NATIVITY LUTHERAN CHURCH & SCHOOL TREASURER'S REPORT

FINANCIAL REPORT June 2018 through September 2018 (4 months)

Church: Expenses remain on budget, and revenues are behind budget by \$3,316.

School: Through September we expected a budget shortfall of \$11,011. Actual Revenue less Expenses created a shortfall of \$22,918, an unfavorable variance of \$11,907 compared to budget. Revenue shortfall of \$10,226 was due to The Office of Early Learning (VPK) being behind by two payments totaling \$8,128.71. These payments were received on October 16, 2018.

CASH FLOW ANALYSIS:

The low balance in the Operating Cash Account (\$16,230) is a CRITICAL PROBLEM. Starting the fiscal year with \$43,110 in the bank with budgeted shortfalls thru the first 4 month of the fiscal year is not a favorable situation. To date all expenses have been paid on time, but we are very mindful of our low cash balance. We have payroll expenses of \$9,275 twice a month (and 3 payrolls in November this year). We are hoping for a successful Golf Benefit in November to help ease some of these cash concerns.

What is your child's favorite way to play? Play is actually a child's work. Through play, your child is building key life skills.

Here are five reasons to play today:

- 1) Children learn how to share and take turns.
- 2) When children play, they boost communication skills. They learn to express feelings, use appropriate language and build social relationships.
- 3) As children play, they encounter many opportunities to problem solve, practice conflict resolution skills and apply logical thinking skills.
- 4) Gross motor play that encourages safe risk-taking, such as climbing, running and jumping, helps enable children to feel more comfortable taking risks in the future.
- 5) When children participate in free play, they have the opportunity to make choices, plan their time and follow through with activities.

One Sunday a month Children's Church would take place in the sanctuary. The reading(s) and message would be engaging for both child and adult. Through the use of movement, music, interaction and props, the message would be delivered in a dynamic, and joyful manner. Think of it as a children's message but the whole congregation is invited to be a part of it. All ages and stages of life engaged together. Commit to this for 6 months. Evaluate congregation's opinion after Easter.

For midweek Advent services Pastor Steve would like to employ a multi-generational approach to doing worship together called Faith 5. Gathered together over a meal, we share our highs and lows, we read a bible verse or story, we talk about how the reading might relate to our highs and lows , we pray for one another's highs and lows, and we bless one another before we depart. Interspersed within is music. In need of guitarist and/or keyboard. Round tables in the Loggia, sitting with others from all ages and stages of life, and not necessarily all from your family. It's a mixing of peoples, a sharing of stories, resulting in the bolstering of faith. Evaluate as a possible format for Lent midweek services.

Within the Advent midweek program, Pastor Steve is encouraging Faith 5 (Share, Read, Talk, Pray, Bless) for families to use as a nightly devotion.



Marble painting

Here's an art project that will strengthen your youngster's handeye coordination. Place a sheet of white paper in a shallow box lid. Let her squirt different colors of paint onto the paper and add a marble. Then, she can tilt the lid in different directions to roll the marble and create a work of art.

Can you help, please?

Gently guide your child toward independence by encouraging him to help himself. If he says, "I don't have a bath towel," you could ask, "Do you remember where we keep the towels?" Or if he complains that the tip of his pencil broke, you might say, "Uh-oh. How can you fix it?"

Keep germs at bay

What's one thing all kid's will share without being asked? Germs! Shield your child from the "generosity" of others by having her wash her hands frequently and to avoid sharing things that come in contact with someone else's mouth or face (cups, silverware, pillows).

Behavior tips that really work

A sense of playfulness comes in handy when you're a parent especially for getting your little one to behave. Using makebelieve or playing games can encourage cooperation and help you build stronger bonds. Consider these clever strategies that have worked for other parents.

Use stuffed animals

"I found myself repeatedly asking my son Stephen to brush his teeth or put his plate in the dishwasher. One day, I picked up his stuffed dragon and made it say, T'm sad. I want to read our bedtime story, so please brush your teeth.' It worked! Now I frequently ask Stephen to choose a stuffed animal that will remind' him to follow directions."

Be silly

"Sometimes when my daughter Emma misbehaves, I pretend she's been bitten by a 'bug.' If she won't share, for example, I'll say, 'Oh, no, the no-sharing bug got you!' Then, we pretend to swat away a bug. Often, that's enough to change Emma's

Talking with the teacher

Regular communication with your youngster's teacher now will make it easier to connect later if you have a concern. Need something to talk about? Try these ideas:

• Ask for reading recommendations. The teacher is sure to know some great books you can read aloud to your child.

• Find out what the class will study next, perhaps winter weather or fairy tales.

● Tell the teacher about activities you and your youngster do at home together like planting bulbs in the garden, coloring, or telling knock-knock jokes.♥

Vice President's Report: Written report submitted by Earl Osborne.

Earl would like to recruit some members to help him start a CROP walk in Palm Beach County this spring. It could be an effort with other churches, but Nativity would be the leadership. Council approves and supports.

Earl also recommends that we have Sarah Davis from Thrivent give a Temple Talk and help more members join Thrivent. She is available November 4. We can get \$250 twice a year to give to various programs at Nativity.

I've got rhythm! Your home

is full of materials that can make music. Let your youngster create his own percussion instruments and experiment with rhythm and tempo.

Instruments

• Maracas: Have your child put dry rice or beans into clean, empty plastic bottles and replace the caps.

• Drum: Get an empty coffee canister with a lid. Your youngster could cover it with construction paper and draw designs. Suggest that he use two wooden spoons as drumsticks.

Activities • Rhythm: Sing a familiar song, such as "Row, Row, Row Your Boat." Encourage your child to shake his maracas or beat his drum to the rhythm. Then, play your own rhythms for each other to copy. Example: Tap, tap-tap, tap, tap-tap.

> • Tempo: Take turns playing various tempos (speeds) for one another to march to. Can your youngster make his feet match the beat of each tempo?♥

Load passengers. Form an imaginary train by lining up laundry baskets or empty boxes. Together, write numbers (1-10) on separate sticky notes, and have your child put one note on each car. She should use the numbers to determine how many passengers each car gets. She would fill the "4"

car with 4 dolls, for example. Let her pretend she's driving the train to the station to deliver the passengers. Then, rearrange the numbers, and have her reload for another "trip."♥
