

Welcome to May! Remember Martha Stewart? With May 1 having historic May Day celebrations, here's the way she set the stage:

Imagine living in a village surrounded by meadows. On the first of May, the girls wake at dawn to gather wildflowers in baskets to be left on doorsteps, and the boys create all sorts of mischief to disguise their awkwardness as bashful suitors. The day culminates in ritual dancing around a maypole to acknowledge and tame the high spirits brought on by the perfumed air warmed by the sun's new brightness. May Day celebrations seem to stretch back forever in time.

There will be two other items of business ... further details coming in the formal call for meeting letter later this month: Election of a Nominating Committee and action in principal on the Strategic Planning Task Force's long-anticipated recommendation about our future land use.

May Days #6, #7, #8, and #9 - May 31 through June 3. These days will find me and Linda and Julius Roehl as Nativity's mémbers of our 2018 Synod Assembly. I'll be at pre-assembly meetings as called since I'll serve on the Assembly's Reference and Counsel Committee. All three of us will participate in the full assembly.

OK, OK! #7-#9 are June days ... bean counters, please give me a break!

And in that spirit ... May Day #10 – It's a June day as well ... Sunday, June 3. That's a Sunday that our Council has asked be a "lay-led" service and you'll get a peak at the gifts our youth represent as they participate in leading that service in advance of their trip to Houston later this summer.

So ... May Days/June Days ... thank God for all of them!

FINANCIAL REPORT June 2017 through March 2018 (10 months)

As of 2/28/18, the conversion of our financial accounting package from Quickbooks to Power Church was successfully completed. As a result, the Treasurer's Report looks a little different this month.

YTD Analysis against budget:

CHURCH

Tithes and Offerings continue to be ahead of budget through March 2018.

Other Revenues show a shortfall against Budget of \$8,165—a variance that is offset by the Call Committee Expense variance of \$8,208. The budget included a Special Appeals Income line to raise money for the Call Process Expenses. Variances are appropriate

Building & Grounds excess expenses over budget include a new air conditioner and other needed repairs.

SCHOOL

March School Revenues were up from the prior month.

While YTD School Revenues are behind budgeted amounts, this variance is offset by lower total YTD Expenses.

RESTRICTED FUNDS

With the conversion from Quickbooks to Power Church, we also performed a thorough review of the Restricted Funds.

The Mission Investment Fund Donations for Principal Pay-down of the MIF Loan were reviewed and in March a check for \$10,950 was sent to the MIF to reduce the Principal balance on our loan. Mission Investment Fund Loan Balance at 3/31/18 is \$37,581.

Drink up!

Little ones are more susceptible to dehydration than older children are. When the temperature climbs, remind your child to take water breaks during outdoor play. You might help him set up a "Hydration station" with plastic cups and a pitcher of water so he can serve himself like a big kid.

Teacher goodie bag

Some of the best end-of-year gifts for teachers are supplies to use in class next year. Have your youngster decorate a paper lunch sack and fill it with pencils, crayons, stickers, or notepads from a dollar store. Help her add a thank-you note, too. She can deliver the present on the last day of school.

Positive talk

Your child will respond better if you tell him what to do, rather than what not to do. For instance, say, "Walk, please" instead of "No running!" or "Put your toys away" rather than "Stop leaving your toys everywhere." Negative instructions (ones beginning with stop, don't, or no) rarely tell him how to fix what he's doing wrong.

Messy outdoor learning

Would your youngster like to paint with her toes, make mud, or smear shaving cream on a window? Now that warmer weather has arrived, head outside for messy learning fun all summer long.

Colorful shape painting

Finger paints aren't just for fingers. Spread paper on the ground, and add blobs of red, yellow, and blue paint. Then, let your child paint shapes with her toes. Call out a shape and a color. Can she create a blue triangle? Which colors would she combine to make a green circle or an orange square? She could experiment to find out.

Muddy counting

Together, mix up a bucket of mud using soil from the backyard and water. Afterward, play this version of hideand-seek to practice counting. Ask your youngster to close her eyes while you stir a few plastic toy animals into the mud. Tell her how many to dig out with her

hands. She'll need to count the toys as she goes to make sure she finds them all.

Foamy ABCs

Squirt shaving cream into your child's hand, and have her smear it on a window or glass storm door. Now it's a "canvas" to write on. Take turns using a finger to write the alphabet in order, one letter at a time. Draw a picture of something that starts with each letter. For B, she might draw a bike. Note: Erase, or add more foam, when you run out of room.♥

Looking ahead to next year

The move to kindergarten or first grade means your child's school day will change. Here are things he may face and ways to smooth the transition during the summer.

• All-day school. You might need to adjust your youngster's bedtime so he gets more sleep and has energy to learn.



- No nap. Phase out your child's midday nap, or move it to after-school hours.
- Larger building. Tour the school to help him feel comfortable.
- Lunch in a cafeteria. Set up a pretend cafeteria at home and role-play together. Take turns being a cafeteria server, cashier, lunchroom aide, and student.♥
