#### **CULTURE CORNER**

JACK WILLING SR.

MASTER OF MANY TRADES


I interviewed Mr. Jack in 2013, and he was so busy at Scott's Cove Marina with customers and phone calls, that the actual interview went on for days. This story was well worth the focus on a man that the community loves and respects. I will begin with parts of Mr. Jack's jobs and how he became such a gifted carpenter, but first I want to give some history.



Jack married
Barbara Ford in 1960.
Jack was 20 and
Barbara was 18. The
marriage lasted 50
years, and sadly
Barbara passed away
in 2010. Jack

attended Rock Creek Church all of his life. He was the Sunday School treasurer for many years and was a faithful Christian. You will read about his commitment to the Deal Island/ Chance Lions Club of which he was a member 60+ years and was the treasurer for 30+ years. He was a blessing to the community.

Mr. Jack's contributions seem endless. He is best known for his work in the Scott's Cove Marina and for his endeavors to get the Skipjack Museum established. Jack financed and purchased the land where the



Museum stands today.

The watermen needed the railway at the Marina to repair their Skipjacks. Many wanted to refurbish their Skipjack, saving

her from Davy Jones Locker (only a few will understand that phrase)! Mr. Jack was a major contributor in helping the watermen get their supplies. But this is just one small service that he provided for the community!

Mr. Jack joined the Deal Island/ Chance Lions Club the same year that his dad, Eldon Willing Sr. was the President. (The Lions Club was organized in 1952, according to records I found, Mr. Eldon Willing Sr. was president in 1966). So, there were many years of Mr. Jack's commitment.

The Blood Bank of the Eastern Shore had begun and Mr. Jack got 200+ names to donate. This was a community service of the Lions Club. Another amazing community service was getting a doctor for the communities. I mean who would come to a small town and give his knowledge to others? So, an ad was placed in the AMA and a veteran by the name of Dr. Everett Sutter responded and served the communities for 40+ years. He was a Godsend and will be forever missed.

Jack was also involved with getting lights on the fields on Deal Island School so the Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts could play games at night. This was in the late 90's.

Jack's daughter Cindy told me that he drove the school bus for 40 years. I guess kids were less likely to have weapons and have fist fights back then. Can you imagine that stress?

One of Mr. Jack's largest accomplishments was his dedication to the establishment of the Skipjack Museum. When I interviewed him in 2013, he told me that this endeavor of which he initially was the chairman, was an ongoing 40-year project with many setbacks.

As the Skipjack Heritage stayed a dream, Jack and the Lions Club had other projects, but only a few came to fruition. One of these projects was work done on the Deal Island Bridge, but the bridge was eventually replaced by the state.

Since the Lion's Club had many different



Presidents, all worthy of accomplishments, I felt it was only fair to move on to Mr. Jack's story. I may save the Lion's Club for

another time.

Jack worked at Chris-Craft in Salisbury, Md, working in the cabin assembly for \$1.60 an hour. He was asked to build a cabin for a 32-foot Sea Skiff, but was given only 80 hours to complete the job. He had some issues as the wood was one inch too long, leaving Jack with no power saw at that time. He had to hand saw the wood and change the pattern so it would fit. (you can see how his developing skills would be a blessing to



the watermen). His third cabin was built in 40 hours.

Jack was given a raise, \$2.75 per hour. Later he was

offered an engineering job that offered him a raise of \$3.50 per hour. He was later made a supervisor and mastered many carpentry skills.

The plant was changing from wood to fiberglass. Jack had to go to school in New Jersey for 6 weeks, returning to Chris-Craft on the weekends. He went to school to learn about fiberglass production.

Jack, in his interview, told me that production wanted 15 houseboats built in a week, including Sundays. Jack was head of production at that time. This work was demanding with time limits and shift work. Jack's health was affected and he paid a visit to Dr. Sutter, who told him to find another job! (A Dr. Sutter diagnosis was rarely wrong). Jack gave two weeks' notice to Chris-Craft and took off 6 months.



As destiny would have its way, Jack would remain in Chance, Md. By then the

Scott's Cove Marina was built and Jack soon

became the man to take over the business. Jack being such a hard worker, began to put in long hours 6 days a week. He helped the watermen with every issue they had. There was a canopy put on the railway where Skipjacks nearing Davy Jones Locker were placed so the ship could be restored. Often it would take years.

These stories do not begin to complete the many jobs of Jack Willing. Mr. Jack has been the Labor Day Race director many times (I recall a day when I was a vendor and had fallen at my aunt's home and hurt my elbow, which was swelling by the time I got to race festivities, I don't know how Mr. Jack knew, but when I looked up, he was standing there was a bag of ice smiling like an Angel)!

He was the President of the Lion's Club in 1973 and 1978, with many duties including filling in where needed. I think of him as the go to man!

I believe that one of the greatest contributions to the community (besides the Skipjack Heritage, which was the hard work of others as well) is the Scott's Cove Marina located in Chance, Md and built in the 70's by Eldon Willing Sr., who was 67 years old at the time! Mr. Eldon Willing Sr., Jack Willing Sr., and later Mr. Eldon Willing Jr. joined the family business, and would be remembered for hand building two

workboats a year until the death of Mr. Eldon Sr. in 1979.

The family tradition of building boats continued for a



few more years. But in recent years the Marina turned to boat repairing and rebuilding. This change occurred after the

retirement of Mr. Eldon Jr. and the declining health of Mr. Jack. Since wooden workboats are less common today and expensive to build, many watermen have chosen fiberglass over wood. (Marina information came from an article written by Cynthia Willing Anderson, Jack's daughter, entitled



Boat Building- A Willing Tradition).

I have tried to keep Mr. Jack's story in some kind of order, but with his early interview and with the passing of time, I may have failed. I did however try to honor Mr. Jack by printing all

his community service, which is undeniably the most consistent service known by the community. I especially remember him on Labor Day, 3 days of dedicated work. One day I walked up to him to ask a few questions and he looked at me with shining blue eyes and said "You are becoming a nuisance". And indeed, I was, trying to get his story for one of my books. I felt like a reporter on a mission.

His daughter Cindy filled in many blank areas. The Jack Willing Sr. family consisted of 3 children. Cindy and her sister Jackie are both teachers. Cindy told me her that her late brother Jack Jr. was an attorney in Somerset County. Jack Sr. is the proud grandfather of 5 children and proud great grandfather of 7 children!

And so, the Willing heritage lives on!
