### What's Happening in Hunt Garden Club?

Beehive (Beth Gaddie) - We have had a very busy summer. For the first time, we are running two hives. Due to the extreme drought, we have had to feed the bees on a weekly basis. While feeding all summer long is not ideal, our bees have been hard at work making honey stores for the winter. Several members of our group attended the last Hill Country Beekeepers Association meeting. The speaker reminded us that beekeeping is not an easy task and that the goal of any first year hive is to make it through the winter. We are super excited about our mobile observation hive and will be looking for opportunities to use it to educate on the importance of bees in our ecosystem.

**Financial Review** (Bernadell Larson) The committee will conduct the review after the HGC September 2021 thru August 2022 financial books close. Discussions are underway for a late September or early October date.

The President's Garden (Sue Hilton / Trish Stone) - The Presidents Garden has added more rock to help maintain the soil's moisture content and to discourage weeds. The heat/ drought this summer and water restrictions discouraged the planting of any new specimens. Weeding by Bernadell helped greatly with the upkeep. Thank you for positive comments.

**Post Office Landscape** (Kyra Bowman) – We continue to water (thanks for the rain!) and monitor the Post Office garden.

Adopt A Highway (Penny Deupree) Working on October Adopt A Highway. Firm date to announced later. highway 39 needs a fall cleanup. The Hunt Welcome Sign (Cindy Janke) - The welcome sign committee has had a hiatus since we had to remove the sign last winter. Currently we are in negotiations with the Hunt Preservation Society to do a beautification project around the limestone "Welcome to Hunt " sign. We have a landscape plan and a preliminary budget. There will need to be a fundraiser held by the Garden Club to finance this project. The projected time line to begin is in the spring of 2023. What is to be done with the old sign has not been decided yet. All this is a work in progress and no final decisions have been made yet.

#### Ways and Means (Fundraising)

(Alice King) - Our annual Tree and Seed Sale is scheduled for October 14 and 15 from 10:00 -2:00 at Bridget's Basket front field. Trees sales are pre-order only this year so please get your order in before October 9. We are offering trees that are native or well-adapted to our area. If you have lost any trees due to drought these should be good replacements. We will also have a good variety of seeds for sale, including some truly deer-proof wildflowers. We hope to see you there! Wildscape (Carla Stang) – The Wildscape Team met to discuss or ideas for planning improvements in the Wildscape for 2023. We have some really nice ideas to educate the students and public and enhance the bird features of the garden. In terms of managing the Wildscape during the drought we're having, we took a decidedly conservative approach to watering over the hot summer months. Like our own plants, there have been fewer blooms, less growth, and overall sad looking plants.

Once again we have put our faith in native plants' abilities to "do their thing" through the heat and lack of water; we hope they've been putting their energies below the soil into their root system to survive. We have had a couple of superstar performers even in the drought which has allowed us to harvest some seeds. The Pride of Barbados, Esperanza, Pearlvine Milkweed, and Desert Willow were a bit late to bloom, but have steadily bloomed throughout the summer.

A visit to our Wildscape showed the benefits of our recent rain and Wow! Our American Beauty Berry is producing beautiful fruit, the milkweeds have flowered and another has produced pods, the Turk's Cap, Esperanza and Pride of Barbados look glorious and our different sages are blooming. It's amazing what a relatively small amount of water has done after our many months of drought. Hoping the butterflies and bees will come back!

Since the fall remains hot, albeit with some rain, we won't be planting any new plants until we see what the spring brings! It's always a learning experience and fun to see how nature responds to the current environment.
