Words From Laterin Pastor

Welcome to FEBRUARY! A "heads up" for all of us is to take special note of February 14 on all of our calendars. It's not only Valentine's Day — if you have that special someone you'll want to give special attention — but also Ash Wednesday.

That's right, the Lenten Season begins this month. We'll have two worship services (12:30 and 7 p.m.) on Ash Wednesday and on the five following Wednesdays in Lent we'll gather at 6:30 p.m. to share a simple meal together and at 7 p.m. midweek worship. I'll share Holy Week and Easter details in next month's newsletter.

Pr. Rob Blezard of the Lower Susquehanna Synod staff shared some stewardship thoughts that came across my desk a few days ago. It's been almost a year since we had formal attention to this subject, so I thought they'd be helpful for all of us.

Think of the three happiest people you know – people whose lives effervesce with joy and peace. Chances are they also have a profound thankfulness for all that God has blessed them with. They also seem to live with a sense of contentment. Reflect for a minute ... isn't that the case?

By contrast, you may also know folks who are considered wealthy but are profoundly unhappy. Likely they not only fail to exude thankfulness for their wealth, but they also mistakenly believe they need even MORE possessions to be happy. Isn't that right?

Now which kind of person do you tend to be?

Thankfulness. Happiness. Contentment. These joyful characteristics work together, reinforcing one another. Human experience proves this simple fact to be true: People who are grateful for all they have and all they are tend to be happy and content. Moreover, don't they also tend to possess spiritual depth and emotional maturity? A coincidence? Hardly.

Thankfulness, happiness, and contentment interact, but gratitude holds the key. Develop gratitude, then happiness and contentment follow. It doesn't work the other way around. With prayer, devotion, and simple exercise, the Holy Spirit will lead you to a deeper spiritual maturity and more happiness.

My hunch is that you're tending to agree with that, but if you need greater conviction that it's true, just try it. You'll like it. Lent is a great time for all of us to do that kind of thing.

After Christmas, the window was removed and taken to the shop for trimming and cleaning. The window was in 2 sections and each section weighed between 250 and 300 pounds. Then the appropriate repairs were made and a hurricane impact clear glass was installed on the outside. Our stained glass was reinstalled and is as beautiful as ever and ready for 50 more years.

My own business card

Creating a pretend "business card" is a fun way for your child to learn her address and phone number. Show her a real one (yours, one from an office you visit), and then have her make her own using an index card. Help her write her name, address, and phone number. She could draw a small picture (ballet shoe, soccer ball) to show something she does.

A gracious host

Having friends over lets your youngster practice social skills. Explain that it's nice to let his guest take the first tricycle ride, for example. Make sharing easier by allowing your child to put away one special toy before his friend arrives—everything else is for both youngsters to enjoy.

Not afraid of the dark

Help your child overcome her fear of the dark by making it "friendlier." Try decorating her ceiling with glow-in-the-dark stars from a dollar store, or give her a night-light for her room. She may also feel better cuddling a stuffed animal who "likes" the dark, perhaps an owl or a raccoon.

Playful ways to boost self-control

Little ones learn many skills through play, and self-control is no exception. These games and activities can help improve your youngster's ability to slow down and think before he acts.

Stop and go

Name an action for your child to do, such as jumping up and down. Every time you call out, "Go," he should start jumping. When you say "Stop," he stands still. But if you say a random word instead of "Go" and "Stop" ("Bananas," or "Jupiter," for example), he should ignore you. He'll need to listen carefully so he knows whether you're giving a command—or just being silly!

Be a mirror

Face your youngster, and strike a pose. Maybe you'll stand with one hand on your hip and the other on your head. Ask your child to copy you. Now, slowly move to a new pose while he moves with you as your mirror. He'll practice


resisting the urge to make any other movements—after all, a mirror reflects only what's in front of it.

Count down

In a situation where your youngster tends to get antsy (say, waiting for food at a restaurant), have him pretend he's an astronaut. Suggest that he put on his imaginary spacesuit and get ready for launch. Slowly count backward from 10 together. This will give him a chance to settle down.

