1 loss. The Sophs were a strong team scoring 1601 points to their opponents 1094 which gives the team and average of 64 points per game to the opponents 44. The team has lead in offense by Jerry McCarthy who scored 393 season points for a 15.7 point per game average, followed by Alex Radetzky with 323 season points for a 12.9 point per game average. Scott Vernoy was third in scoring with an average of 10.7 points per game and lead the team in total rebounding. Jim Uranga was fourth in scoring with 9 points per game and was second in total

rebounding.

Freshman Basketball was one of the newest sports at Warren. These mighty Bears went along with tradition fighting and scraping for every game and coming up with a third place showing in league. Coach Wayne Wolfsburger's team was led by Dennis Gjesdal, Jim Eubanks, Jerry Hooton, Robert DeSchepper, Steven Gifferd, and Dennis Barker. Others included Roy Cain, Brad Ditto, Bob Miller, and Kyle Rysavy.







Defending League Champs make good showing
