PRAYER FOR ILLUMINATION - read by Meg Chalmers

One: Loving God, your word comes to us through the ages and reminds us that, though the details may change, your will is timeless. You call us to be a people whose love knows no bounds and whose service to others overcomes all barriers. Form us by your word, this day. Amen.

ACTS OF THE APOSTLES: Acts 3:12-19 – Peter preaches in Solomon's Portico – *read by Matthew Winninger*

One: When Peter saw it, he addressed the people, "You Israelites, why do you wonder at this, or why do you stare at us, as though by our own power or piety we had made him walk? The God of Abraham, the God of Isaac, and the God of Jacob, the God of our ancestors has glorified his servant Jesus, whom you handed over and rejected in the presence of Pilate, though he had decided to release him. But you rejected the Holy and Righteous One and asked to have a murderer given to you, and you killed the Author of life, whom God raised from the dead. To this we are witnesses. And by faith in his name, his name itself has made this man strong, whom you see and know; and the faith that is through Jesus has given him this perfect health in the presence of all of you. "And now, friends, I know that you acted in ignorance, as did also your rulers. In this way God fulfilled what he had foretold through all the prophets,

that his Messiah would suffer. Repent therefore, and turn to God so that your sins may be wiped out,

One: The Word of the Lord!

All: Thanks be to God!

REFLECTION: Do overs! - Acts 3:12-19

Peter, a Jew himself, travels with John, and addresses his audience of Jews, the very ones who a few days before incited violence in mob frenzy, shouting for the crucifixion of Jesus. Imagine, for one minute, if you were in that crowd, guilty of not recognizing, not believing, and righteously demanding that the imposter be put to death, only to find out that you were dead wrong.

"You killed the Author of life" says Peter. You rejected the very one who came to save. I'm sure there were hard core disbelievers in his listening audience, but what if you were one who belatedly realized your mistake? Like the soldier at the cross, "truly this was the Son of God!" Like Pilate, who knew Jesus was not worthy of a criminal's death, "I find no wrong in him." Yet, to appease the crowd and protect his standing with the emperor, he went along with what the murderous voices demanded.

Peter offers them a way out. "In your ignorance" he says, you put to death the Messiah. "Repent" and turn back to God, asking for forgiveness. From the cross, Jesus called out to God, "Forgive them for they known not what they do!"

Scholars believe that Acts which was written later maybe beginning of the second century held a writer bias that was not present when Peter spoke. It was not so much an anti-Jewish condemnation as a general call for repentance of their uniform

rejection. Paul, also a Jew, became a persecutor of the Christian Way, and then in dramatic fashion, came to believe and reverse his stand.

Peter, who understood failure and guilt in his denial three times of his Lord, knew the oppressive attitudes towards Jewish leaders through the powers of Rome. He loved his people. This was not a denial and condemnation of the Jewish race by outsiders, for they were all Jews, including his beloved Jesus. Jesus came through the strain of Jewish roots of Abraham, Isaac and Jacob. Jesus came to help us transform the violent and destructive ways we direct toward each other, into pathways of peace and understanding.

Peter leveled his criticism against evil. Anyone is complicit in evil, not only by carrying out the act themselves, but also by standing by, turning their backs, walking away, and acting in ignorance, refusing to do anything to stop it. The most recent example is the Asian woman who was viciously attacked and security guards closed the shop doors so they didn't have to deal with it. Sometimes, we regret momentary decisions that we have made, from not wanting to get involved, or going along with a crowd, and we long for an opportunity to "Do Over," to make things right. Peter offers a choice, of acknowledging their sin, choosing to repent and begin again.

People flocked to hear Peter who stood in one of the entrances to the city of Jerusalem at Solomon's Gate. It was the site of dramatic healing of a crippled beggar, and a repeat by Peter and John. Perhaps, they had come to receive their own miracles because they knew their association with Jesus, the One who had healed so many. Undoubtedly, they were not expecting a stern sermon, but they were expecting that Peter and John were the source of the power. Peter redirects them. "You got it wrong." The power does not reside in us. It comes through Jesus, the one that you rejected.

Scriptures tell us again and again how the disciples failed to capture and understand the message of Jesus. Now Peter berates his listeners for the same ignorance, their inability to discern Jesus as God's chosen One. We are removed many generations from the site of Solomon's portico, yet Peter's words are also directed at us.

We fail Jesus daily in our treatment of one another. We do not live up to the simplest of commands to "Love God, and Love one another, as I have loved you." Peter's words call us to repent and humbly ask for a "do over." Amen.

PSALM: Psalm 4 – Answer me when I call, O God. – read by Mckenna Rankin

One: Answer me when I call, O God of my right! You gave me room when I was in distress. Be gracious to me, and hear my prayer.

How long, you people, shall my honor suffer shame? How long will you love vain words, and seek after lies? Selah

But know that the LORD has set apart the faithful for himself; the LORD hears when I call to him.

When you are disturbed, do not sin; ponder it on your beds, and be silent. Selah

Offer right sacrifices, and put your trust in the LORD.

There are many who say, "O that we might see some good! Let the light of your face shine on us, O LORD!"

You have put gladness in my heart more than when their grain and wine abound.

I will both lie down and sleep in peace; for you alone, O LORD, make me lie down in safety.

