Water is vital for all life especially when it's warmer, drier and more humid. Both dogs and cats typically begin to show signs of dehydration after 24 hours without water, and the longer it goes, the more life-threatening it can become.

According to Pets.WebMD.com, <u>dogs</u> need a minimum of *one ounce of water for every pound* each day. <u>Cats</u> on the other hand, require 3.5 to 4.5 ounces of water per five pounds of body weight every day. Watch your pet's daily consumption of water to make sure they are drinking enough to prevent dehydration and worse.

Finicky drinker? Fresh water fountains, added broths, pet-friendly electrolytes or small ice chips can encourage your dog or cat to drink more.



Using a dehydrator is one of the easiest ways to make healthy and delicious treats for your family dog without adding unwanted heat in the warmer months. All you need for the two recipes below is meat, parchment paper and a dehydrator.

SALMON JERKY

Thinly slice the salmon and place it on parchment paper on the dehydrator trays. Dehydrate at the highest heat for four-ten hours depending how thin the salmon is sliced and how crispy you want your treats. Completely cool and store in an airtight container in a dark space for up to three weeks or in the freezer up to three months.

LIVER JERKY

Liver is an incredibly healthy and nutritional organ meat for your dog offering protein, vitamins and minerals while being low in fat. Cut liver into appropriate piece sizes for your dog and place on parchment paper on the dehydrator trays. Dehydrate for eight hours between 130-140 degrees Fahrenheit. Completely cool and store in an airtight container in the refrigerator for up to one week or in the freezer for up to two months.
