#### WHERE ANGELS TREAD

If you were asked the question, what do you think of when asked about Angels, most would reply that they wear white and have wings with maybe a halo on their head! Personally, I believe in these Heavenly beings! Just maybe though, their wings are not visible.

Some folks do not believe in Angels, I guess they never had a close call that could have ended their life! We may not recall seeing an Angel, but we have felt that unexplained presence at some point in our lives. Often times an Angel visits when you need it the most. Angels are different than us, they are sent to help us and minister to our needs. We need them.

Let me tell you about two such Angels, whose love for others could not be denied! Their service in the community was never ending! Allow me to tell you about the first Angel!

I am writing about Aunt Gertrude Elizabeth Webster Bozman, who was born May 8th, 1937 to Captain Horace and Irene Webster in Wenona, Md. She was beautiful with ocean blue eyes, but no wings. The invisible wings would be earned much later. She had an older sister named Nora who was born September 2nd, 1926. Little Gertie was a little spoiled by her parents and her sister. The two sisters remained close despite the eleven years difference in age.

As a child, she was sickly with bouts of pneumonia that was a worry in that day and time! But there was a plan for my Aunt, a mission and a gift to come and she survived the illnesses again and again. Her favorite playmate was Larry Tawes, son of Mae and Walton Tawes who lived next door.

Aunt Gert or Gertie as she was sometimes called, loved animals. She cared for them if they were hurt as if her very touch would heal them, which sometimes worked, but I feel it was her love and compassion that the animals felt.

Christmas was an awesome time for Gertie. She was the daughter of a waterman and a deeply religious Mama, which meant that Gertie went to St. Paul's church faithfully! Most of the island attended church, this was a part of island life.

Being the daughter of a waterman was sometimes difficult for Gertie. Year after year her Dad went "up the bay" from November until Christmas Eve. Gertie always cried when he left and oh the joy of

his return. He always managed to come back with gifts for his family and Gertie had a nice Christmas with a beautiful tree and presents. She was too young then to know how hard the life of a waterman was. Eventually he had to give up dredging and became a merchant at his father's store. (Captain Dick)

It was no surprise that Gertie decided to go into nursing school at Peninsula General that was a 3-year program. Her love for animals had become her love for people! During the hard studies, she managed to maintain a courting relationship with Stanley Windsor Bozman who was attending Salisbury State Teachers College, where he became known for his baseball

despite his shyness. I wish I knew more about their courtship since I could turn this article into a love fest but all I know for sure is that they had tiny tiffs and Uncle Stan would leave on foot to walk to his home in Dames Quarter, since he didn't have a car and Captain Horace, who was one of the fortunate on the island to own a car and loved Stan like a son, would drive to pick him up and take him home!

Uncle Stan is the other Angel. He was born April 16th, 1934 to Mary and Charles Bozman. Mr. Charles died when Stan was 3 years old, leaving behind four children, Walter, Charles, and Mary (sister as she was called) with Stan being the youngest. He recalled to me one day how poor they were and going to school with cardboard in his shoes to cover the holes! His brother

Charles enlisted in the service so that his paycheck would help the struggling Bozman family back home.

The Charles Bozman family was raised on a farm, where food was grown and canned for the winter. They had a mule that tilled the fields. A mule was the beast of choice since horses were "too sensitive and donkeys were too stubborn", a quote from Uncle Stan to Maribeth, his granddaughter! Stan hunted and fished for whatever meat they had to feed the family.

Being raised on a farm was hard work. There were always chores to do before and after school. His Mom never remarried and depended heavily on her children. They were all good kids and Mary Bozman was blessed. They were raised in a Christian home which began the makings of the



second Angel with invisible wings!
Gert and Stan went to Deal Island
School. She played softball and basketball and Stan played baseball and basketball. We

assume their dating time began with away games and bus trips to play sports. Even though he was 3 years older than Gert, they developed a relationship and dated one another exclusively followed by 62+ years of marriage. Imagine that? Angels must have a gift!

grandparents agreed to their marriage, but Stan was a hard worker and they felt he would be a good provider for their sweet Gertie! It was a huge wedding which was held at St. John's church. The day before,



Stan was asked to get some greenery and wild flowers for the church. Who pray tell would ask a groom to crawl into the woods on the Eve of his wedding? (probably his soon to be mother-in-

law) Captain Horace gave them a car as a wedding gift.

Stan felt ill at the rehearsal dinner and by the wedding morning, he started to itch! He hadn't slept and was feverish all night. His body was red with intense itching. It was indeed a bad case of poison ivy on the hottest day of the year in a stiff tuxedo, but the wedding had to go on. (I was the flower girl and my brother Wally was the ring bearer, I do wish I remembered a small piece of that day). It was not until Gert and Stan got back to her parent's home to change for the honeymoon trip that Gert saw his inflamed arms and legs, of course being a nurse, Aunt Gert knew right away what was wrong. They were heading to Niagara Falls and stopped on the way for calamine lotion. So even Angels get sick I guess or was it that they weren't Angels

After the honeymoon, they went to their apartment on Camden Avenue! Gert worked at Peninsula General and Stan taught in Wicomico County a few years! Stan eventually transferred to Deal Island School, but remained in the apartment for almost 2 years! My brother Neil remembers

riding back with him on weekends and having good times with his Uncle. They were close. Just a side note, Aunt Gert was not a great cook in those days but all that would soon change.

