NALOXONE



WHAT IS NALOXONE?

Naloxone is a medication that temporarily reverses the effects of an opioid overdose. Naloxone is effective during an opioid overdose, but does not reverse the effects of overdoses from other drugs or substances (e.g. alcohol). Naloxone is a safe medicine that can save someone's life until professional medical help arrives.



HOW DOES IT WORK?

Naloxone stops the effects of an opioid overdose by blocking the parts of the brain that respond to opioids. It temporarily reverses the symptoms of an opioid overdose, including unresponsiveness or breathing difficulties.



WHERE CAN I GET NALOXONE?

Consult with your health provider. Many pharmacies also carry naloxone. In California, pharmacies are authorized to sell naloxone without a prescription. Call or check with your local pharmacy to ensure naloxone is in stock.



WHY CARRY NALOXONE?

- It's safe and easy to use
- You don't need to be a medical professional to use it
- It can save a life during an opioid overdose!

OPIOIDS

WHAT ARE OPIOIDS?

Opioids are a type of drug that affect the brain and nervous system by binding to specific receptors in brain cells, reducing the perception of pain and producing feelings of relaxation or euphoria.

WHY ARE THEY USED?

Doctors have prescribed opioids to manage pain for more than a century. Opioids are mainly prescribed to reduce pain after surgeries, serious injuries or cancer. However, their use carries a significant risk for misuse and addiction.

WHAT COULD GO WRONG?

Opioids can be very dangerous if a person takes too much, uses someone else's prescription, or mixes them with alcohol or other drugs. Misusing opioids can lead to addiction, where the brain and behavior are so affected that the individual can no longer control their use. Overdosing can slow breathing and the heart rate, potentially leading to death.

SIGNS OF AN OVERDOSE:

Difficulty breathing


- slowed breathing or no breathing at all
- gasping or gurgling

Unresponsiveness

- limited reaction to your voice or when you tap their shoulders
- do not open their eyes or wake up
- may also have bluish or greyish colored skin

Small pupils

• sometimes referred to as "pinpoint"