GOSPEL: The Gospel of Luke 24:36b-48 Jesus invites his disciples to touch him! – *read by Sandra Winninger*

One: While they were talking about this, Jesus himself stood among them and said to them, "Peace be with you." They were startled and terrified, and thought that they were seeing a ghost. He said to them, "Why are you frightened, and why do doubts arise in your hearts? Look at my hands and my feet; see that it is I myself. Touch me and see; for a ghost does not have flesh and bones as you see that I have." And when he had said this, he showed them his hands and his feet. While in their joy they were disbelieving and still wondering, he said to them, "Have you anything here to eat?" They gave him a piece of broiled fish, and he took it and ate in their presence. Then he said to them, "These are my words that I spoke to you while I was still with you – that everything written about me in the law of Moses, the prophets, and the psalms must be fulfilled." Then he opened their minds to understand the scriptures, and he said to them, "Thus it is written, that the Messiah is to suffer and to rise from the dead on the third day, and that repentance and forgiveness of sins is to be proclaimed in his name to all nations, beginning from Jerusalem. You are witnesses of these things.

One: The Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ

All: Praise to you, O Christ!

REFLECTION: Need for Proof! - Luke 24:36b-48 What just happened? Chaos, confusion, fear, frustration, guilt, grief, doubt, anxiety, suspicion, distrust, restlessness, despondency and terror – all were party to the aftermath of the disciples' relentless emotions. Then came Jesus!

Jesus, resurrected, in the flesh, is the centerpiece of the Christian faith. Is it any wonder it takes us time to absorb the reality of new life in Christ, when the disciples who stood in the very room with him had trouble believing what they were seeing? Jesus' expression of hunger and call for a meal of fish puts to rest the idea that his body is purely spiritual. His humanity is essential to human salvation.

The disciples had been given plenty of warning. Before death, Jesus told them that he would return in three days. The women encountered the empty tomb and told the disciples that Jesus had risen, as he said. The two disciples walking on the Emmaus Road also reported that they had encountered Jesus and told them what he had said. Nevertheless, they were not prepared for his appearance in front of them in the locked room in which they chose to hide away.

Jesus responds to fear with "Peace be with you." Why are you freaking out? He, both understands and challenges, their fear. He invites them to move beyond, to understand that death is not the final word. The power of this resurrection is the power to

plant the seeds of transformation. Minds are opened. Security is not restored, but peace is given.

The gathering of friends was an attempt to put together their understanding of what had happened. They had numerous confirmations of Jesus resurrection, but they had a deep need for proof. "Look at me" Jesus said, confirming that he was not a ghost. He ate. He opened their minds, and he told them they were witnesses. Luke uses the progression to establish credibility. Fear and confusion are addressed; they are engaged in Scripture and understand that it has been fulfilled according to God's intention. And now that they have seen and understood, they are named as witnesses. Their proof has been affirmed in order to make them witnesses to the truth of the resurrection and to share it with the world.

We are creatures who need proof. We want to see something confirmed in black and white. We usually have difficulty taking something on face value. Think back to what it was that has been your defining moment of belief. Were you raised in the faith to parents who lovingly taught you about God's love and the stories of God's relationship with God's people?

Were you introduced to Jesus during a Christian Camp experience, or a Crusade, or a Gospel meeting? Did you read something that captivated you and led to your wanting more and you began to study and explore and came to believe? Were you nudged by the Holy Spirit into an unexplained revelation that brought Jesus into your life? Did this feeling grow on you gradually, or in one swoop instant where your life was never quite the same again?

We are all sojourners on this earth at different levels of understanding and growth. If we listen to people who have experienced Near Death Experiences, we will come to realize that there is no need to fear death. All who have undergone this experience, describe it as overwhelmingly peaceful and a time that has removed all fear of death and a moment when their life changed forever, giving them a greater understanding of their purpose to love and care for one another.

God's love transforms our doubts. God's hope gives us the impetus to go on when we are sorely in need of lifting up. Sometimes, our proof just needs to be taken on faith. We are hesitant believers, who desire to experience the presence of the risen Christ! Amen.

IMPROVING OUR WORLD!

Jadav Payang planted a tree in India every day for 40 years stopping erosion and creating a sustaining forest of 1,360 acres. This incredible forest is now home to elephants, rhinos, bears, reptiles and birds. This earth-friendly man says, "nature is God." The city of Kwinana in Australia installed drainage nets over their storm sewers at the point of entry into the ocean. 815 pounds of plastic were prevented from entering and polluting the waterway over a period of 4 months.

Saltwater Brewery in Florida changed the formula for their plastic six pack rings to make them biodegradable and safe for animals to snack on. This greatly helped to reduce the deaths of some million seabirds and 100,000 marine animals per year. Japan is turning electronic waste into recycled medals for the Olympic and Paralympic games helping to curb the pile of dumped electronics as the fastest growing waste problem in the world.

How can we care for our Environment?
Reduce, Reuse, Recycle; Volunteer for Clean-ups in our communities; Educate ourselves on how to protect our environment; Conserve water; Choose sustainable products; Shop wisely; Use long lasting light bulbs; Plant a tree.
God said to have "dominion" over the earth; to care for in stewardship, not exploitation; to ensure that it remains for succeeding generations to enjoy, each in turn with the ongoing responsibility to enhance and nurture.