The next year, Gert was pregnant. The pregnancy was filled with nausea, really difficult to work in a hospital with all those odors. On October 25, 1960 Trudi was born, with dark hair and a smooth darker complexion. She looked like her Dad. This birth necessitated more living space.

It was around this time that Stan transferred to Deal Island School. They decided to have a home built by Eldon Willing Jr. in Wenona! Gert still commuted to Peninsula General. They lived with Gert's parents while the house was being built! This was a good thing since Trudi was not a happy baby and I am thinking that colic made her irritable, but she was beautiful. Captain Horace had hoped for a boy but God has other plans. (Captain Horace did get some grandsons from his first daughter Nora. Nora and David Webster had 3 sons; Neil, Wally and Tim, and one girl, me of course, 3 out of four, not bad.)



The home was built directly across from Captain Horace and Irene's home, nice, having parents so close by. This gave the Angels time to earn their wings and for grandparents to spoil little Trudi.

Angel stories are unbelievable!
Aunt Gert and Uncle Stan were active members in the St. Paul's Methodist Church in Wenona. They both loved the Lord and became faithful servants. They taught Sunday School for years.

The numerous trips to PGH were becoming a hardship for Gert, a baby, a new house causing life changing events! After PGH, Gert did numerous jobs in Somerset County, she was the school nurse and she taught a nursing aide program at J.M. Tawes Vocational School now called Center. This job was not easy as the students got hands on training at McCready Hospital and Manokin Manor. I am sure as some read this, those students remember those days and loved Aunt Gert with her gentle ways and soft voice!

Their second daughter Faith came along on October 21st, 1963. She was a good baby, fair with blue eyes, like her Mama. This birth made the crazy work schedules more tolerable.

After teaching and coaching for many years at Deal Island School, Stan became the principal of the school! He was well-liked and I actually remember him as my teacher, Coach, mentor, and Principal. I am biased, but he was indeed "Stan the Man".

I believe that somehow the invisible wings started to grow on Aunt Gert and Uncle Stan. They were helpers and busy in the community and church! They were active in the Gideon Foundation and Aunt Gert was a regular with the Red Hatters. (Which I haven't learned yet what they are all about?)



In 2009, Gert received the Jefferson Award in recognition of outstanding community

service on Delmarva!

In 2012, Stan was inducted into the Eastern Shore Baseball Hall of Fame, he loved the sport and played for many years, he sometimes played with the African

Americans who lived in "colored town" as it was called then. Stan didn't see color. He saw baseball players that lived separately from white folks in an area of land that between Wenona and Deal Island. He sometimes found jobs for his "baseball friends". You know Angels come in different colors too.

Aunt Gert and Uncle Stan were like second parents to my brothers and me. We lived almost across the street from them and we grew to love them. Somewhere along the way Aunt Gert became a great cook and Uncle Stan built onto their home by adding a bathroom, 2 bedrooms and 2 sunrooms where you could see the Tangier Sound. The sunroom on the far end of the home became a meeting place with God. Devotions and many prayers with thanks and petitions were offered to God. I visited from the Western Shore as often as I could and I felt cold chills on my arms, maybe this is the feeling you get when you pray with precious Angels!



In the sunroom one day, that overlooked the Tangier Sound Uncle Stan told me this story with tear-filled eyes; one hot day a small group of boys were playing ball in the field next to their property. Aunt Gert made sandwiches and lemonade and carried it over to them. She didn't even know their names. This was an example of an Angel!

Aunt Gert carried rice pudding to the sick, visited the homes of Hospice patients, visited the homes of the elderly making sure they had heat and their needs were

met. She was the Visiting Angel and the island folk grew to love her!

She officially retired from paying jobs in 1997. Uncle Stan had developed some health issues and retired sooner in 1989. The early retirements had allowed them more free time.

During their retirement years, they took vacations and acquired six grandchildren and eight great grandchildren. They felt so blessed. But life throws some curves even to Angels. Uncle Stan, who had to sit on his floor to do hardwood floors, who used his battery powered wheel chair to get to his shed to tinker, who also mowed his lawn by riding up to the mower and transferring to the mower from the battery operated unit, a man who didn't give up. (his son-in-law Steve James was a big help to Stan!) Stan became gradually too weak to do any chores. His legs wouldn't support him anymore and sadly Aunt Gert was losing her memory even though Uncle Stan remained sharp until his death in July 18th, 2021. I know that as he stood with strong legs



before our God, he heard these words "well done thy good and faithful servant".

Presently, Aunt Gert remains in their home on Paul Benton Circle and God has sent Angels to care for her, which includes her daughters, Trudi

Kulynycz and Faith James and grandchildren Maribeth and Luke Kulynycz. Aunt Gert's gentle spirit lives on in her extended family.



One day Aunt Gert will stand before God and hear these same words "well done thy good and faithful servant".

The 2023 Skipjack Festival will be held on Sunday, Sept. 3- Monday, Sept. 4.



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

#### GIRLS ON THE RUN






