CHURCHWIDE EXECUTIVE BOARD POSTPONES CONVENTION, GATHERING

The April 25, 2020, meeting of the churchwide executive board occurred virtually. During that meeting the board voted to postpone both the Eleventh Triennial Convention (2020) and the 2020 Gathering. Both are being rescheduled to August 2021, again in Phoenix, Arizona. The convention will be held August 3-5, 2021, and the 2020 Gathering will be held August 5-8, 2021.

The postponement will likely raise some questions, including what to do if you, as a voting member-elect are not available during those dates in 2021. The churchwide executive board has also raised questions about the nomination process. We will be consulting with legal counsel as this is uncharted territory for us. We will be back in touch when we have more information to share.

The “Just Love” Gathering, initially scheduled for this July, has been postponed to **August 5-8, 2021**, due to the global coronavirus pandemic.

Here we offer tips for those who had already registered for the gathering.

What do you need to do about your event registration?

If you plan to join your Lutheran sisters at the “Just Love” Gathering on its rescheduled

dates, August 5-8, 2021, you are not required to take any action. All tours and options will also be automatically transferred to the 2021 dates.

Action to take

To make one of the following actions, email info@frameworkmeetings.com or leave a detailed message at 208-502-1150, and our registration provider will assist you.

- If you can't make the 2021 event, you can transfer your registration to a friend.
- If you can't make the 2021 event, you can donate your registration fee and any purchases you made, providing a gift to Women of the ELCA.
- You can request a refund, less a \$20 processing for fixed costs. The deadline to ask for this refund is **June 30, 2020**.

What do you need to do about your hotel reservations?

Our two gathering hotels, the Sheraton and Hyatt Regency, have canceled all 2020 room reservations and will be refunding deposits. The hotels will provide new online reservation links for the August 2021 dates before the end of May. We will send an email with the new links and the reservation phone numbers to registrants, as everyone **will need to make new hotel reservations**. We'll add these new links and contact numbers to our Gathering 2021 website.

What do you do about your airline reservation?

Because of the coronavirus, most airlines are offering travel credits for future flights. If needed, contact your airline directly for assistance with flight changes or refunds. While we've postponed the Gathering, our ministry continues. We're still mobilizing women to act boldly on their faith in Jesus Christ. LUTHERAN WORLD RELIEF

Lutheran World Relief has a new logo! Copied from the LWR website: “The new symbol for Lutheran World Relief is three interlocking rings. The colorful, bright design is inspired by our promise to you that, together, we put our belief in God into action to create lasting, life-saving impact.” Please use this logo when you are sending out news about Lutheran World Relief.

Lutheran World Relief has added a new challenge to their Quilt & Kits ministry. Lutheran World Relief is seeking volunteers to sew 75,000 (now MORE) cloth face masks that will be sent to the areas in which it works — from slums to remote rural villages — for those who don’t have the option of social distancing or frequent hand washing, putting them at risk of serious illness. Health officials recommend cloth face masks for reducing transmission. The cloth face masks will be distributed with upcoming international shipments of personal care kits already scheduled for summer and fall. Face masks will be distributed in communities at risk for COVID-19 transmission and are not intended to be a replacement for medical grade personal protective equipment.

The 75,000-cloth face mask goal reflects the commemoration of the 75th anniversary of Lutheran World Relief, which was founded in 1945 to help communities suffering during World War II. The goal of 75,000 was quickly reached and the challenge has been renamed 75,000 MORE Face Mask Challenge.

Volunteers are invited to register their pledge for the number of masks they will sew at <https://lwr.org/masks>. The website also has instructions on how make the face masks and how to send them to Lutheran World Relief. **Masks will need to be shipped and not included in your items collected at an Ingathering.†**

Most of the churches in the Southeastern Synod are dealing with how to open for worship again. They are also coming up with guidelines for small and large group meetings. No one is sure when WELCA circles, quilting groups, and other women’s gatherings will be able to meet again. Please store any quilts and kits you have made so far and we will have even more to donate and load onto the trucks next year. I am going to go ahead and post the 2021 Ingathering dates for our Synod on the LWR Ingathering webpage. The dates will be August 27-28, 2021. Please put these dates on your calendars.

Keep making masks, quilts, and those kits! Personal Care Kits are the most needed kit right now with School Kits a close second.

Stay safe, wash your hands, and wear those masks when out in public areas!†

Hot Chicken Salad


This is a great dish for a lady’s luncheon or easy dinner. Goes great with a veggie or salad.

