KHARI GARVIN

- Good afternoon and thank you for joining us today.
- I am Khari Garvin, and I have the pleasure of serving as President and CEO of United Way of Greater Greensboro.

- City Councilman and candidate Justin Outling,
- and candidate Eric Robert
- Today I will ask our participants a series of questions, and they will each have two minutes to respond.
- Our participants were given the opportunity to see and prepare to answer the 4
 predetermined questions I will pose to them.
- And, in true United Way fashion, these questions were created with the input of our community.
- In addition to the predetermined questions, I will select two questions from the chat – so, if you have a question you want us to consider – please share it in the chat.
- And please know if we do not answer your question today, United Way will consider what you share as we continue to collaborate in the community.
- Today's forum is not a debate.

- And it is not a place for political attacks.
- Our participants have agreed to be cordial, and we expect the same from our audience, who is asked to remain muted during the event.
- Anyone who does not abide by this rule will be muted or removed from the meeting.
- Today's forum is about elevating our community's efforts to end poverty and discovering how our participants plan to address the issues of poverty in the future.
- It is also important to note before we get started that the Guilford County Board of Elections will reopen filing from February 24 through March 4.
- So, there could be additional candidates added to the ballot for the general election which is currently scheduled to take place on May 17.
- So do your best to stay informed over the coming weeks, as there may be additional candidates added to the ballot.
- We have done our best to identify those who have filed or intend to file.
- And in fact, just before today's event we were contacted by Tyquann Knight who informed us of his intentions to run for Mayor.
- Understanding our format, he agreed it was too late to participate in today's meeting, but he may be joining us an event attendee.
- Now, we will begin today by asking each of our three participants to give a short introduction of themselves and let us know why they are running for Mayor.

QUESTION ONE

- Reports indicate prior to the impacts of COVID-19, more than 57,000 people in the greater Greensboro community were living below the poverty line – which is defined as a family of four with a total household income of \$26,500.
- Why should people care about these alarming numbers? ERIC/JUSTIN/NANCY

QUESTION TWO

- Poverty is often stigmatized as a personal failing, rather than a failure of our systems.
- Crime in lower income areas continues to make the news.
- People continue to have limited access to grocery stores and fresh produce.
- COVID-19 disproportionately impacted lower income areas of our community.
- How does your strategy for combatting poverty factor into your strategy for leading systemic changes to address these issues? JUSTIN/NANCY/ERIC

QUESTION THREE

- I'm sure each of you are aware of the growing need for safe and affordable housing in our community.
- While there are many positive examples of subsidized and privately-owned affordable housing options, there are photographic reports of families who are living in homes with leaky ceilings and mold.
- During a period of economic recovery, property values and rents have been on the rise.

- Safe and affordable housing is a critical component in building a pathway out of poverty.
- As Mayor, what will you do to ensure safe and affordable housing? And, specifically what can be done to ensure systems aren't unintendedly preserving substandard housing? NANCY/ERIC/JUSTIN

QUESTION FOUR our final predetermined question

- Boom Supersonic recently announced it will build a Superfactory at Piedmont
 Triad International Airport to produce its supersonic Overture airplane and
 promises to generate more than 1,700 jobs by the end of the decade.
- Toyota's recent selection of a Greensboro-Randolph Megasite to produce lithium-ion batteries for electric vehicles also promises to generate around 1,700 jobs.
- These are two major developments that have captured worldwide attention and the citizens of Greensboro and beyond have plenty of reasons to celebrate.
- These accomplishments have been made possible through years of collaboration, investment, and planning.
- How can these developments help someone living in poverty? And, as Mayor, how will you ensure equitable resources are focused in other areas of our city such as on East Greensboro? NANCY/JUSTIN/ERIC