Reasons to write

Your child is probably excited about learning to write. Whether she's just making squiggly lines or starting to form words, here are ways to nurture her new skill:



• Let her leave messages for family members. You can help her spell the words on a sticky note ("Let's play a game!") and find a place to put it where it will be found. Or give her dry-erase markers to write a greeting on a window or a bathroom mirror. She can easily wipe off the glass when she's finished. ♥

Annual Report Presentation

Written copies of reports from council officers and standing committees were distributed and reviewed. Several questions were asked regarding our partnership with Alzheimer's Community Care (which continues on a month to month basis), and school enrollment (although proposed budget numbers were created based on 40 students, enrollment is less this year). A motion was made and seconded to approve the reports, and the motion was passed by unanimous decision.

Nomination and Elections

Ballots were distributed for election for two open spaces on the Congregational Council. Three nominees (David Johnson – running for reelection, Carolyne New, and Julius Roehl) were listed, and several names (Pia Heiser, David Willoughby, Jenelle Smith, and Breanne Johnsen) were nominated at the meeting. The ballots were counted and David Johnson, Carolyne New, Julius Roehl, and Breanne Johnsen were announced as new members of the Congregational Council.

Other Business

The following proposed changes in our church constitution were presented:

Proposed Amendment to Bylaw C12.11.01.

The Congregation Council shall meet regularly <u>during the second</u> <u>week</u> on the second Tuesday of each month.

Proposed Amendment to Bylaw C13.05.

When a pastoral vacancy occurs, a *Call Committee* of six <u>to eight</u> voting members shall be elected by this congregation. Term of office will terminate upon installation of the newly called pastor.

Motions were made and seconded to approve the changes, and the motions passed by unanimous decision.

A motion was made, seconded, and passed by unanimous decision to adjourn our meeting at 12:05 PM. We were led in a closing prayer by Pastor Lutze.

Congregational Meeting Minutes Pending Approval

Sunday, January 21st, 2018

Our meeting was called to order at 10:45 AM by Council Vice President Kelly Rogers and we were led in an opening prayer, which included ELCA Bishop Eaton's Litany, by Interim Pastor Paul Lutze.

After a review of our sign-in, it was determined that a quorum was present.

Minutes from our last congregational meeting, held on October 1st, 2017, were reviewed. A motion was made and seconded to approve the minutes, and the motion was passed by unanimous decision.

Financial Report Presentation

Treasurer Jim New presented a written copy of our Financial Report. It was noted that our total revenue from June 2017 to December 2017 was \$211,896 (with school and other revenues below expected), and our total expenses were \$234,843 (including property improvements made through the \$50,000 Mission Investment Fund loan). This leaves our church behind budget with a deficit of \$22,940.

Discussion on Financial Report items included: a reminder that funds given toward the MIF loan should be indicated as such (versus being noted as Capital Campaign), suggestions for giving funds towards the MIF loan (families giving larger amounts or "selling" a monthly payment of \$536), questions about using additional funds from Mission Investment (we were approved for \$120,000 more but have not requested that amount at this time), and insurance needs (as payments increase and we consider a new provider for both property, workers comp., and hurricane insurance).

A motion was made and seconded to approve the report, and the motion was passed by unanimous decision.

Following the presentation of the Financial Report, Council Member Earl Osborne presented items suggested for our consideration in the Can We Afford a Pastor? text provided to council by Thrivent. Some of the items included: weekly attendance and attendance trends, a balanced budget (including the pastor's compensation package), donor age pattern, and cash reserves. This text is available for other members to review. It was noted that our call

Early Years

More curiosity = more learning

"Why are the trees bare in winter?" "What are clouds made of?" Kids this age wonder about everything—and that's good, because curiosity fuels learning. Try these suggestions to feed your youngster's natural inquisitiveness.

Encourage exploration. Hands-on experiments can satisfy your child's curiosity and lead to new things to wonder about. For instance, if she wants to know whether toy cars will float, let her test them



in a sink. As she experiments, she might wonder which of her other toys will sink and which will float. After she tries them, ask her what the toys that float or sink have in common.

Find out together. Don't worry

if you're not sure why we get hiccups or why lightning comes before thunder. You can simply say, "That's a good question. Let's write

it down." Keep a notebook full of questions

to research on your next visit to the library or when you're online together. That will give both of you a chance to learn new things—and your youngster will see that even grownups are still learning.♥



Artsy patterns

My grandson Noah loves doing arts and crafts with me. He's learning about patterns in school, so I thought our projects could be a great way to practice patterns at home.