DEAR FRIEND IN CHRIST



Want to sustain the community that is a hallmark of Women of the ELCA? Then join Dear Friend in Christ, a unique letter-exchange project to which all participants are invited.

How does it work?

1. Write a letter. Use the “Dear Friend in Christ” salutation. Fill a page or two, however you are inspired. Among other things, please share your thoughts on these questions: How is your faith in Jesus Christ sustaining you during the global pandemic? What words of encouragement can you offer the person who receives your letter?
2. You can handwrite or type the letter.
3. You could include a drawing, a photo, or a recipe, anything that fits into an envelope.
4. Offer up a prayer for the recipient.
5. You may include your mailing address in the letter if you do not wish to remain anonymous.
6. Print and sign the Dear Friend in Christ release form. If you don’t have access to a printer, please use our online form. We cannot exchange letters without a release.
7. Mail your letter and signed release form to Dear Friend in Christ, Women of the ELCA, 8765 W Higgins Road, Chicago IL 60631. **Deadline for mailing letters to the churchwide organization is October 15, 2020.**

What else do I need to know?

1. When you write to Dear Friend in Christ, your letter will be swapped with a letter from another writer. They will get your letter; you will get their letter. The exchange is anonymous (unless you provide your contact information), so you can share as little or as much information about yourself as you like.
2. Dear Friend in Christ is open to all participants, although **writers under 18 must have parental consent**. Download the release form.
3. Letters are paired at random, and we will try

to match participants with someone in a different geographical part of the ELCA. Women of the ELCA staff read all letters before the exchange happens.

4. Letters will be mailed to participants on a rolling basis, beginning in June 2020. We will continue exchanging letters received through All Saints Day, November 1, 2020.

Welcome to the Virtual Church Service

Most of you are practicing social distancing and belong to church homes that have currently suspended services on the physical grounds of the church due to the current pandemic of COVID-19. One of the results of this has been the emergence of video chat rooms using applications like Zoom, Google meetings, or the recently launched Facebook rooms to hold church services often at the same time as when we all met together in person. Some churches are extending this to holding Wednesday night groups and adult forum Sunday school as well. There has certainly been a learning curve for folks and continued faux pas committed with forgetting to mute during service. I think we have all done it at least once.

The feel of a virtual church service is certainly different. It is awkward with the varying internet speeds of each participant and the fact that two people really can't talk simultaneously. It is strange and wondrous to see everyone on one screen. Some of us are dressed just like we would go to church, others are still in pajamas, and some just don't share their video feed. Some sit as a couple at the table with the computer, others hold up their smart phones and multitask during service. There is no right way, just what makes you feel comfortable to share fellowship and receive encouragement and inspiration. The hope is to still be fed. It's kind of like little kids who doodle pictures during a service and surprise you later on when you are in the car with a profound question because that doodling allowed part of their brain to focus on the service. So, if you see folks (like me) wandering around the house doing various things, but otherwise muted, cut them some slack. I promise we are engaged.

The excitement to see members of your congregation is great. I enjoy being able to see folks that I may not have ordinarily interacted with regularly at church in this format. Remember that as human beings, we experience church through all our senses, so I challenge you to find things that enhance your experience. It could be incense, or a scented candle, being in a room of your home that gives you a sense of church or being outdoors. Or for me, throwing a blanket around my shoulders because I am perpetually

cold in the sanctuary whereas my best friend is usually burning up ☺.

Even though you are being considerate and muted, sing along during hymns. This is your opportunity! You should not feel inhibited because you are usually embarrassed by your lack of singing skills during a physical church service. Belt it out!

Some of you will feel it is important to have a physical communion even though you are at home. If that makes the experience have more meaning, by all means, do so. I will also bring up another aspect of all of this which is that we are accustomed to passing the plate at offertory which obviously can't be done, so I would remind you just as all these other things bring meaning to you during a church service, so should your offering.

Church is just as much about tapping us inside as it is to reach outside of ourselves in our communities. In addition to the utilities, mortgage and music director, our contributions also go towards benevolence to the synod office which helps our fellow churches that may be having a more difficult time with the challenges brought on by COVID-19.

All of us look forward to being together again in the church for services and that experience WILL be different going forward as COVID-19 will continue to affect daily life and threaten the physical well-being of many parishioners. Until we can be together as the body of Christ, remember to be considerate of those around you by continuing to be cautious in public places and that God isn't just in our physical churches. Exercise opening your eyes a little more to the miracle of creation in nature, your fellow human being, and the world. I truly believe the Holy Spirit is more active than ever because of all that has happened. We just have to be open to when it manifests itself.

