# What's Happening in Hunt Garden Club?

**Scholarships** (Ruth Johnson) – The Hunt Garden Club is proud to announce that since 2007, the Club has awarded over \$35,000, or around \$3,000 per year, to area high school seniors in recognition of their academic excellence and community service. The Club will award \$3,000 again this year to three highly qualified applicants in the amounts of \$1,500, \$1,000 and \$500. Names of the recipi-



ents will be announced in the May report after notification to all applicants has been completed.

Our committee grew from 5 to 10 members this year which brought additional ideas, perspectives and improvements. The committee worked over the summer to review the requirements, revise the application, develop the process for electronic submissions including a QR code to access the website, refine the rubric to evaluate the application packets and revise the publication process to include a radio spot and expanded social media postings. We streamlined our process to review the application packets and provide anonymity for the evaluation process. We continued to grow our relationships with the counselors at the local high schools which proved to be key in receiving a larger number of high-quality application packets.

The results of these efforts are reflected in both the quality and quantity of applications submitted. We received 11 applications this year with the number meeting our requirements increasing from 30% last year to 80% this year. Students from twice as many schools submitted applications this year which included Ingram TM, Tivy, Harper and Our Lady of the Hills High Schools. We had a group of applicants with impressive qualifications and have a goal to increase our awards next year.

Adopt A Highway (Penny Deupree) – We covered from the intersection of 1340 to Rustic Hills on Hwy 39 and picked up enough trash to fill four of the large white bags with our black bags. Greatest number of participants that we have ever had!!

**Wildscape** (Carla Stang) – The Wildscape ladies had 2 very productive spring pruning and clean-up days the end of March. This is a time of year to take stock and be amazed by nature. We cut back the plants, some to mere inches above ground, only to see them grow anew in height and width and bloom throughout the growing season. Some of the plants we planted in the fall are starting to peek out a little green, which is always reassuring to see. Our "secret Bluebonnet garden" is in full bloom and a Mountain Laurel on the opposite side of the Wildscape is



loaded with blooms...for the first time in my 5 years of being on the Wildscape team. It's a shrub that is practically neglected, but this year it is gorgeous...and smells lovely. Unfortunately, none of us are getting any rain so we'll need to activate our watering schedule, especially for the new plants...and we're thankful for the many other established native plants with low-water needs that don't need as much TLC.