I suggested that we color together in my "grownup" coloring book. I started

coloring a swirly design, alternating its stripes purple, blue, purple, blue. I asked Noah to color the next stripe in the pattern, and he made it purple.

Then, Noah wanted to make his own patterns. I gave him craft supplies like crepe-paper scraps and buttons, and he glued them in a pattern around the border of a paper plate.

Now Noah points out patterns to me all the time—in the scarf I'm knitting, on my couch where we snuggle up and read, and on a cake we decorated together!♥

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Advice for parent volunteers

Q: This month, I will be volunteering in my daugh ter's classroom. What should I expect?

A: It's great that you're going to help your daughter's teacher. Your youngster will feel proud to see you in her classroom, and volunteering is one way to show her that you care about

When you arrive at school, go to the office first, since you may need to sign in and get a badge. In the classroom, the teacher will explain what to do. She may have you work with a small group of children, perhaps doing jigsaw puzzles or making a snack. Or maybe she'll ask you to make copies or cut out letters and numbers. After you leave the classroom, be sure to keep information about the students confidential.

Note: If you have younger children at home, arrange for someone to watch them while you volunteer. Consider swapping child care with another parent who volunteers at a different time.♥

Parachute games

You and your child can play

parachute games at home with just a flat bedsheet. Have each family member hold one side of the sheet, and enjoy these activities that promote cooperation and coordination.

1. Take turns deciding how everyone will move the "parachute." Lift it up high, or make low waves, for example. Keep going until everyone has had a chance to give an instruction.

2. Place a ball on the sheet, and lift to roll the ball from player to player. Your child can count how many times the ball is passed before it falls off. How high will he count?

> 3. Work together to launch a balloon as high as possible.

> > **4.** Fill the center of the sheet with "popcorn" (several crumpled sheets of paper). Everyone shakes the sheet and calls, "Pop. pop, pop!" until all the popcorn "pops" off the parachute.♥

We would like to have the Mutual Ministry Committee meet before our call for a new pastor is completed.

New Business

We received a notice from Safe Point Insurance which stated that we need to replace our circuit breaker panel to continue coverage. As we continue to review insurance needs and policies, Pastor and Earl plan to meet to discuss other options for hurricane and property insurance. They will be communicating with Gallagher Insurance as a potential provider.

Pending Annual Meeting Business

The upcoming Annual Congregational Meeting will be held after worship on January 21st. Items to be discussed include: several wording changes for our constitution, a review of financial and annual reports, and election of council members as needed. It was noted that Jim, Audra, and Ernadel are not running for reelection, so two spaces on the council will need to be filled. Earl and Ernadel will contact potential nominees this week before the meeting.

The next council meeting will be held on Sunday, February 11th after worship.

Our meeting was adjourned with a closing prayer at 11:50 AM.

MINUTES FROM

January 14, 2018, Minutes Pending Approval

Present: Interim Pastor Paul Lutze, Audra Bryson, Earl Osborne, Ernadel Sioson

Absent: David Johnson, Kelly Rogers, Jim New – excused

We began our meeting in Pastor Lutze's Office at 10:55 AM with Pastor leading us in devotion and prayer.

Minutes from the Council meeting on December 17th, 2017 were reviewed and approved with two additions as noted below.

The following was added under the Financial Report: It was also noted that as of the end of November, a balance of \$23,465 remained in our \$50K Mission Investment Fund loan, with several more payments for projects to come. We discussed the need to reapply as needed for additional funds, as was approved by the congregation at our last special meeting.

The following was added under Pending Annual Meeting Business: Council members with terms ending this period were asked to submit their intent to run (or not run) for re-election before the upcoming council meeting on Sunday, January 14th.

Financial Report

Earl reviewed our financial report for the month of December in Jim's absence. Our total income was \$38,521 and our total expenses were \$40,716, leaving us with a net loss of \$2,195 for the month. It was noted that, as of the end of December, we have spent \$48,125 from the \$50K Mission Investment Fund loan with all major projects completed. We discussed the need to mention how members can designate funds for payment toward the MIF loan at the upcoming congregational meeting.

Pastor's Report

Pastor Lutze submitted a written report on his actions from the last month. This report included a review of membership actions from 2017. It was noted with thanks that through December, 77.5% of our members who made contribution pledges are meeting or exceeding their pledged amount.