I hope this encourages you that church can still be a wonderful fulfilling experience. Peace be with you. †

They have a program that helps people apply for and receive rental assistance through HUD and other programs that aid people. All their aid is to help people pull themselves out of homelessness.

A reminder that they have asked for donations of new socks and underwear. All sizes for men, women, and children. Since we are not having our convention this year, please start (if you have not already done so) collecting so that they feel our love for their ministry through our generosity and kindness. During this time of the Covid-19 pandemic we all counted on special people classified as 'essential workers' to help us through our day to keep us safe or to guide us with essential information. These essential workers are critical to maintain our infrastructure, are involved with our public health and safety and our community well-being. But others have been determined to be 'essential workers' and are employed in jobs that have now become critical to our community: like working at a grocery store; or at a factory; or as a delivery driver; and some may even be volunteers who continue to feed the unemployed or homeless with boxes of food or bagged meals. Many of these people may be your family or friends or You!

While main street businesses were closed and people were asked to stay home to help stem the spread of this invisible and aggressive virus, our essential workers were asked to come to work every day and risk exposure to the virus to themselves and possibly to their family. Thankfully because of these good people and by following good social distance practices we have managed to slow down the spread of the virus, but we still must remain vigilant.

Our essential workers are truly heroes and while much of the world practices privileged social distancing, these employees at times are putting their health on the line to ensure the world keeps running. Oh, and please don't forget about our postal folks that keep delivering the mail that keeps us connected.

So, how can we help? How can we be 'lifblood' to these much-needed essential workers? What can we offer while we're housebound? Here are a few ideas I found, and I know that you may have already come up with many more.....

- * Pray for essential workers and their families, and pray for a vaccine to bring an end to this pandemic.
- * Send a note card to a local business and let them know you appreciate the extra effort their employees are making for your safety.
- * Create a Sign – to express thanks to essential workers safely, consider making a sign for your yard or window that local workers will see when they go past your home.
- * Donate PPE - many frontline workers still don't have adequate access to PPE such as

masks and gloves. Many organizations are collecting donations like the LWR – 75,000 Mask Challenge.

- * Send food to Hospitals – some groups are raising funds to donate meal deliveries to hospital staffers who are working around the clock. Check for local fundraisers in your area.
- * Reach out to Friends/Family who are essential workers – send a text to friends and family who are still required to work during this time. Let them know you appreciate the work they do. If you can - consider offering to safely drop off or deliver food for them, so they don't have to worry about cooking.
- * Show Kindness –During these stressful times, a little kindness can go a long way. Even something as simple as sharing a smile from behind your protective mask can brighten someone's day.

Simply put we could just say "Thank you," as those two words are so meaningful and so heartfelt.


Gardening Can Heal our Hearts

What is it?

WORSHIP IN PINK is a grassroots initiative that provides the opportunity for congregations of all faiths to spread the life-saving message about breast health and early detection in their respective congregations. The main goal of the program is to provide free breast cancer awareness and education, and increase the number of women receiving mammograms, and honor breast cancer survivors and those living with Metastatic Breast Cancer. Worship in Pink is a program held in various cities across the country.

When are they held?

Many times, these worship services are held in May around Mother's Day. Some are held on the third Sunday in Advent. In some churches the third Sunday in Advent is represented by a pink candle. It is called the "Shepard's Candle," and is pink because rose is a liturgical color for joy. The third Sunday of Advent is Gaudete Sunday and is meant to remind us of the joy that the world experienced at the birth of Jesus, as well as the joy that the faithful have reached the midpoint of Advent. It is a time of honoring breast cancer survivors and remember those who succumbed to the disease. Most of the time it is held in October, Breast Cancer Awareness Month.

Where can you get more information?

Susan G. Komen fight for the cure has foundations in all states and is the heartbeat of this campaign. You can download information and resources along with creative ideas to make your service special. Churches can also participate by using the Worship in Pink toolkit to develop

their own breast health events. The program has provided more than 100,000 women and men with breast health education and resources. By empowering women and men to take charge of their health, they continue to work toward the bold goal to reduce the current number of breast cancer deaths by 50% in the US by 2026. If you are not already doing so, I would encourage you to check out the web sites and consider celebrating Worship in Pink at your church.†




JOIN LUTHERAN WOMEN IN TUESDAY PRAYER AT NOON

(From the Blog- a call to prayer in the time of a pandemic.)







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
