Holidays: Don't Forget Your Pet!



Pet parents, during the holiday season, remember our dogs and pets can be negatively affected by our anxiety and stress, some more than others!

In 2023, the American Psychological Association uncovered these shocking numbers about stress and the holidays:

- ~ 89% of American adults feel stress during the holidays.
- ~ 41% reported higher stress levels vs other times of the year!
- ~ Even worse, 64% of those living with mental illness felt their stress worsened during the holiday season!

If humans are so incredibly stressed out during the holidays, imagine how our sensitive pets feel?!

How Human Stress Affects Dogs

Whether we realize it or not, dogs take their cues from their humans in good times and not-so-good times. Dogs and other pets can immediately pick up on how their human is feeling by detecting the odors of stress resulting from the automatic chemical changes in our sweat and breath during times of stress. In fact, research has shown that our dogs' cortisol levels (the "stress hormone") often mirror their owners' levels. In other words, if you are stressed, chances are your dog is too!

While our dogs and pets don't have to worry about buying the perfect gift or making Grandma's holiday dinner with all the trimmings, it **can** often mean disrupted routines, strangers, decorations and unfamiliar sights, sounds and smells, leading to hiding, anxious or destructive behaviors, excessive barking and hyperactivity or worse.

How to Help Your Dog this Holiday Please don't forget your pets and their needs this holiday season!

- Regularly check on your pets and monitor your own emotions.
- Stick to their regular routines for exercise, eating and potty breaks.
- Also, create a quiet and safe space for them to relax in with their favorite blanket, bone or enrichment toy when they become overwhelmed or anxious with busy holiday celebrations!

Canine Enrichment for Your Dog



When you're wrapping those holiday gifts, instead of throwing away unusable wrapping paper, scrunch it up and toss it into a box with hidden treats, kibble or favorite toy for your dog to find! Remember, always supervise your dog to keep them safe.

And, use the canine enrichment activities we discussed this year to keep your furry best friend busy, happy and content this holiday!

- Dog-powered sports: Canicross and cani-hiking/trekking, bikejoring, scootering, skijoring, sledding and cani-skating.
- Nose/scent work with favorite toys, treats or essential oils.
- Recorded buttons to teach your dog or cat to communicate with simple words or commands.
- Lick mats can help engage and calm your dog.
- Food puzzle games engage natural dog behaviors.
- Rally obedience/agility training at home or in a competitive environment.
- Teach your dog new tricks; find or put away specific items in the house (up the ante by using new items from outside, your child's school or your office); ring a bell to go outside; or train for the Canine Good Citizen Certification.
- The DIY Muffin Pan Enrichment toy or K9 Snuffle Mat (or buy one).
- A Flirt Pole to attract and engage your dog's prey drive.


