Bee Hives

(Beth Gaddie) The Whole Kids Foundation and the Bee Cause Project annually award \$1,500 grants to schools and nonprofit organizations with the mission of providing support for educational live bee programs. There was an extensive application process including a budget of how the money would be spent and the ways in which the students would interact with, be involved in, and learn from the bee program. We were notified on December 6 that we had received the grant.

I encouraged Faith Bradberry of Hunt ISD to also apply for this grant and she was awarded \$1,500 as well. With these funds we will be able to install TWO beehives at the school and provide the equipment to maintain the hives. Student activities include caring for the bees and hives, designing a logo for the hives, painting and installing the hive boxes as well as putting bees in these new hives.

We are thrilled to take this next step concerning bee education for students at the Hunt School.

Ways & Means wll be having a SPRING FUNDRAISER

Get your spring cleaning done early! We are having a GARAGE SALE at the Hunt Pavilion on April 12. Clean out your unwanted items and help contribute funds to our club.

At our club garage sale fundraiser in April, we will also be selling HERBS AND VARIOUS PROPAGATED PLANTS.

We will have herb starter kits to hand out on Tuesday and ask that you be willing to take a kit home and get some herbs started for our sale. The kits will contain a 1 gallon ziploc with potting medium, 5 small pots and a seed

packet with instructions for starting your herbs. It will be imperative to start the herbs right away, so plants will be selling size come April. If you have a green thumb and are able to propagate plants from your yard, we are happy to add those to the sale too.

However there are things we can be doing now in our gardens. Here are some ideas:

- Give your indoor houseplants a good "cleaning". Wipe off leaves with a rag soaked in water with diluted scent free soap. Dust settles on leaves and clogs cells, light penetration as well as gas and moisture exchange.
- Make plans for this year's garden. Think about crop rotation.
- Check houseplants for insect infestations.
- Order seed catalogues now if you don't have them already. Think about companies that specialize in pollinator and heirloom varieties.
- Gather seed starting materials and have them ready for when your seeds arrive.
- Seeds that can be started now are broccoli, cabbage, cauliflower, celery, head lettuce, onions and parsley as well as many perennial flowers.
- These are just some ideas to consider as eventually it will be spring. And pray for rain!
